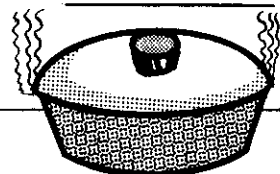

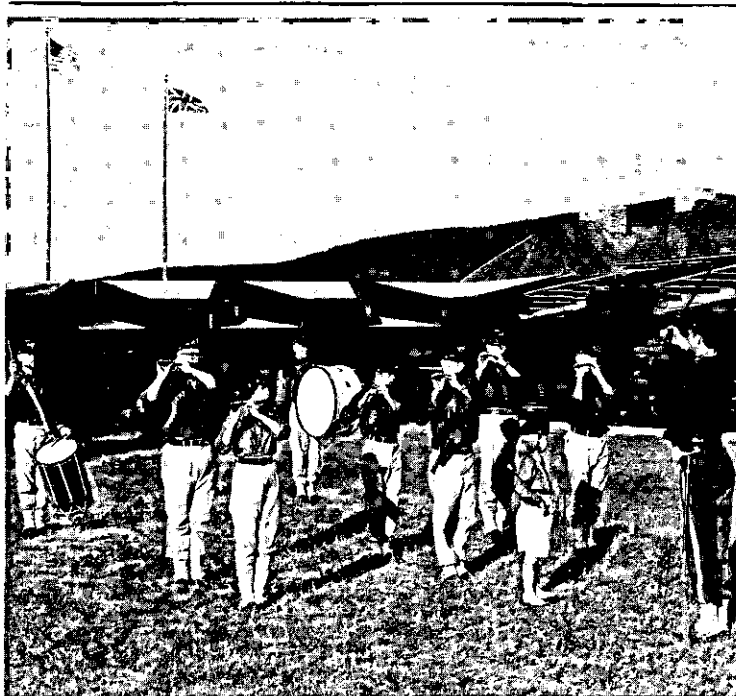

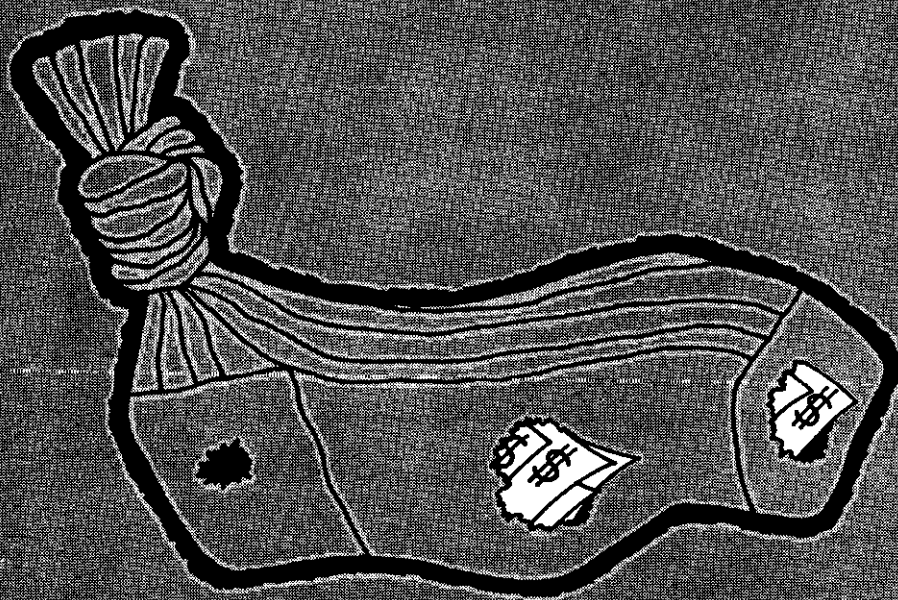

NEWS OF DELMAR FIRE DEPARTMENT

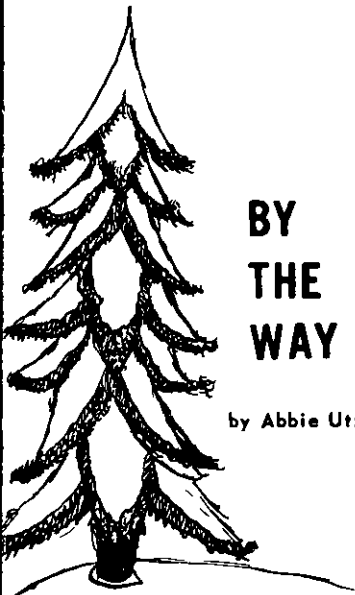
