Dear Sir:

I address the following letter to all the residents of the Town of Bethlehem in reply to a letter entitled "Ed Shouts, 'Speak!'"

To all Bethlehem residents: "Ed shouts," but he knows not of what he "speaks!"

The letter by Edward J. Adams, Jr., Lincoln candidate for Town Clerk, stirred me to write this letter and try and set the record straight on the caucus, the primary, and the procedure followed by our Republican friends in Guilderland and Colone.

In 1959, the voters of New York State approved an amendment to our Constitution which abolished local primaries, except where there was a contest for a particular office. (Nov. 3, 1959 election, amendment 5, approved by Bethlehem voters: 3314 - 2150)

I personally sat through two local primary days at Hama-grael School before this amendment -- one in 1955 and one in 1957 - and both were very

long. No Republicans came to vote at the primary and only two things were accomplished: 1. the bars were closed and 2. money was uselessly spent.

Obviously, the Legislature and subsequently a majority of the voters in this State felt that this performance was a waste also because it ended in 1959.

Section 149 of the Election Law now reads: "Uncontested primaries. All persons designated for uncontested offices or positions at a primary election shall be deemed nominated or elected thereto, as the case may be, without balloting."

The obvious and confusing question after studying this language is, "How can a person be designated and elected to an uncontested office to a primary election without balloting?"

In the Town of Bethlehem this means that pursuant to section 146 of the Election Law, "an unofficial primary" or "caucus" is the vehicle by which the Republicans designate and elect a person for an uncontested office without balloting. "Balloting" as used in section 149 refers to a secret ballot at a contested primary.

Section 148 of the Election Law, provides the party voters with the machinery for holding a contested primary, which is contrary to what the Lincoln's have led you to believe. This section and section 136 provide in substance that if at least 5% of the total number of voters enrolled in the party at the preceding election file a petition with the County Board of Elections not later than the fourth Tuesday preceding primary day (Section 191, Election Law specifies the seventh Tuesday before election day as primary day), than a contested primary is held regardless of a party caucus, the local committee, the county committee

rules, or anything else. But now you have to go out and get your 5% support for a contested primary, where before the constitutional amendment, the local primary "contest" was available as a matter of course.

Finally, let us examine how this so-called "secret" primary election operates in Guilderland and Colonie.

In both towns, the local Republican committee meets during the early summer, selects its candidate for the offices up for election, prepares designating petitions pursuant to section 135 of the Election Law, obtains signatures of Republicans numbering not less than 5% of the total registered Republicans, and files these petitions with the Albany County Board of Elections. If no petitions are filed with the Board of Elections asking for a contested primary pursuant to section 148 of the Election Law, then the slate of party candidates on the petitions are deemed elected by a primary election within the meaning of section 149. Simple isn't it! And not so secret either.

If this method were used in Bethlehem, there would have been no public meeting as we had at the caucus. Instead, the Republican committee

could have met, designated its present candidates, placed their names on designating petitions, quietly obtained about 300 signatures (about the number that attended the caucus) or about 23 signatures per voting district, filed them with the County Board of Elections, and that would have been the primary election for the Town of Bethlehem for the year of 1961 since our Lincoln friends didn't seek a contested primary.

Is this what all the shouting is about?

cause they don't know how. We, Republicans, The Lincolns can tell them.

"The Election Law provides that party nominations of candidates for Town and Village offices in any County shall be made in the manner prescribed by the Rules of the County Committee" --- that's quoting Miss Ruth Miner from the Old Guard's ad in the Spotlight of October 26, and she is right (Section 131(5) of the Election Law). The Albany County Republican Committee rules require a caucus in Bethlehem.

If the Old Guard will read further in Section 131(5) of the Election Law they will find it says that in any town:

political party elected to such county committee from such town may meet and adopt, by a two-thirds vote, a rule providing that its party candidates for town offices shall be nominated at the fall primary preceding election. . . ."

What that means is the Town Old Guard Republican Committee can meet and vote out the caucus!!

If they vote out the caucus, we can have a secret primary under Sections 136 and 148 of the Election Law, like the Republicans in Guilderland and Colonie. Also, if there is no opposition in the primary, there is no contest and no vote is required. The procedure is simple, fair and saves time.

If there is a contest, the vote is in secret in the election machine and not in the oppressive Old Guard one-room caucus. Although we have never had a primary election for the nomination of candidates for public office as far back as any one can remember, we have had secret primaries under the Election Law for the election of Republican Party Committeemen for many years. These primaries for Committeemen are held in the even-numbered years. There will be one in 1962, because there will be contests.

We ask the Old Guard to get up-to-date and be fair. Change the rule and permit all Republicans to contest for party nominations under fair rules as provided in Section 135 and 148 of the Election Law.

200 Workers Hear Republican Story at Recent Rally

A capacity crowd of over 200 workers for the Regular Republican ticket in the Town of Bethlehem turned out for a giant rally at the Republican Headquarters on Delaware Avenue on Friday, October 20th, according to Otto D. de Heus, GOP chairman.

The rally was opened with a review of the rumors and half-truths which have been injected into the Bethlehem campaign by the opposition third party.

Mr. de Heus complimented the Get-out-the-Vote committee and all the workers for their hard work and dedication to the task of continuing good government in the town. He expressed his confidence that the election would turn out a record Republican vote for the Regular Republican ticket, headed by Supervisor Bert Kohinke.

An analysis of the county tax delinquency situation was presented at the meeting, revealing the inaccuracies of third-party statements on this subject and underscoring the fact that the third party could best help to clear up this situation by joining in an organized campaign to strengthen the Republican Party in the County. It was pointed out that efforts to correct the handling of tax delinquency cases were instituted by the Albany County Republican organization following the release of information on the problem by the state comptroller.

Edward Rook, chief coordinator of the Get-out-the-Vote committee, also attacked the third party's figures on per-capita taxing in the Town of Bethlehem as compared with other towns in the county.

Committee Chairman Charles H. Redmond congratulated the host of workers present and added that there were dozens of "young" workers getting out the vote for the Regular Republican ticket. "If we are to be considered a part of the 'Old Guard of the GOP,' as young men and women interested in the continuation of good government in this town, we're happy to wear that label," Redmond said.

Bertram E. Kohinke Statement

Let us analyze that statement for a moment and do a little thinking about it.

In the first place, I think Mr. Fisher shows little regard for the intelligence of our voters if he expects them to believe that he retired from what I am sure was the far more lucrative managership of his company for the sole purpose of serving the public for a Supervisor's salary.

I don't know and I am not interested in what inspired Mr. Fisher's retirement.

Barring illness, however, the normal and usual reason for a person's voluntary retirement is his desire to shed responsibility, ease the demands on his time and generally to take things easy.

I think we have a right to make that very reasonable assumption in regard to Mr. Fisher's retirement. If not, and since Mr. Fisher himself has related his retirement to his candidacy, he should give us another reason for it.

If the people of Bethlehem can assume that Mr. Fisher retired for the usual reasons, how much stock can they put in his promise to be at Town Hall every morning at 8 a.m. and, as he says, to stay there until the job is done, an inference that it might be well into the night?

I am sure that Mr. Fisher agrees with Mr. Lincoln that you can't fool all of the people all of the time. He is just trying to fool enough of the people for the time being.

I have too much faith in the common sense of the people of our town to think that he is going to fool very many of them.

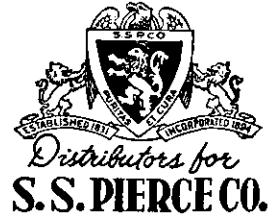

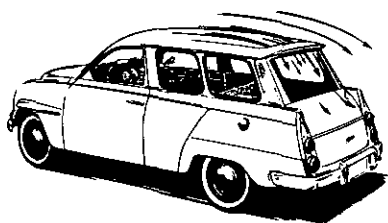

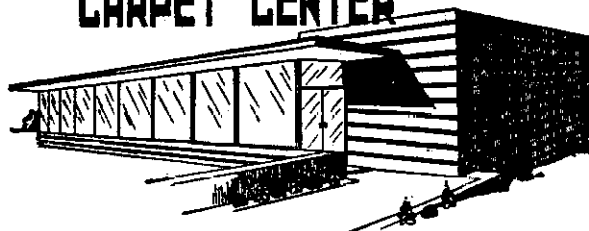

The Lincolns will open up the closed-circle of Town Officialdom and party leadership so that all residents of all parts of town may participate, express views and give advice and assistance to town officials and party leaders ----- and get results.

Douglas P. Bridge Statement

The Lincolns will explore every avenue for reduction of town costs. In the six years before Mr. Kohinke's regime, expenses for the General Town Fund excluding highways, lighting, water, sewers, and fire protection rose only 20%, or just over 3% a year. In the two years since Mr. Kohinke has been in, the same town expenses have risen 29% or almost 15% a year. Mr. Potter and Mr. Burton are not recorded as objecting.

The town budget item called Highway Fund - General Repairs rose from \$92,981 in 1951 to \$244,000 in 1961 -- an increase of 162%, and still the Town Board hasn't participated in the "Erwin Plan" for State Aid, although they filed a "plan" to do so in 1951.

The cost per person of General Town and Highway expenses in 1961 budgets was:

- Bethlehem - \$33.76
- Colonie ----- 15.95
- Guilderland-- 18.11

In 1960 a street-sweeper was purchased for \$13,473. Where

is it used effectively to make it that valuable to the whole town?

In 1960 two police cars were purchased. One was priced at \$3,155.95, the other at \$3,025.75. On the second one, even after deducting trade-in allowance, the net price was \$2,547.11. But any number of specially equipped Plymouth interceptors (the kind used by the State Police) can be bought by the town through the state for only \$1,938 -- over \$600 less. And the town can auction off its old car and keep the proceeds. Mr. Potter and Mr. Burton did not object.

The Lincolns will investigate all town expenditures, effecting such economics as the purchase of police cars through the State.

every part of the Town. All Lincolns' candidates have personally appeared and stated their program and views. We have attended many coffee klatsches and ridden in motorcades.

The Lincolns will seek State aid, to reduce highway repair costs and our taxes. The Town Board filed a plan for town highway reconstruction in 1951 whereby the State would have paid 25% of the cost up to \$9,000 per mile. They never followed through; never collected a cent. The cost for maintaining town highways in Bethlehem is \$1,528 more per mile than in Guilderland. It is \$818 more per mile than in Colonie.
