# An Open Letter . . . Of Hope

Are you expecting a child or grandchild? Surely you must know of someone expecting. As soon as the new baby arrives, won't you remind your doctor or pediatrician to begin a series of simple urine tests? These tests may save the baby from mental retardation.

Recent articles in popular magazines such as <u>The Saturday</u> <u>Evening Post</u>, <u>Today's Health</u>, and <u>Reader's Digest</u> have been published about various types of mental retardation. One of the types mentioned is Phenylketonuria (PKU).

Many readers glance at these articles with no more that a brief skimming of the material. Too many, go along with the feeling that it couldn't happen to them, that there is no retardation in their family; others have retarded children, they don't. But retardation can hit any family.

What is PKU? Briefly, it is an inherited inability to assimilate properly one of the amino acids in protein, thus causing a build-up in the blood stream of a toxin and causing an arresting of brain development. As the condition progresses, severe mental retardation follows.

How can it be detected? There is such a simple answer to this that we now wonder why any child should be retarded because of PKU. From as early as the age of one week a simple urine test may be made on a wet diaper with a ferric chloride solution. This test naturally should be done by your doctor. It takes less than a minute to perform and its cost is a matter of pennies. It is recommended that the test be done on all new babies for at least the first six months of life.

Three years ago when our youngest son was born, PKU was barely being recognized. New, in the past year, many strides have been taken toward the publication of information on PKU. New, we feel, no child need become retarded due to Phenylketonuria because the recent publications and research have brought a greater awareness of its cause, detection, and control to the public and medical profession.

The Control. If the PKU test is positive, the child should be immediately put on a rigidly controlled diet. His main food is a special pharmaceutical preparation. The rest of his diet consists of a measured amount of fruits, certain vegetables, and certain cereals. The amount of food allowed each child is determined by the child's weight.

Is the diet effective? Most emphatically, yes. We saw our older boy, who was three at the time of detection, slowly gain the sense of balance he never had, show an interest in his surroundings, sleep through the night for the first time since birth, and generally become "alive." We saw our baby, who was nine months old at the time of detection, start to sit up unaided, pull himself up, stop staring into space for periods as long as seven to eight seconds without seeing any movement around him, and he too, became more and more alert. Without doubt, the baby has shown greater progress, but then the damage had not been Please Turn the Page



Chartering a plane for a visit to New York City recently, 70 women members of the Montreal Chamber of Commerce toured "behind the scenes" at Macy's Department Store, visited the National Design Center and gathered at luncheon to hear American businesswomen discuss the working woman's role in the United States. The State Commerce Woman's Program assisted in arranging their tour.

Secretary of New York State, Caroline B. Simon, in welcoming the club said, "taking our interests out of our homes and into business and government is important to women because loving our family, we want to make the community and the world in which they will grow, the best community and the best world that our working toward these ideals can help evolve..., more and more

women are beginning to take active part in our professions, in the general community and in government. Today a woman (in business) must look like a girl; must act like a lady; must think like a man; and work like a dog. It is my pleasure to tell you that here in New York State Government, women also have an important role and, through our Governor, we are being given the opportunity to play that role."

More Women In Banking --Discussing the career opportunities for women in the banking business, Miss Ruth Irish, Assistant Vice President of the Union Dime Savings Bank in New York City, and a Woman's Council member, appointed by Governor Rockefeller, noted that "in 1940 there were more men than women employed in banks and trust companies, whereas today there are twice as many women as men. About 12,500 women are officers of banks in the United States, an increase of 266% in women officers in the past 20 years." Miss Irish said, "Mr. Carl Bimson, past President of the American Bankers Association, who has 26 women officers in his own bank, believes that any woman who attains the rank of officer in the banking business has reached her position by being at least twice as efficient and capable as her male associates. "

Miss Irish continued, "In the National Association of Banking Women, which has a membership of over 35,000, all in executive or official positions in



banks, 10 women members are Chairman of the Board: 9 are Presidents; 20 are Executive Vice Presidents; 189 are Vice Presidents; and 269 are Associate Vice Presidents. Local Chambers of Commerce have found that women bankers can be valuable board members and dedicated workers for civic betterment "





Quantities were often omitted. An illustration in the famous translation, pictures a Pompeian bronze and marble table which could be lowered in height or collapsed to store flat, very similar to designs around today.

Among other unique books in the collection is a 1621 German book on carving; a 1688 London book on banquets with pages that open out to reveal the full banquet table laden with foods; and a 1749 French manuscript of a menu from the court of King Louis XV which includes amounts and costs of

Recipes are mixed in with household hints. Directions for grinding rice for flour to make rice puding follows a cure for rheumatism that included asparagus root, treacle and nettles.


