A group of homeowners residing in the Delaware Avenue area decided last week to form an association whose objectives would be to investigate the status of planning in the Town, provide representation for homeowners in Delaware Avenue zoning matters, improve the appearance of Delaware Avenue, minimize traffic congestion, and increase support for local business.

PAIRED SCHOOLS OPPOSITION GROWS

Opposition to "paired schools" in Delmar continues to grow, according to a statement this week by H. W. Tomlinson, chairman of "Citizens Opposed to Paired Schools in the Tri-Villages."

"It is becoming more and more evident, "said Tomlinson, "that an increasing number of Delmar residents are against changing the present "neighborhood school" for the "paired school."

The paired school arrangement would not affect the kindergartens, but would channel primary children from Delmar, Elsmere and Slingerlands schools into either 1-3 or 4-6 schools.

PUBLIC HEARING ON DRIVE-IN MARCH 20

A Public Hearing will be held by the Bethlehem Board of Appeals on March 20, at the Town Hall, to consider the Appeal by a group of Plymouth Avenue residents from the granting of a building permit to construct a "Carroll's Drive-In in Elsmere.

Formal Notice of Appeal was recently filed by the residents and the date of the Public Hearing was set by the Board at its February 6 meeting.

The residents claim that the establishment to be erected by Carrolls is not a restaurant as that term is used in the zoning ordinances. They claim that the building inspector should not have granted the permit. The petitioners also claim in their Appeal that the public health, safety, and general welfare of the area will be seriously affected if construction is allowed.

The Appeal was filed by Attorney Edward J. Grogan of Delmar, who represents the Plymouth Avenue residents in the Appeal.

Carroll's Drive-In plans to build on Delaware Avenue between Plymouth Avenue and the Delaware Plaza. It is in the same general area as the proposed car wash. The Carrolls firm already has four establishments in the area. One on Broadway, in Menands, Albany-Schenectady Road, Western Avenue, and Route 7 in Latham.



Holmgren Says "Paired Schools" Tabled for Investigation

Ralph Holmgren, President of the Bethlehem Central School Board, said yesterday that the Board would not reach a decision on the "paired school" proposal for the district until it had investigated all elements involved in the suggestion.

At a meeting of the Board in the Bethlehem Senior High School on Wednesday night, a committee of school principals answered questions and explained their evaluation of the plan. They had submitted a report to the Board on their study of "paired schools" in several other communities in New York State.

"We now have a better understanding of the educational pros and cons of the proposal," Mr. Holmgren said. we reach a final determination. we want to look more closely into the financial elements involved in the plan, and we want to give parent groups an opportunity to present their considered views. We will welcome any constructive comments from any segment of our school community."
