PLEASE DON'T EAT THE DAISIES... (OR THE IVY, TULIPS, CASTOR BEANS, ETC.)

Spring planting time is almost here and we are grateful to William A. Sivers, Jr., chief of the Bureau of Psychological Services of the State Education Department, for an interesting article he sent us to pass it along to you.

In the Los Angeles Health Education Journal, March, 1960, we read that many cultivated plants — some of them garden favorites here in the East — contain enough poison to incapacitate, even kill, humans.

Castor bean seeds (this is the only one we knew about, because we like to grow 'em) contain enough poison per 10-cent packet to kill 5 children.

One tulip bulb contains enough poison to kill a grown man.

Sweet peas contain a poison that causes a form of paralysis which is seldom fatal but can keep a victim bedridden for months.

Even honey made by bees in an area grown with rhododendron and mountain laurel has been found to be poisonous.

Here is a list of some of the poisonous cultivated plants. Those marked with an asterisk can be fatal if taken in the quantities a child might eat:

Lily-of-the-Valley*	Any
Rhododendron*	Any
Burning Bush*	Leaves
Sweet Pea	Stem
Iris*	Underground Stem
Mock Orange*	Fruit
Castor Bean*	Seed
Foxglove*	Leaves
Scotch Broom*	Seed
Tulip*	Bulb
Mountain Laurel*	Any
Monkshood*	Root

Naturally, there is no reason, says the article, to stop growing beautiful flowers simply because some of them contain poison, but it's a good idea to teach kids to avoid the common habit of tweaking off a bit of leaf or stalk to chew on.

Youngsters should be taught that it may be extremely dangerous to put the leaves or stems of any plants, except those known to be edible, in their mouths. And above all, we're told, the bulbs of plants should never be stored where children can get at them.

[As we conclude this item, we wonder about something. We've read at least 5 different versions of the story of the servant, or sailor, or visitor from abroad, who — at the time of Holland's wild speculation in tulip bulbs — mistook a tulip for an onion and placidly devoured thousands of guilders worth of rare flora for his lunch. Did he then keel over dead, or did he wander off the pages of history in blissful ignorance of his crime? The stories don't tell. Maybe he just had a tummy ache . . . or maybe, if he was an envoy from a foreign court, he enjoyed diplomatic immunity. Editor]

shaving balloons, a bake sale, side show, dart throwing, and fortune telling. Refreshments will be available.

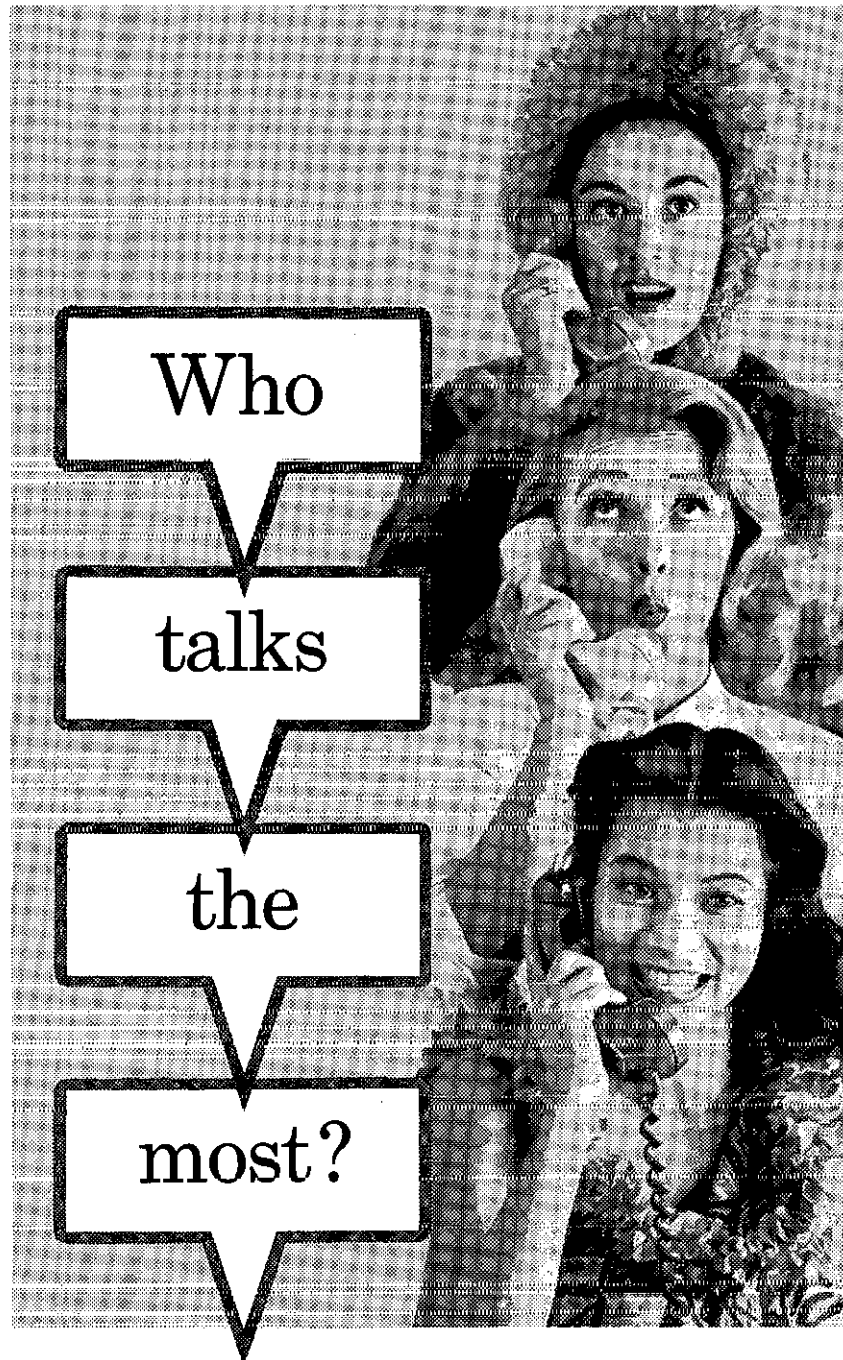
A dance will be held starting at 10:30 p.m. with "Rockin' Richard" Matrese. Admission is 25¢. Tickets will be sold at the door.
