




Copies of the prize-winning movie are being made available to civic and fraternal organizations in the Niagara Mohawk service territory.

Bethlehem will appear in the Semi-Finals next Saturday, July 6, at Marsh Field, Albany.




Vince is Here - Joe Goes - But Art Goes on Forever!!

ful recognition of the Brandt's 20 years of service in this pastorate.

The Brandt's left New York on April 21, and returned on May 21. They landed in Cairo, Egypt, where they joined a traveling party of 18 persons with whom they spent the first half of their tour.

One of the highlights of their stay in Cairo was having dinner with Dr. John Badeau, the United States Ambassador there, who is an old friend of both Dr. and Mrs. Brandt. Mrs. Brandt knew him when they were children growing up in Schenectady, and he was a classmate of Dr. Brandt's at Rutgers University.

While in Egypt, they also made a special trip to Luxor, to see the Valley of Kings and the famous Kamak Temple. Dr. Brandt believes that Nasser has done a great deal for the people of Egypt, but the country still has a long way to go to achieve a decent standard of living.

"We saw abject poverty there that is difficult to imagine," Dr. Brandt told me. He compared it to the filthy, underprivileged conditions the Pueblo Indians once suffered here in America.

From Egypt, the Brandt's flew

to Beirut, Lebanon, where they visited the American University. Then they spent some time in Damascas, the city where St. Paul lived and taught.

They went by bus to Jordan, where they made a point of seeing many Holy Land sites of great historical importance, including Amman, Jericho, the Dead Sea, Bethlehem, Betheny and Jerusalem.

Other stops in their itinerary were Nazareth, Cana, Haifi, and Tel-Aviv.

In Athens, Greece, Dr. and Mrs. Brandt visited many of the famous museums, then went on to the Acropolis and to Corinth.


Next they visited Rome, and St. Peter's Basilica. Monsignor Rooney of St. Thomas' Parish, had attempted to arrange a private audience with Pope John for them, but the proper contacts were not made.

At the public audience they attended, Pope John appeared seated in his throne and "looked very pale and drawn," according to Dr. Brandt.

Leaving the escorted tour, the Brandt's flew to Nice, France, where they enjoyed spending some time with a cousin of Dr. Brandt's who is a sculptor there. They took a bus tour through the French Alps, and then did some sightseeing in Geneva, Switzerland, where the church of John Calvin is located.

The last two cities they visited were Paris and London, where "we visited the usual





tourist attractions, " Dr. Brandt | said.

The Brandt's felt fortunate to be touring Europe between seasons, so that they weren't caught up in huge tourist crowds.

Only in Rome was there an abundance of foreign visitors.

Asked for his most vivid impressions of the tour, Dr. Brandt cited three. The first was the striking difference between Jordan and Israel. "The ground is the same in both countries," he said, "but in Israel great progress is being made, while the land in Jordan is, for the most part, scrubbed and desolate."

Israel reminded him, he said, of the Bible verse which goes: "The desert shall blossom like a rose . . . " He attributes Israel's "blossoming" to the Zionist Movement, and the dedication of the people who have settled there.

A second vivid memory of Dr. Brandt's is of a "kibbutz" they visited while in Israel. A kibbutz is a communal society, where socialistic ideas are put into practice. All children, for example, are

brought up in a group rather then by their own parents.

Dr. Brandt couldn't approve of this method of child-rearing. "The experience of the family unit is entirely lacking," he said. The children are brought for brief visits with their parents each evening, but the parents are never faced with handling sickness or discipline problems. "Nor do they gain the profound benefits of family life," Dr. Brandt pointed out.

The third impression he mentioned was the terrific amount of building going on throughout the countries they visited. And the cities he liked best especially for their cleanliness and friendly inhabitants - were Geneva, Switzerland; Athens, Greece; and Beirut, Lebanon.


