BOUTELLE WINS PLACE ON BETHLEHEM SCHOOL BOARD

Lindsay M. Boutelle of 27 Lyons Avenue, Delmar, was elected to the Bethlehem Central School Board after a spirited campaign which brought out 2228 voters, highest for any school board election in the town's history. He succeeds Mrs. Catherine VanVolkenburgh whose term on the board expired this year and who was not a candidate for re-election.

Mr. Boutelle won election over two other candidates --Mrs. Robert S. Alexander, and Herbert G. Drew. None of the candidates had a majority of the votes cast at the first election following the board's annual meeting. In that vote, Mr. Boutelle received 637; Mrs. Alexander, 517, and Mr. Drew, 314.

Prior to a run-off election, Mr. Drew withdrew as a candidate, In the run-off, Mr. Boutelle received 1327 of the total vote, Mrs. Alexander, 881. There were 20 void ballots counted.

The new member joins the school board in July. He is associated with his father in the

practice of civil engineering and surveying in the Town of Bethlehem of which he has been a lifelong resident.
