MEMORIAL EXHIBIT OF PHOTOS BY FRANK GARDINIER

A memorial exhibit of photographs by the late Frank Gardinier of Elsmere, will open Thursday, Feb. 16 at the Delmar Public Library. Mr. Gardinier was president of the Delmar Camera Club at the time of his sudden death last December. This collection of his works will include prize-winning photographs that have had national recognition, many photographs that have taken first place in local competition, and portraits of well-known personalities including those of Governor Rockefeller and Mayor Corning. Besides portraiture, there will be photographs of animals, children, still life and sports.

Mr. Gardinier was a veteran of World War II, serving as lieutenant in the Signal Corps in combat in the South Pacific. He was awarded the Bronze Star, the Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, the Philippine-Liberation Medal with two bronze stars. After being discharged from the Army, he returned to work for the New York Telephone Company where he was an engineer at the time of his death. He gave liberally of his time to the Boy Scouts and was District Chairman of the Helderberg District. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Governors Medal of 1946, and was a past president of the Delmar Railroad Club.

He is survived by his wife, Fran, and two children, Lee and Karen.

The exhibit will be at the Library for more than two weeks, and it is hoped that the people of this vicinity will avail themselves of the opportunity to see an excellent and unusual collection of photographs. The exhibit is sponsored by the Delmar Camera Club.
