Freuden-(continued on page 2) The proposed change in the routes of the so-called Slingerlands and Delmar bypasses — with a possible intersection right smack in the middle of Slingerlands — has the whole Town buzzing.

According to residents' gloomy speculation, such a move might wipe out much of the community life of the hamlets (they are not actually villages) of Slingerlands and Delmar.

Hundreds of town residents gathered at the Senior High School last week to voice their near-unanimous opposition to the departure from the original routes which would have skirted Slingerlands and met near the intersection of New Scotland Road and the Voorheesville Road.

Mr. N. F. Ronan, speaking for the State Department of Public Works, confirmed the change from the original plan but added, reassuringly, that variations of 1000 feet or so in either direction were still possible.

A spokesman for the Town pointed out the need for arterial highways to facilitate traffic to and from Albany for the benefit of the entire Town, and expressed the hope that such highways would be built at a minimum of loss and inconvenience to the residents of the Town.

He added, "The action and decisions of the Town Board are always directed to furthering and, as far as possible, anticipating the desires as well as the needs of the townspeople."

Speaking from the platform, Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke said that the entire issue would be brought before the Town Board at its next meeting, on Feb. 15.

ing, a petition prepared by a group of residents was read. It objected to the new routes on the ground that they would "disrupt, dislocate and change the residential character of the community" and endanger the lives of the "many young children living therein." The petition asked for a return to the original road locations. It was given wide circulation after the meeting, signed by hundreds of residents and sent to Governor Rockefeller.

Said one of its authors: "I don't think any of us are against the construction of bypasses. We need them. We're simply asking for a return to the original



The principal source of funds for financing the Federal aid highway program is the 4¢ per gallon Federal motor fuel tax.




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
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# MRS. WINN, MRS. GANEY OFFER PROGRAM TO **PROGRESS CLUB**
