Funds for this worthy and exciting adventure are contributed by community organizations and raised by the Project which sponsors the Children's Film Festival held each Friday night.

The Children's Film Festival, planned at the Project's first fall meeting, was initiated Friday evening, February 1. The acceptance of these carefully selected, thrilling but non-violent films has been overwhelming.

At the first film presentation Mrs. Negley Norton, chairman of the festival, was forced to announce "standing room only" fifteen minutes before the show started. Supervised by interested adults and representatives of organizations cooperating with the Project the children squealed with delight with the

circus excitement of Toby Tyler. On February 8 the adventures of Gulliver thrilled the young audience as they travelled into the land of the big and little people. These films will continue each Friday evening through April except for February 22.

Due to the overwhelming acceptance of the festival it was necessary to schedule all future shows at the Junior High School so that traffic would not be tied up on Delaware Avenue and all the children would be able to be seated.

In addition to continuing its Children's Film Festival next fall, the project has also made plans to offer an Adult Foreign Film Festival which will bring the most outstanding of films to Bethlehem.

ASSOCIATION INVITES EVERYONE INTERESTED TO JOIN FOR BETTER COMMUNITY PLANNING

The Delaware Avenue Area Association, comprised primarily of homeowners in the area interested in working toward carefully planned growth and development of the community, is moving ahead rapidly with plans for expansion of the group to include all interested residents.

At a meeting held at the home of acting organization Chairman Robert J. Biggane, 34 Euclid Avenue, last Wednesday, the Committee laid plans for an opening meeting to be held at the Elsmere Elementary School at 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, March 13th. The meeting will provide a forum for discussion on the Association's objectives, among which are offering its assistance, through investigation, study and consultation with recognized specialists, to those concerned with planning, zoning and orderly community growth.

A spokesman for the Committee observed that "Although we are extremely interested in the controversies which have grown out of proposals for installation of an automatic car wash and a drive-in hamburger stand at Delaware and Euclid Avenues, these are only specific segments of the overall problem - the need for long range positive planning to preserve the residential-professional-business atmosphere of our growing community."

Although comprised primarily of homeowners, the Association has indicated a strong desire to include area business people within its ranks and emphasizes its positive interest in strengthening the growth of old and new businesses in the area. Particular interest was expressed by group members in the fact that the Town's Planning Board has directed a study, currently underway by a professional planner, of the Town's present Zoning Ordinance.

4-H CLUB TRACTOR MAINTENANCE PROGRAM STARTS AT HANSEN'S EQUIPMENT IN CLARKSVILLE

The 4-H Club Tractor Maintenance Program started on February 19 at Hansen's Equipment in Clarksville.

Included in this program of maintenance is safety procedures, lubrication and oils, ignition, carburetor, power transmissions, tire care, valves and timing plus other adjustments that are necessary for an efficient operating machine. Boys who have completed the first and second years will study the operation and adjustment of harvesting machines, plows, harrows, seed planters and other machines.

Any boy who drives or works around a tractor is invited to join the group, whether he is a 4-H member orinot. However, he will need to have access to a tractor in order to complete the work.

Safety of operations will be stressed in all phases of the program.

The instructors will be John Yarmchuk, Steven Komjathy, and Maver Becker.

There are three more meetings scheduled, March 5, March 12, and March 19. Those completing the work will be eligible to take part in the Operators Contest at the Altamont Eastern Regional Exposition next summer, where two will be selected to represent the county in the State event.

Petition on Paired Schools

A petition by Delmar residents containing 832 names was presented to members of the Bethlehem School Board and other interested parties over the

weekend by the Citizens Op-

posed to Paired Schools in the Tri-Villages.

In addition, according to H. W. Tomlinson, committee chairman, a 21-page critique of the proposed paired schools

concept, and a four-page memorandum in support of retaining the present Kindergarten-Grade 6 system, was also presented.

Conclusions reached in the critique of the proposed paired school concept include:

- 1. A great many of the "advantages" stated for the "paired" school are present in the existing "neighborhood" school.

 2. Most of the "advantages"
- stated for the "paired" school could be instituted in the existing "neighborhood" school through supervisory attention, changes in procedures and the expenditure of substantially less
- money than would be required to establish "paired" schools.
 3. The advantages of CHANGING to the "paired"
- school plan have not been supported by conclusive facts.

 4. An incomplete and unacceptable statement of additional costs has been submitted. It seems inexcusable, for exam-

ple, that the physical cost of remodeling has not been estimated since the publication of the first report.

5. Certain of the conclusions, listed as advantages, are contrary to the facts submitted.

6. An evaluation of the values of the present "neighborhood" system has been completely ignored.

7. Desires of parents or taxpayers have never been evaluated.

On Saturday, March 9, two basketball games, sponsored by Bethlehem Recreation and the High School Canteen Council will be played at the Senior High School.


