REPUBLICANS WIN AS LINCOLNS GARNER O FIRST TRY 3,000 VOTES IN DEMS FADE BY

The entire Republican slate in the Town of Bethlehem was returned to office in Tuesday's election. Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke led his party as a vote-getter, where all three parties had candidates, with 5, 281, while Edward ("Brud") J. Adams led the Lincolns with 3,513 and Katherine Herrick was high for the Democrats with 1,249.

It was the first time in memory that a second political party has received the backing given the Lincolns.

- Two conclusions might be drawn from this year's election:
- 1. The majority of the voters are satisfied with the government as provided by the Republicans

and

2. The Lincolns proved that their candidates and workers are vote-getters.

non-presidential election year. In 1960, 10,482 votes were recorded, 8,057 for Mr. Kohinke for Supervisor and 2,425 for the Democrat candidate.

Another interesting sidelight: In rolling up their 3,000-plus votes, the Lincolns cut the Democrat vote in half, which would lead to the conclusion that 50% of the Democrats have moved out of the township, or, some 1,200 votes recorded as Democrat in 1960 were really Republicans voting against their party.

An analysis of the chart below will show that the Republicans held their strength in the older parts of the township while the Lincolns showed their greatest inroads in the newer sections.

Brud Adams won over his opponents in the 8th and 11th Districts, the only Lincoln candidate to carry a district. The



High School Debate Club Starts Season Activities



A definite "proof of the pudding" is now on view at the Delmar Public Library. In an exhibition of art work of the children enrolled in the Helderberg Workshop, a three week Adventure in Learning of which Mrs. Robert Paulev was chairman, the results of the art instructions given are vivid scenes and charcoal drawings, which speak well for the idea behind this summer program. In an attempt at informal education for children in fields to which they are not normally exposed in their classrooms, the Workshop was organized by an independent group of parents who received permission of the Voorheesville school administration and board to use school facilities. 





I hate to see this kind of fear in a seven year old.



IF YOU WANT A JOB DONE

In America, as nowhere else in the world, women band together to offer their services freely for the betterment of their communities. The New York State Commerce Woman's Program says that more than 45 million women are serving as volunteers in one or more organizations throughout the nation. Their projects cover a wide range.

At the annual Woman's Day Community Service Awards luncheon during the New York State Fair this year, a multitude of community achievements was described. An Endicott Club sponsored a baby sitting course, complete with manual, for students. A Brooklyn group issued a directory of organizations in their area. A library was furnished at the Onondaga County Penitentiary and volunteer clerical assistance was provided in the Corning Health Clinic by Women's Clubs of the two areas. In Rochester, funds were raised to provide scholarships for deaf children, In Buffalo, braille books for visually handicapped children made possible their attendance in public school classrooms. Several groups made recreational facilities available to their community's Senior Citizens. Several offered programs to counsel women who wished to return to work. Local garden clubs in a number of towns turned their efforts to cleaning up their communities - painting rundown railroad stations and placing flowers and shrubery in business sections.

HOW FAR HAVE WE COME?


In 1948 women were given the right to own property. By 1958 they owned more than half the property in the nation. Yet there's much women have not yet achieved. New York State Assemblywoman, Dorothy Bell Lawrence, says it's time to weigh accomplishments. Speaking on Woman's Day surving the recent State Fair in Syracuse, she asked why are there only 4 women in the Legislature's 208 seats? Why are women of other countries. where their opportunities are less, accomplishing more than American women?

Dr, Ethel Alpenfels, an anthropologist and professor at New York University, noted that in India and Japan, women whose fathers and grandfathers were uncivilized natives, are now assuming active roles in their government and in industry. Mrs. Lawrence suggested the problem is two-fold -- that women of this country do not make their participation meaningful enough and that our nation does not include woman power in its growth potential. The State Commerce Woman's Program advises women's clubs to assume leadership in their communities, working for the safety, health and cultural improvement of the people.

Facilities for testing diabetes will be available to residents of the Tri-Villages on Wednesday, November 15, from 1 to 3 P.M. and 6 to 8 P.M.

The test is simple, quick, painless and free.

In Ravena, the date is Tuesday, November 21, 1 to 3 P.M. and 6 to 8 P.M. at the Ravena Office, Albany County Department of Health.

The test is available to everyone, but it is particularly important for those who are overweight, over 40 years of age, or related to diabetics.

Among the symptoms of diabetes are excessive thirst, excessive urination, loss of weight despite unusual hunger, intense itching, slow healing of cuts and bruises, changes in vision, eash tiring, and pain in the extremities.

The local drive is being conducted by the Medical Society of Albany County, The Albany County Department of Health and The Albany County Tuberculosis Association Inc.
