CHILD'S HOSPITAL CAMPAIGN SEEKS AID FOR NEW, NEARBY BUILDING

A campaign to raise \$650,000 for completing the construction of the new Child's Hospital is under way. The hospital has served many Tri-Villagers in the past and the new hospital, on Hackett Blvd., will continue to do so from a much closer location.

Child's Hospital's purpose is to serve people without regard to race, creed or color. It is *not* primarily a hospital for children. Founded in 1874, it derived its name from the Sisters of the Holy Child Jesus, an Episcopal Church order which was associated with the hospital.

The hospital will continue to provide the same type of service as it did in the old Elk St. building which was recently razed. Facilities will be available principally for eye, ear, nose and throat surgery, but beds will also be provided for care of long-term, chronic cases requiring compassionate nursing for which the hospital has been noted. 

Mrs. William Sprole, chairman of the Service announced that interviews for a new evening training class will be conducted March 6 through 9, from 7 to 9 P.M.

The training course will begin Tuesday, March 14, and will consist of 5 two-hour sessions from 7:30 to 9:30 P.M. on Tuesdays and Thursdays, followed by 10 hours of on-thejob training.

Gray Ladies and Gray Men perform a variety of services to release the regular staffs of hospitals for their important professional duties. The Gray Lady-Gray Man pledges to give either one half day or one evening a week. You will become part of the hospital team, performing such duties as feeding patients unable to feed themselves, wheeling patients to Xray rooms and clinics, playing games with individuals and groups, acting as translators and interpreters, etc. There is no age limit. Sometimes an older woman or man can do more in certain channels than the younger ones.

REPORT FROM CHRISTMAS FESTIVAL COMMITTEE

The annual meeting of the Bethlehem Community Christmas Festival Central Committee and Board of Directors was held Feb. 5, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Phear in Delmar.

The treasurer reported total receipts from the 1960 festival of \$1,570.15 which is \$116.47 less than in 1959 and \$436.08 less than in 1958. A good share of the money is expended for food, clothing, toys, dolls, etc. at Christmas time for families in want. The remainder is used for medical services throughout the year and for overseas children through CARE and the American Friends Service Organization.


CYO SKIERS HEADING
