Chief Blake Case of the Delmar Fire Department announces that rescue markers are available for placement on the homes of the aged, blind, bedridden and handicapped in our com-

These markers are made of a special red-and-black fluorescent material that will glow in the beam of a spotlight at night and attract the immediate attention of firemen in the event of fire. The markers will say, in effect, "Firemen, special care is needed here! An aged or handicapped person lives in this house." Faster, safer rescues will thus be possible, as the successful experience of other communities has shown.

There is no charge whatsoever for these markers. They are part of the volunteer Department's service to all of us. Anyone interested in obtaining them should call Chief Case at HE 9-1701 or one of the assistant chiefs: Charles Sutter, HE 9-9677: Edward Pakenham, HE 9-3522 or Paul Woodin, HE 9-1203.

One of these officers will then call at your home and place the markers on the front and rear doors and on the door and window of the handicapped person's room.

The adhesive backing of the markers sticks firmly to wood, metal or glass but pulls away cleanly, when desired, without marring the surface underneath.

Mrs. Everett Watson is chairman of a telephone committee contacting new families with children in the Junior High, encouraging them to attend this very important meeting.


