

LETTER

Gentlemen:

A few minutes before the polls opened for balloting in the recent elections to choose members for the water and sewer commissions in the Town of Bethlehem, I chanced to read a letter in the then-current SPOTLIGHT complaining that these elections had been allowed to materialize without proper prior publicity by the incumbents, and that as a result each ballot carried only one name.

I checked at the polls and found this to be the case. However, a space was provided for a write-in candidate, and after some reflection I decided to put in my name and persuade several friends and acquaintances to do likewise for me.

I feel very strongly that a ballot which contains only one name, or only one choice, is a tool of governments whose philosophies are different from ours. Granted that election to the offices under discussion is not politically very sensitive, nonetheless if one name is all we need for water commissioner, then perhaps someone might feel one name would be all we would need on the ballot for the Presidency, for example.

As I later discovered, our local officials had followed the letter of the law, and had published notice of the impending election in accordance with legal requirements.

This shifts the responsibility, but does not affect my point at all. Although strictly legal, it certainly wasn't effective notice, as virtually no one to whom I talked, who was not associated with officials presently in power was aware that an election was being held. Organized opposition was caught napping. Hence my action.

Mr. Geurtze, the successful candidate for the water commission, wondered publicly in your columns what I would have done if I had won both offices. The prospect of this dual responsibility appears to concern him. Assuming that



I may or may not seek or win a political office in this community, but I feel I have a chi e ved my first purpose, which was to create an awareness that opposition should and does exist to unilateral action at the polls, no matter who is responsible; and there is a very small but recognizable dent in the local governmental machine to prove it.






