Dick Dalton, former vice-commander and treasurer of the Blanchard Post, has handled every phase of the baseball program for the Post for several years and this year is also field manager.

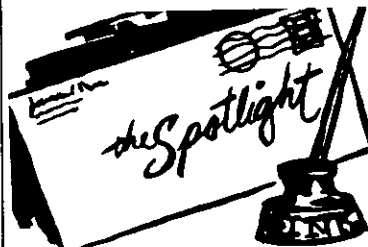
SELKIRK FIRELADIES AT GLENMONT FAIR

In your August 4 issue, you point with what appears to me to be ill-advised pride at a pamphlet issued by the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce.



NAMED PROFESSOR AT SIENA

John Hastings, CPA, head of the accounting firm which keeps a fiscal eye on *The Spotlight*, was recently appointed Professor of Business at Siena College.

What, in the name of all you consider desirable in a place to live in, do you like about the idea of attracting "industry" to your home? Do you really look forward with pleasure to growing congestion, noise and blighted landscapes or can't you afford to pay your own taxes? (You talk about "tax-paying industry.")

If you can't, why did you move out here from an overcrowded city — or are you one of those few honest-to-goodness old settlers? Lots of us settlers moved here from Albany (almost 15 years for us) for "the chance to plant a tree and watch it grow and bring up our children in a house that could well be home to their children." And lots of us have endured high taxes (too high, some think) without too much complaint because we felt that with those taxes we have been paying for quiet streets and uncongested roads and lots of unspoiled woods and meadows.

Now we're beginning to live in what an article in a national magazine called "the chronic anxiety of not knowing where progress is going to strike next."

Pretty soon this peaceful residential suburb is going to be swallowed up by the material expansion of "extended urbanism" unless some more unfriendly, uncooperative residents like me stand up on their hind legs and holler for someone to help put on the brakes.

Look at Albany. That city in its hunger for more space for those profitable cell-blocks that are going up every day has devoured most of its fine old architecture (that once gave the silly place a wonderful historic fla-

Since the day primitive man first tasted a piece of meat that had accidentally frozen — and found it as good as freshly killed meat — men have been depending upon ice to preserve foods.

of miles to warmer climates.

In the middle ages, farmers built underground "ice-houses" for storage.

The invention of a "box" that made artificial ice and could be used for storage in the home was the most important step in food preservation in centuries.

But even with modern refrigerators, exposure to air damages the delicate color and flavor of fresh fruits. Now there's an easy solution to this problem too — whether you want to serve the fruit for a mid-summer night feast or a mid-winter delight.

Housewives can "put up" peaches, apricots, berries, cherries, pears, apples — even fruit cocktail — which will stay fresh for months of freezer storage. The secret of this modern success is an anti-darkening agent which is a combination of the same products commercial processors use to keep their fruits appealing to eye and taste-buds.

Available at drug stores and frozen food lockers, A-C-M (short for Ascorbic-Citric-Mixture) is a balanced mixture of ascorbic acid (vitamin C), citric acid and sugar — all of which occur naturally in food.

Added to dry or syrup freeze packs, this protective agent prevents discoloration of fruit or loss of delicate flavor.

To preserve peaches, select only juicy, firm but ripe fruit. Peaches for table use are usually frozen with syrup. For medium syrup, use five cups of sugar per

quart of water. Add two level teaspoons of A-C-M per pint of syrup.

To make peeling easy, scald peaches in boiling water for 45 seconds. After peeling, chill the (continued on next page)

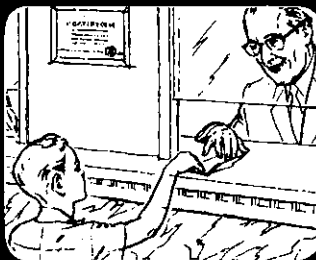

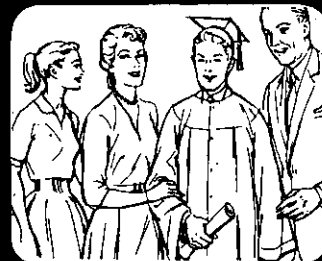

fruit in cold water. Handle peeled fruit quickly to prevent darkening.

To minimize exposure to air, cut the fruit directly into the syrup. When filling containers, cover the peaches completely with syrup. Allow head room for expansion during freezing.

Before serving, fruit should be thawed quickly in the package.

Even without a deep-freeze, you can keep fruit salads bright and fresh for hours using this anti-darkening protectant. This means you can prepare your salad early in the afternoon, be-

fore the dinner rush begins. Merely add one-half to three-quarters of a level teaspoon of A-C-M per cup of sugar, mix thoroughly with the fruit and refrigerate.

The family will enjoy orchard-fresh fruit salad and you'll enjoy the added leisure at mealtime.

You might want to stock your deep-freeze with fresh fruit cocktail, prepared while the ingredients are in season and at their flavor peak.

Use any variety of fruit. Apples must be peeled, cored and sliced; apricots halved and pitted. Cherries may be frozen

whole . . . or pitted.

Prepare the fruits as you would peaches. Remember to handle each piece quickly to prevent darkening.

If you want to eliminate the syrup and use a dry pack, pre-mix 2 level teaspoons of A-C-M, with 2 cups of sugar. This is sufficient for 4 one-pound packs of frozen fruit.

Add your sugar mixture to the fruit, mix thoroughly and package. You'll find you can preserve all the family's favorite fruits this same, simple way.

Two other points to remember: Use a sharp knife for peeling and slicing, and prepare the fruit for the freezer in small quantities.

A little time and effort this summer are all it takes. And you'll be able to surprise your family with fresh peach shortcake or blueberry pie for bright winter desserts.

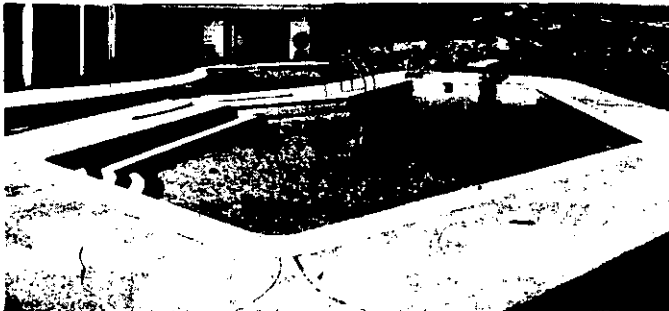

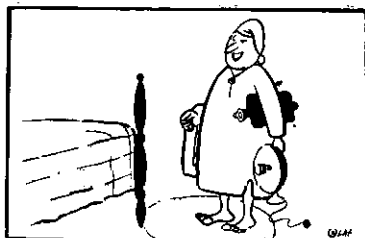
