Registration for all Adult Recreation activities will be held tonight (September 20) at the Bethlehem Junior High School between 7:30-9:30 P.M.

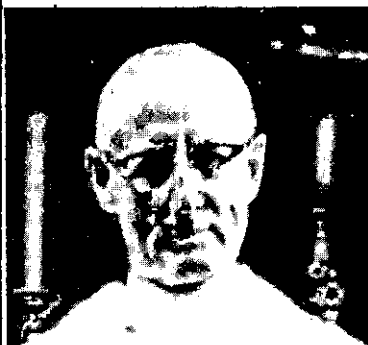

Activities will be scheduled after the September 20th registration. All registered persons will be contacted by the class instructor and given details in regard to cost, day held and location.

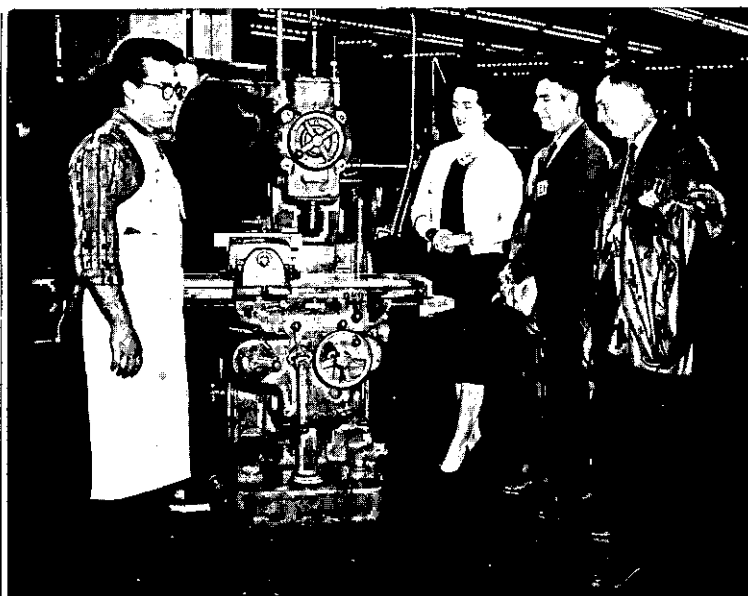
Teaching Mission Set At St. Stephen's

ENTIRE TOWNSHIP TO BE ZONED SOON

The Planning Board has prepared an overall plan for zoning the balance of the entire Town. Consideration is being given to the best use of the land, and diversification to help provide a balanced tax structure.

The original Zoning Ordinance was put into effect December 15, 1944, and was considered at that time a milestone and a first in this area. The results of this advanced planning and zoning are definitely reflected in the unique position and high regard that the Town of Bethlehem now enjoys regarding a highclass, well-planned community. This desirable condition is a result of the planning and the administration of the various ordinances by the Town of Bethlehem. The Commerce Department of the State of N.Y. will cooperate with the Planning Board on the necessary revision to our ordinance, as they view it. This is a plan that has been under consideration for several months.

The Planning Board is charged with the responsibility and is continually aware of the good results in good planning, and has recommended from time to time changes in the various ordinances and additional areas to be zoned for particular uses in line with a well thought-out plan. To broaden its activities, the addition of a recognized authority on this subject may be made or may become an adjunct to the Planning Board to review and recommend any additional changes felt necessary to maintain leadership in this field. In view of the tremendous growth taking place, it is felt necessary that additional help will continue to keep the Town of Bethlehem outstanding in its achievements regarding zoning by reviewing its history and projecting its use.

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT WARNS FARMERS TO WATCH FOR SILO GAS - IT'S DEADLY!

The drought has brought another problem - SILO GAS - to Albany County farmers and it is a deadly serious one Norman C. Kidder, County Agricultural Agent, warned today.

"A confirmed report of silo gas has been received from one central New York County and conditions throughout the state indicate more can be expected."

Corn, oats and sorghum tend to accumulate nitrogen and release it when ensiled. When these crops are grown on soils very high in nitrogen they are most likely to produce these

gases. Drought, shade, cloudy weather, and sometimes frost may cause the plants to accumulate excess nitrogen, the agent, Prof. Ralph Krensin, and Madison Wright, Cornell crop specialists explained.

Silo gas is the breakdown product of excess nitrogen in the plant tissue. This gas is a killer Kidder, Krenzin and Wright cautioned. "When it is inhaled, nitric acid forms in the lungs and may severely damage the lung tissues. Even brief exposures can cause death."

Indicators that poisonous gases are forming in the silo are:

Odor similar to hypochlorite used in bleach and dairy disinfectants.

Burning sensation in nose and throat; choking in severe exposure.

Yellow or reddish brown gas flowing down silo chute. One of the gases, however, is colorless. These gases are heavier than air and settle in the low area in and around the silo.

They said the following safeguards can protect the dairyman and his stock against these gases:

Run silo blower 10 to 15 minutes before entering silo or silo chute during the filling period and during the first 2 or 3 weeks after filling.

Leave doors and windows of silo room open during and after fillings.

Leave the silo area at once

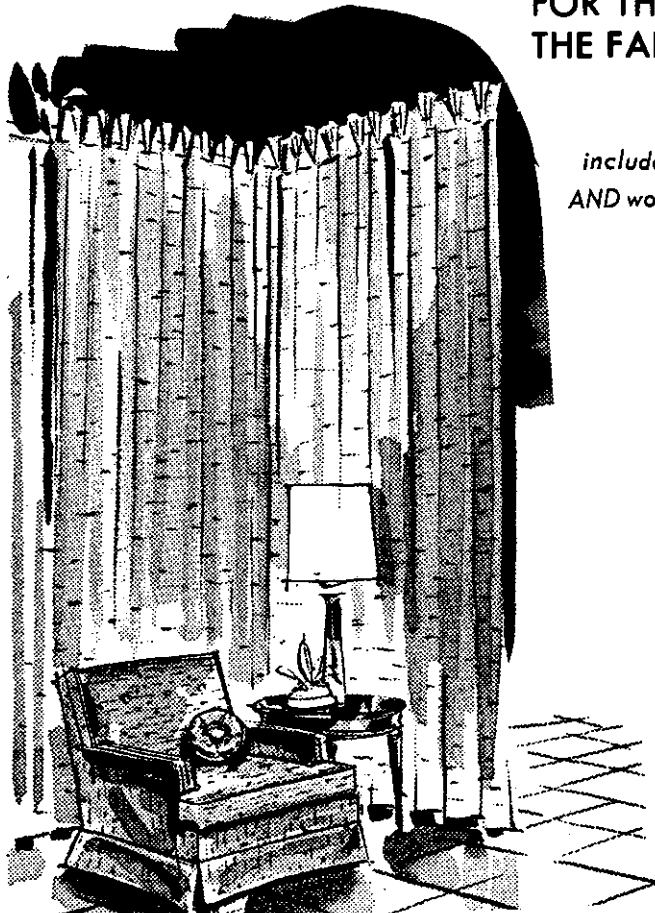

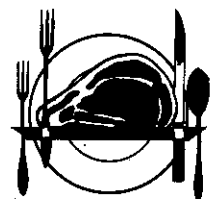

whenever burning or choking is felt in the nose and throat; and move cattle and other stock out of danger area.

Then call the doctor immediately in the event of accidental exposure. Do not be deceived by an apparent "recovery" shortly after exposure to these gases.

These precautions are recommended for all dairymen regardless of the effects of drought or heavy fertilization on their crops. Such conditions as shade, cloudy weather or frost also contribute to the formation of these gases.

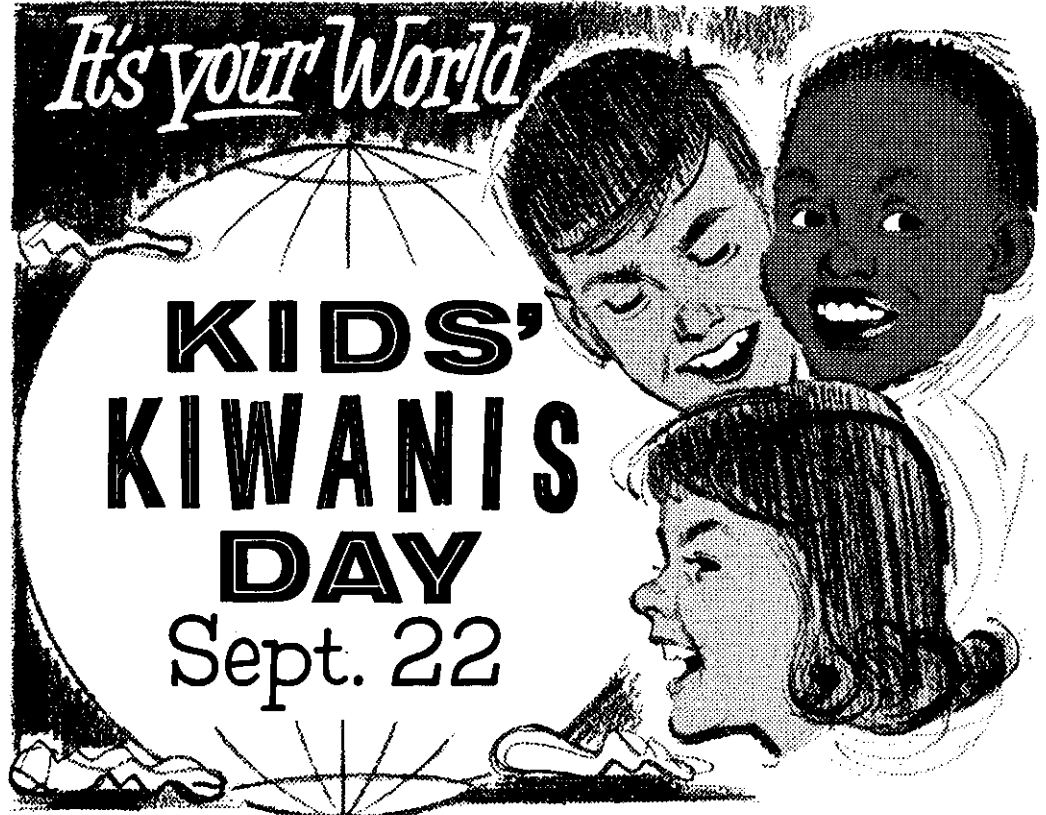

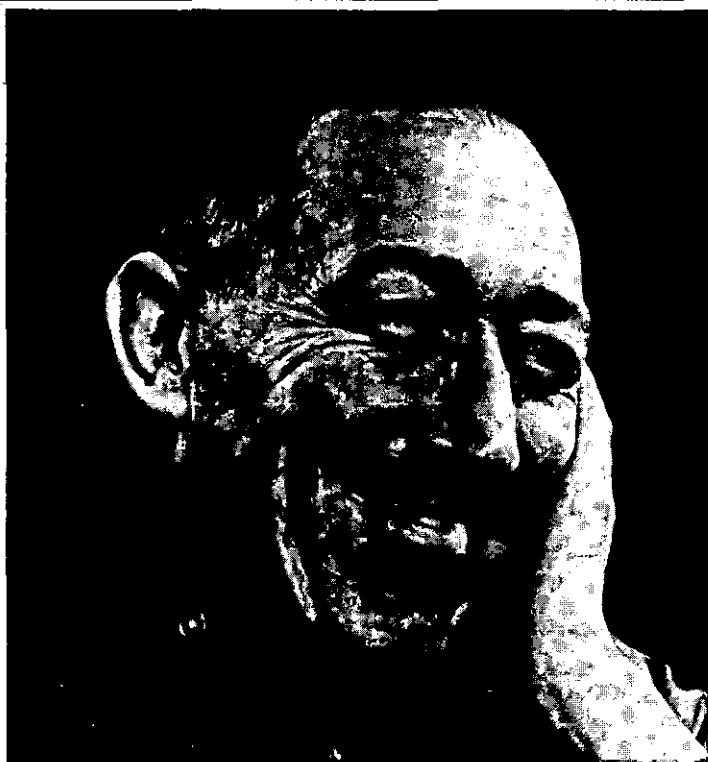

DIAPER HYGIENE: 6-12 Months

Six to 12 months of age is an important period in baby's life. At six months baby is

expected to double his birth weight and at 12 months, triple it. He graduates to overalls and learns how to sit, creep and pull himself to his feet. He may be able to say "mama" and "daddy," wave bye-bye and play pat-a-cake.

By this time baby's diet should include substantial amounts of solid food, especially the essential high protein foods such as egg yolk, cereals, soups and strained meats. This change in baby's diet brings us to the purpose of this column, the fifth in a series by baby care counselors on maintaining good diaper hygiene during baby's entire diaper wearing

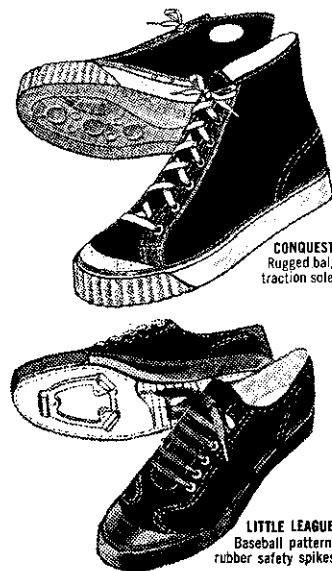

age.

The high protein foods that are now added to baby's diet are also the foods that increase the strength of baby's urine and the amount of rash-causing ammonia. During this age, red scald on the buttocks and even on the thighs become fairly common. The high protein foods also increase the amount of baby's urine. The quantity of urine baby now passes at one time is enough to thoroughly soak the diaper, not merely dampen it as when baby was younger.

During this period, there should be no relaxation in the fastidious diapering routine you followed when baby was younger. Diapers should be changed with the same promptness as before. Baby's diapers should also be properly processed and treated with a special diaper antiseptic that inhibits the

breakdown of baby's urine into harsh skin-irritating ammonia. If you use a professional diaper service, baby's diapers are given a complete scientific treatment based on all the mandatory steps required for proper diaper processing.

The danger of bacterial infection through skin damaged by diaper rash, plus the normal hazards of plain dust and dirt, increase as baby wins the freedom of the floor and the lawn. It is quite impossible to keep everything sterile that baby wants to investigate. Here's one precaution to keep in mind should baby's skin be invaded by a rash. To help control the rash, sterilize the diapers by boiling for 30 minutes. Diapers processed by a diaper service need not be boiled as they do not contain germs or irritating substances.

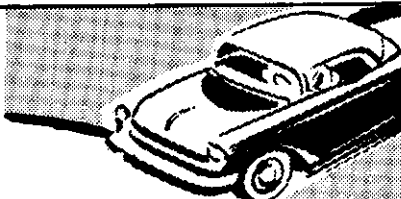

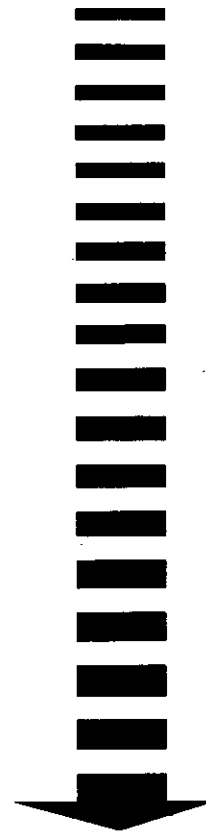

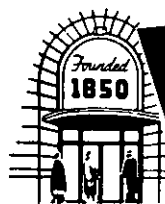
