Dr. Bartlett to Speak Here



The Anniversary Committee of the Delmar Public Library is learning much about the community these days. Kind borrowers and friends are bringing in snippets of history which have been lost sight of, often even by the owners themselves. Through the thoughtfulness of Mrs. Harvey Van Dusen, a copy of the first directory of Delmar, titled A family directory of Delmar, N.Y., compiled by the Delmar Progress Club, June 1913, has been loaned to the Library. One of the many projects undertaken by the Progress Club, this booklet was compiled by a committee of ladies from the Club and printed and presented to the club by C.F. Williams with the intent of proceeds from its sale being used for the benefit of the then Delmar Free Library.



"Paired Schools Not Better"



Slingerlands Unit to Meet





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

How fast do you talk on the telephone? If you're a good speaker, you're probably rattling along at about 125 words a minute.

That's about as fast as words can be formed so they'll be clearly understood on the other end, according to college speech instructors surveyed by the New York Telephone Company.

"Much faster than that, " says Frank B. Hanson, who teaches speech at City College in Manhattan, "and words tend to blur. When that happens, conversations get out of hand."

The instructors cited some examples of what happens when sounds are run together. A question, "On Thursday?" is liable to produce the answer,

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"No, I'm not thirsty." Or, "We need art work" may bring the retort "What do you mean by hard work?"


Though poor enunciation can generate, some laughs, it can be troublesome too when you're trying to communicate with someone. Instructors agreed that misunderstandings can be avoided if people speak slowly and form words carefully.

Their thoughts are echoed by J. F. O'Shaugnessy, New York Telephone Company manager. But he points out that his interest is not wholly academic. When people misunderstand each other on the phone, he says they're likely to blame the phone circuits.

"We check each complaint carefully, and by and large we find the problem is more often poorly formed words, rather than poor circuits," he said.

Telephone circuits – whether long distance or local – are designed to carry words spoken no louder than normal conversation level. Shouting distorts sounds and are as hard to understand as whispered tones. Both would produce a blurred jumble of words.

"It's also important to speak with the lips about one-inch



from the mouthpiece and with the receiver close to the ear," he said.

"Talk slowly and clearly if you want the other person to understand everything yousay," he added. "Going over the speed limit spells trouble."

There's a single exception to this, and that's for the fastest "conversation list" on record . . 2,500 words a minute. But this talker is not a person at all, but a computer which exchanges information expressed in "bits" or electronic impulses with other computers. If you could match that rate your average four-minute telephone conversation would be compressed to 12 seconds.


