Seems like I pulled the cork on a well-fermented jug.

First, several parents are heard from who have had worse experiences than the one I complained of, and now a resounding volley from the "enemy."

Mr. Auerbach's opening statement in his letter published in your May 31 issue begins, "I humbly submit . . . "

But that is the last humbly I can find in it. His choice of adverbs was hasty.

My major complaint, outside of poking a bit of fun at the pomposity of the reports we receive from time to time on the progress of our young, is the simple, easily verified fact that my children do not know how

to write. The young one in particular, but they all show a lack of skill which indicates that the substance of whatever penmanship courses they study must be deficient. Not the teachers, mind you, but the substance of the courses!

Mr. Auerbach finds in this objection nothing to criticize, or at least no defense of the present program was offered.

Instead, he recommends me to a qualified counselor, suggests that my communications with my offspring are deficient, and infers (I mean assumes, you educators) that we are out of contact with our children's teachers. And that in voicing a complaint in public about an apparent defect in our educational system, I am indulging in a "personal emotional catharsis,"

Sounds to me like he worked off a pretty good purge, himself.

Just for the record; communications with my young are lucid if monosyllabic; my primitive attitude on simple rewards and punishments together with love and understanding seems to be producing people a cut above the average in manners, behavior, and performance; our contact with teachers has been so pleasant that they often return without a problem to discuss; and if

the new procedures Mr. Auerbach mentions in parent-child communications perform like some of the other things I have complained about, I'm not sure I'm interested. I'll stay primitive.

I may be guilty of a misjudgment, but I get the distinct feeling that in Mr. Auerbach's letter the Voice of Authority is chiding a vocal upstart and restoring him to his place at the end of the line.

Nothing is so hard to raise successfully as a child. Most parents know this; know that the routine duties of making and keeping a home chew up most of their available hours and leave precious little time for the principal reason for the home - its children.

So they hire competent professionals to take over in areas where they are unable or unqualified to perform. They hire them, Mr. Auerbach, and they pay them, and they have a right to expect results. And if they chide them, they have a right to expect a constructive

response, if a response is called for.

Criticism is a lot easier to produce than results, but this applies both ways.





Our Bethlehem Central system can easily slide into the quagmire of mediocrity by paying their teachers mediocre salaries, and every citizen whether parent or not - will be the loser.







Summer Session at Vincentian

The 29th annual session of the Vincentian Summer High School will be conducted for high school pupils who want to continue their work.

The buildings and facilities of Vincentian High School will be used. A corps of excellent teachers who have an intimate experience with Regents examinations has been recruited, and the school will be open to boys and girls of all races and creeds.

Any school pupil may be enrolled in Vincentian Summer High School provided he presents a written recommendation of permission from the principal of the school he attended during the preceding term. The recommendation must include the title of the course or courses for which the pupil may enroll, the name of his home school and the signature of the home school principal or his deputy.

The regulation does not apply to war veterans or adults, school officials said.

READING SUMMER SCHOOL

A summer school in reading will be conducted in the Bethlehem Central District for children who will be entering grades 2-12 in September. Classes of one hour will meet daily (Monday-Friday) between the hours of 9:00 and 12:00 in the Delmar Elementary School.

TWO NEW PROGRAMS AT JUNIOR COLLEGE OF ALBANY

Two new programs, within the area of Liberal Arts, will begin at the Junior College of Albany this September, it was announced by Dr. W. Robert Holmes, Dean. The programs are Pre-Physical Therapy and Pre-Law. With the addition of these programs, the number of areas of study at the Junior College will total six, all of which are two-year, Associate degree programs. The other offerings available are: Liberal Arts, Business Administration, General Business, Secretarial Science.

Both the new Pre-Physical Therapy and Pre-Law programs were organized with the assistance and cooperation of baccalaureate colleges working in these fields. The addition of these programs broadens the possibilities of diversification in college work for the Capital District Area student who finds it necessary to do at least part of his college work near home.

The Pre-Physical Therapy program is basically the liberal arts course with an emphasis on laboratory sciences and related fields.

The Pre-Law program is based on the same liberal arts study, but emphasizes more strongly the social sciences such as sociology, psychology, government, history and economics. Laboratory science and mathematics are also required.



History of Mildred Elley

THRUWAY OF POWER IS NOW IN OPERATION

Ceremonies marking the completion of a 345,000-volt "Thruway of Power" from Utica to Yonkers, were held recently along the new transmission lines at the nearby Dutchess County community of Pleasant Valley. The new circuits will permit the state's two largest electric companies to quadruple their ability to exchange power.

More than 150 industrial, business and civic leaders from all parts of the state took part in the symbolic occasion at which Charles E. Eble, president of Consolidated Edison Company of New York, and Earle J. Muchold, president of Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation, officiated.

The new facility spans the 220 miles from Utica to New York City. New York State now has a 345,000-volt electric transmission backbone which links New York City and Upstate New York with unprecedented transmission capacity. Just 30 years ago this month

the two companies completed an earlier interconnection at approximately one-third the voltage of the new system.

As a feature of the formalities, Mr. Eble and Mr. Machold, acting as "groundmen" for lineman working high in a transmission tower, hoisted canvas bags containing golden bolts used to link the final segment of the extra high voltage circuits.

Brief talks followed a luncheon on the grounds of the Pleasant Valley substation where Con Edison's, Niagara Mohawk's and Central Hudson Gas & Electric Corporation's systems join.
