

"Glass Menagerie" to be Presented January 19 & 20

The cast has been chosen for the Slingerlands Community Players' next production, Tennessee Williams' drama "The Glass Menagerie," it was announced today by William Kraus, director of the play.

The drama will be presented Friday and Saturday nights, January 19 and 20, in the auditorium of the Bethlehem Central High School on Delaware Avenue in Delmar. Curtain time is 8:40.

The Williams play, winner of the Drama Critics Award in 1945, when it first was presented, calls for a cast of only four persons: Amanda, the mother who lives in dreams of a past that never was; her daughter Laura, crippled physically and emotionally; her son, Tom, who combines the qualities of rebel and poet, and also serves as narrator for the play; and Jim, a gentleman caller whose uncomplicated acceptance of life brings about a crisis in the family.

Appearing in the role of Amanda will be Zaida Johnson; Lis Cook will portray Laura; Bob Helwig will play the role of Tom; and Ralph Smith will appear as Jim.

The play, Williams' first major production, deals with a fatherless family who love, but cannot communicate with, each other. The Depression setting of the drama provides a stark background for the highly-charged emotional interactions. Unlike much of Williams' later work, "The Glass Menagerie" is relieved by flights of the fanciful and sentimental, which mute the harshness of the theme.

Mrs. Johnson, a past president of The Players, has appeared in a number of productions by the Slingerlands group

including "Death of a Salesman," "The Little Foxes" and "Morning's at Seven." She also is a member of the Quarto Theater, a group of four women who have presented programs before groups in many localities.

Mrs. Cook also has been an active Players member, having appeared in last year's production of "Juno and the Paycock" and in "Morning's at Seven." Her husband, Bob, is president of The Players this season.

Mr. Helwig, an English teacher at Guilford Central School, has appeared in a number of productions of the Albany State College Theater and the Arena Theater, as well as with summer stock groups.

Mr. Smith also has been active in Albany State College Theater productions. A teacher at East Greenbush Central School, he directed one play --- "Hope Is the Thing with Feathers" --- of the three-play "Kaleidoscope," the Players last production.

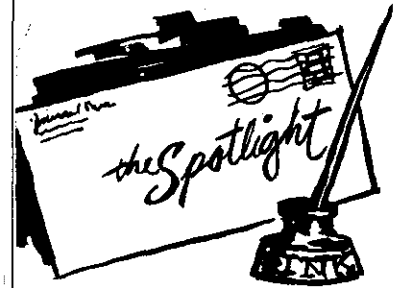
Mrs. Johnson, Mr. Helwig and Mr. Smith all appeared in a Slingerlands Players production which appeared locally on television last fall.

New Political Club Elects Charles Redmond President

Charles Redmond of 45 Louise Street, was elected temporary president and other acting officers were named Wednesday night at the organization meeting of the Republican Club of the Town of Bethlehem.

Other officers chosen pending an election at the club's first general meeting to be held February 15, were, Raymond Brownell, 7 Darroch Road, vice president; Edward Rook, 12 Greenock Rd., Elsmere, secretary, and Vincent P. Herzog, 11 LaGrange Rd., treasurer.

The Bethlehem Republican Club was incorporated last fall after approval of its formation, as required by law, by Albany County Republican Chairman Edward S. Conway and Supreme Court Justice Kenneth S. MacAffer.

The certificate of incorporation filed with the Secretary of State, lists as one of its purposes:

"...to teach and promulgate the principles of political and social conduct for which the Republican Party stands; to promote and strengthen the Republican Party in the Town of Bethlehem and in the County of Albany."

Among its goals, Mr. Redmond said, is to give Republicans of the town an opportunity to participate in the affairs of the party and, through an intensive educational program to inform residents of Bethlehem of the aims and achievements of the town government.

"By this active participa-

tion on the part of the Republican voters of the town," Mr. Redmond said, "an opportunity will be given them to further strengthen the "Good Government in Action" principle that has been a political hallmark of the Town of Bethlehem."

Incorporators of the club are Mr. Redmond, Mr. Brownell and Mr. Herzog, new temporary officers, and Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke and Town Attorney Arthur E. McCormick.

One of the first steps to be taken by the new club will be an organization drive in which every eligible enrolled male Republican in the town is invited for membership. This group will complement the Town Women's Republican Club which has been in existence for many years.

The club will hold eight regular monthly meetings during the year and has plans for a number of community-wide activities, including a family field day as well as the annual Republican Men's Steak Roast and Outing.

is portrayed. My personal satisfaction, and I must say that I am quite proud of it, is that every single office from up in the mountain district, down the Hudson, up the Mohawk and south west in the Schoharie section, every single office is graced with the Nativity Scene.

Please credit me with my White Christmas cooperation, my company Nativity settings but know that other younger men than I were responsible for the lovely Nativity Scene that graces your Bethlehem scene.

William E. Simmons of Slingerlands was newly elected President of the Child's Hospital of Albany at the Annual Meeting of the Board of Governors on January 8, succeeding Joe W. Gerrity of Loudonville who remains a member of the Board. Mr. Simmons previously served as Executive Vice-President. Two other Slingerlands residents were also elected: C. Emory Lochner was re-named Vice-President and Albert H. Harris, M.D., was continued as Secretary. Lloyd G. Briggs of Altamont and Frederick W. Kelley, Jr., of Loudonville were reelected Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer respectively.

The Hospital was formerly located on Elk Street. The property was sold to the State in June 1960 and the 70 year old building was razed. The new building at 25 Hackett Boulevard received the first patient in October 1961. With a bed capacity of 70, the Hospital is equipped to care for a wide variety of medical and surgical conditions without regard to the patients' race, creed or color. There are special beds for eye surgery, permitting patients to be operated upon without transfer to

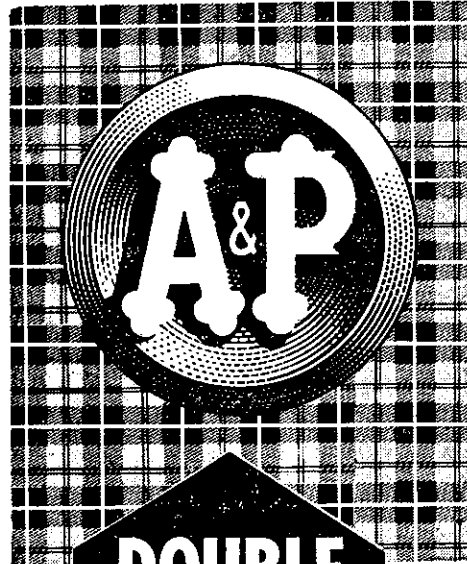

**Community Ambassador Time
Is Here Again!**

Candidates are now being sought to go abroad during the summer of 1962 as Bethlehem's Community Ambassador.

What is the Community Ambassador Project?

This project sends a representative of the Bethlehem community to live with a family abroad, to travel in that foreign country during the summer, and, during the year following his return, to share experiences with the Bethlehem community. Designed to promote international understanding, this nationwide project is jointly sponsored and financed locally by citizens and service organizations of the Bethlehem community, by the N.Y. State Adult Education Department, and by the Experiment in International Living.

New York State was the first sponsor of this program, and Bethlehem was among the early participants. In 1955, Jean Busch was Ambassador to Austria; in 1956, Bert Jablon of the Junior High School faculty visited Holland. In 1957, Bethlehem reversed its role and

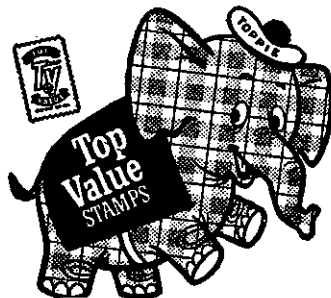

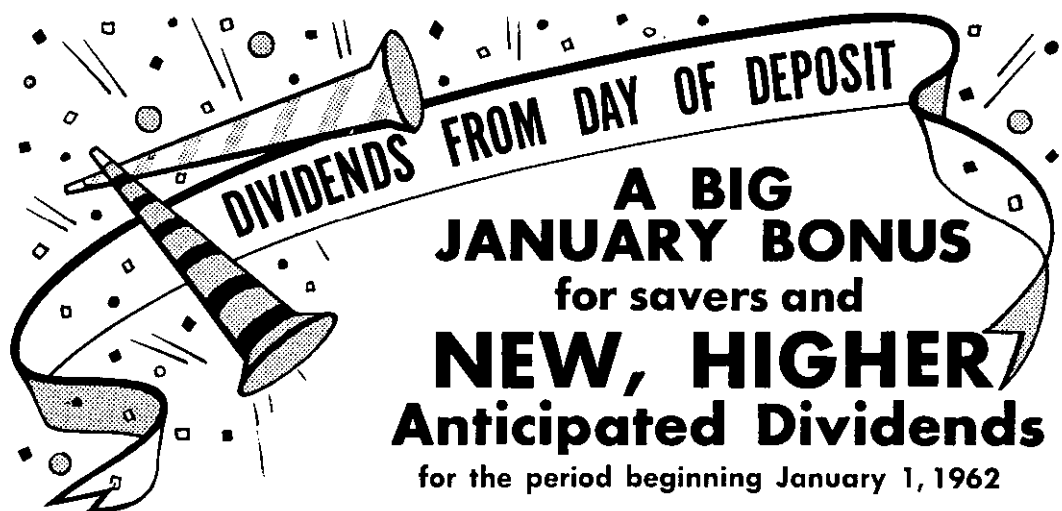
