



#### New Industrial Zones Set

The Town of Bethlehem has nine new industrial zones.

Following a public hearing on the nine industrial areas, the Bethlehem Town Planning Board unanimously approved measures setting aside six of the areas for heavy industry and three for light industrial 1158.

Areas zoned for heavy industrial use include:

Along the Hudson River from the Port of Albany to the Van Wies Point residential section to Route 144. Much of this area is now used for industrial purposes. Niagara Mohawk

Power Corporation's power plant, the town's largest industry, is there.

The Murray-Simon site, bounded by the New York Central Railroad tracks, the New York State Thruway and the Thruway's Berkshire Spur.

Four areas near the Selkirk vards of the New York Central Railroad. Two are along Route 32: another is southwest of the railroad yards on either side of Bells Crossing Road and the fourth straddles the railroad tracks between Route 32 and 9W.

The three light industrial areas are in the general vicinity.





#### LUCILLE WILLIAMS IS HONORED BY BETHLEHEM CHAMBER OF COMMERCE


In 1948, almost 15 years ago, a group of public-spirited businessmen, mostly located at the Four Corners, formed the Delmar Businessmen's Association. That association was the very first organization of businessmen in the Town of Bethlehem for the purpose of community betterment. One of the founders and original members of this association was a lady who even then was wellknown for her devotion to civic enterprises. She was elected as the first secretary of the Delmar Businessmen's Association. As a matter of fact, the Association never had any other secretary; our lady was always re-elected. 


