

AN OPEN LETTER TO A BOY

BY SYDNEY J. HARRIS Reprinted from the Chicago Daily News

This is an open letter to a boy, about 18, who forced me off the road while cutting in sharply and passing me on a hill yesterday afternoon:

Dear Son:

You may think you are a good driver, and perhapsyou are. But I'd like you to keep in mind that most of your "skillful" driving is due to other motorists.

Anybody can whip along the road as fast and as carelessly as you were going. There's no trick to that - the new cars are loaded with power and pick-up too much so, I'm afraid.

Just remember that it was my alertness that prevented an ac-



cident on the hill, not yours. And the driver who was approaching us also had to brake suddenly and swerve in order to save your life and his.

It is not your courage or dexterity that has kept you alive as long as this, but the prudence and politeness of other motorists. You have been trading on our good will and sense of self-preservation.

I wish it were possible to point out to you that your kind of driving is nothing but bad manners -it is not heroic, or adventurous or manly.

Suppose you ran down a crowded street, pushing people out of your way, knocking packages out 🖈 of ladies' hands and kicking children into the gutter. What would be so heroic, or manly about that?


Nothing of course. Then why do you suppose that having 2,000 pounds of steel under you makes it any better? There's nothing to be proud of in driving fast any fool can do that. It's a form of cowardice to threaten other drivers, not courage.

On the highway, most of all, it's easy to tell the men from the boys for the menhave to save the boys from the consequences of their foolish and needless bravado.


Telco Installs Emergency Gas Turbine Power Supply

The New York Telephone Company took another dramatic step today to assure customers here of completely reliable and uninterrupted telephone service -- even during storms.

Company manager J.F. O'Shaughnessy announced that preparations were already underway for the installation of a 1,100 horsepower gas turbine engine to be used as a stan by emergency power supply system.

The unit, scheduled to be installed and ready for operation early next year, will be located on the tenth floor of the telephone building e^{-1} 158 State Street.

The manager explained that the unit will have a completely automatic control system to enable the turbine to start on a signal should regular power fail. In the event of commercial power failures, such as those caused by storms, the

turbine will begin operating immediately to provide enough power to keep the telephone exchange working without interruption.

The unit will use diesel fuel stored in a 275-gallon tank placed next to the turbine. Two 10,000-gallon tanks stored underground will keep the smaller tank in constant supply.

Mr. O'Shaughnessy pointed out that the turbine was chosen because it offers several advantages over other emergency e-Paipment,

"As the cities grow and become more crowded, "the manager said, "older telephone exchanges, needing greater standby power output, find themselves without space for additional emergency equipment. The turbine's relatively small and compact size -- 1,250 pounds and 51 cubic feet -- in areas where space is at a premium."

He also noted that the unit can be run and checked without full load, is inexpensive to maintain, requires no warmup periods, and, because it is vibration free, eliminates the danger of damaging delicate telephone equipment.






HOME UNIT WINS 20 BLUE RIBBONS AT ALTAMONT FAIR

1. Rinse wet or soiled diapers immediately upon removal. Store until washing in a closed container filled with soapy water or disinfectant.

2. Three rinses in clear hot water before washing. Follow with four separate sudsings. In

must be lighter than for the usual family laundry --- not more than 16 diapers.

3. Six rinses in clear hot water to remove all soap and detergent. This is accomplished in an automatic washer by resetting the dial.

4. After washing and rinsing, sterilize diapers, boiling them 30 minutes.

5. Rinse sterilized diapers in vinegar-water: one cup of vinegar to a gallon of water to be sure diapers are not alkaline.

6. Wring as dry as possible then treat diapers, according to directions, with the special diaper antiseptic suggested by






