The rink has been carefully prepared by Henry Voorhees and other Legionnaires, and excellent skating has prevailed on many days of the winter thus far.


Church Women Elect

Dr. Arthur W. Pense to Retire on February 6

Dr. Arthur W. Pense of Delmar, Assistant Commissioner of Mental Hygiene since April 1, 1944, will retire February 6, it was announced today by

State Commissioner of Mental Hygiene, Dr. Paul H. Hoch.

Dr. Pense, 63, is in charge of the state's Office of Mental Retardation which coordinates all mental hygiene programs for the retarded.

Dr. Pense is widely recognized as an outstanding administrator in the mental retardation field and has received several awards from retardation groups in New York State. In recent years, he has spurred the development of local services for the retarded under the state's community mental health program. He is the author of a number of papers on mental retardation.

Commissioner Hoch, in announcing Dr. Pense's retirement, praised him for his more than 36 years of "outstanding service" to the people of New, York State.

"Few people in state government have given such wholehearted and unstituting devotion to their duties as has been given by Dr. Pense," he said. "His services as an administrator and a leader, especially in the field of mental retardation, have been invaluable."

Dr. Pense is married to the former May Beatrice Wiggins of Brooklyn. They have three children. He resides with his wife at 42 Herrick Avenue, Delmar, N.Y.

Dr. Hoch said that Dr. Pense will be available for consultation to the department on mental retardation matters.


