Ed Shouts, "Speak!"

To All Bethlehem Residents: As soon as the Lincolns announced their candidacy, there was a great hue and cry from the Old Guard, that the Lincolns' should have gone to the caucus. The Old Guard and and their sustainers went about town trying to create the impression the Lincolns had committed some sort of a sin, although they never dared say this publicly for the press to report.

As soon as the people were told the facts about the oneroom, two-ballot caucus, (in "The Lincolns Story") the Old Guard changed their tune and started to whisper that maybe the caucus should be abandoned in the future. Within a few days after this the Old Guard's laments about the caucus dissolved. They don't even use the word "caucus" anymore.

The "Old Guard" has no excuse for not giving Bethlehem residents the right to yote in secret in a Primary for the selection of party candidates for office. They know the Republicans have a primary in Guilderland and Colonie, as the Election Law permits. They know the only reason we have a caucus instead of a regular primary in Bethlehem is that the Albany County Republican committee has a special rule permitting it in Bethlehem and the smaller towns. They know they can request the committee to change its rules.

As usual, the Old Guard has followed its regular practice of making charges and promises in such a way that they cannot

UNICEF COLLECTION PLANNED FOR HALLOWE'EN, OCTOBER 31

The annual UNICEF collection will be held in the Tri-Village area on Hallowe'en, October 31. Children and youth of the churches will participate. Better coverage of the entire area is planned this year by dividing the area into 40 districts and the use of 35 automobiles. Only the youth will be transported in these cars. Children will collect earlier accompanied by their parents or friends.

Children may pick up their containers and identification tags at the St. Stephen Episcopal church from 4 to 5 o'clock. They may be returned at 7 o'clock for a costume party in that church. Containers will serve as their admission. Prizes for various types of costumes will be awarded.

Youth may pick up their con-

tainers and tags at the Delmar Methodist church from 6:30 to 7:30. They will be assigned to cars and will return at 8:15 for refreshments and dancing.

Money received from this collection is sent to the United Nations Children's Emergency Fund. The Rev. William Vigne of the Delmar Methodist Church is in charge of the Youth Division. The Rev. David Randles of the St. Stephen's Episcopal Church is in charge of the Children's Division.



KOHINKE CHARGES: "FISHER NAIVE," IN SPEECH GIVEN BEFORE REPUBLICAN WORKERS

Now I come to another matter upon which may third party opponent, Mr. Fisher, has dwelt repeatedly, apparently in the hope of smoke-screening his own lack of constructive ideas about the future of our town.

I refer to his attacks upon me because I have not ranted, at meetings of the Board of Supervisors, about the tax delinquency situation.

I ask the people to consider, first, that this criticism comes from one who aspires to administer affairs that touch upon every aspect of their living in the fine Town of Bethlehem.

Webster defines politics as the science and art of government.

It follows, and I believe the people will agree, that if one is to serve them effectively in government, including town government -- as I have tried to do-- one must be politically knowledgeable and politically practical.

The Albany County Board of Supervisors is controlled 35 to 4 by Democrats operating under an overwhelming majority.

Does my third party opponent, Mr. Fisher, believe that correction of the tax delinquency situation lies in verbal bombast by any one of a minority of 4 against a machinecontrolled majority of 35?

How politically naive can he be?

Is this a measure of the po-

litical practicality he would apply to advancement of public interests in the Town of Bethlehem?

The tax delinquency situation is for the most part the reprehensible product of the type of government imposed upon the City of Albany for years by the Democratic party. The need in this situation, spotlighted by the State and written extensively by the press, is not for ineffectual ranting by the slim minority of the Board of Supervisors.

The great need is for political action toward more equitable representation in the legislative bodies of the County and City of Albany.

That means constant, vigorous, united effort to strengthen our Republican Party in Bethlehem and throughout the country.

The greatest deterrent to that objective is the kind of partysplitting, party-weakening effort in which my third party oppenent, Mr. Fisher, is now engaged. The only beneficiary can be the Democratic party which alone is responsible for the kind of government that, in great part, bred the tax delinquency situation.

It is particularly ironic that the divisive activity of our third party opponents has been undertaken in the name of the man who reminded us a century ago that "A house divided against itself cannot stand."

We want to know why the Old Guard doesn't publicly request the County committee to change its rules so we can have a secret vote for Republican candidates in Bethlehem, If they really want a change. they should say so publicly. We challenge them to call a meeting of the Town of Bethlehem Republican Committee and take a vote on whether or not the caucus should be abandoned for a secret primary, and announce the vote to the public before Election Day.

Mr. Kohinke's statement reported in the Times Union on October 20, 1961 (we suggest you read it) is one of the most astonishing statements ever made by a candidate for public office. 

"naive" (as he does) every public official who had the courage to stand up and be counted against a majority vote. Think what would happen if his type of reasoning pervailed in the United States Senate, The House of Representatives, The State Legislature, and other governing bodies.

Why hasn't he said something about it before? The Governor and the Legislature are located right next door to us. Why hasn't he appealed to them for a correction of this distorted situation?


