

PLAYERS SET CAST FOR FIRST PLAY: "THE LARK"

The cast for the Slingerlands Community Players' first production of the 1963-64 season, "The Lark," was announced today by Harlan Wilbert, director of the drama based on the life of Joan of Arc.

The drama by the contemporary French playwright Jean Anouilh, translated by Lillian Hellman, will be produced by The Players on Friday and Saturday, October 25 and 26, at 8:40 p.m. in the auditorium of Bethlehem Central High School on Delaware Avenue.

Appearing with the Players for the first time in the lead role of Joan is Sue Bowlin of Schenectady. This is the role which established Julie Harris as one of the nation's leading actresses when the play was presented at the Longacre Theatre on Broadway, opening in November, 1955.

Other leading roles are those of Warwick, to be played by Richard Weeks, and Cauchon, with Martin Barr. In the Broadway production, these roles were played by Christopher Plummer and Boris Karloff, respectively.

The play subsequently was adapted as a television "special" with Miss Harris and Mr. Plummer in the roles of Joan and Warwick.

BELL SYSTEM UNVEILS PLANS FOR NEW YORK WORLD'S FAIR BUILDING; SOUNDS LIKE OUTER SPACE FICTION

The New York World's Fair was "wired" for sight today (10/10) when a huge crane placed a one-ton horn antenna atop a 14-story high microwave tower at the Bell System exhibit.

The tower-antenna will transmit to the nation all television programs originating at the Fair. An antenna on the Pan Am Building in Manhattan will serve as the first relay point for cross-country broadcasts. The Fair tower also will handle incoming and outgoing closed circuit TV as well as data transmission.

A 200-foot crane dropped the cornucopia horn into a nest of eight steel beams like a key going into a key-hole. The horn carried an American flag to mark its being the highest point of the Bell System exhibit.

With the capping-off of the 140-foot tower, Bell System technicians will complete the installations of transmission equipment so that 30 circuits

will be ready for use well in advance of the Fair's opening in April. Visitors will be able to see the equipment and monitors of programs being televised through the glass-enclosed base of the tower.

The pencil-shaped microwave structure also will serve as a World's Fair landmark for the Bell System exhibit site on the Pool of Industry. Heart of the exhibit is a 400-foot-long wing, suspended on only four supports and rising 87 feet high, where the story of communications will be presented.

All structural steel has been installed in the pavilion and it is now being sheathed in white fiberglass.

The huge wing, which appears to be floating in air, houses a ride that will transport fairgoers in moving armchairs through 50 different stage settings and film presentations showing high points in communications history.

How communications systems have developed, and the science and technology which have made them possible, will be explained in an exhibit hall in the lower section of the pavilion. Animated displays, audience-participation demonstrations, and games will take visitors up the scale from animal communications and primitive human efforts to a presentation on global telecommunications networks.

The Bell pavilion is located on a 2 1/2-acre plot location at the head of the Pool of Industry. This is on the main axis of the Fair opposite the Unisphere. It is estimated that some 23-25 million persons will visit the exhibit.







DOCTORS WANTED . . . WOMEN PREFERRED

THE MEDICAL PROFESSION OFFERS VAST OPPORTUNITIES

> Lois Mattox Miller Roving Editor, The Reader's Digest

Keith McHugh, Commissioner, New York State Department of Commerce has said, "Too much woman power in our country is being wasted and many young women train in the wrong fields and often enter job markets already flooded with applicants."

I wish to call your attention to a field for women which is wide open to cultivation - a field where the job market is badly in need of applicants. A field which offers the maximum satisfaction, community respect, and financial gain. A field where there are so many new vistas to challenge the superior mind that there is a place in its study for every well qualified student. A field which many young women have looked at longingly for years, but comparatively few have entered, often because of lack

of information and some misinformation.

I am speaking of the medical field - careers in medicine for women.

That there is a great need for more well-trained doctors is a fact accepted by all responsible authorities. Yet, in the face of this need, *applications for medical schools have dropped consistently since 1950.

Two years ago the Bane Committee Report to the Surgeon General of the United State Public Health Service stated: "We must graduate 3,600 more doctors a year to maintain the present ratio of 141 doctors to 100,000 population as a minimum health coverage.

This present ratio of physicians to the population has been maintained in recent years only by the immigration to the United States of foreign-

trained physicians. In 1951 about 600 graduates of foreign schools were licensed to practice medicine in the United States. By 1960-61 there was another 1,753 foreign-trained doctors serving their internship in our hospitals and 8, 182 serving their residency.

It is now estimated that 12,000 foreign-trained doctors are serving as staff physicians in the hospitals of the United States. It is also estimated that about half of the residents and interns in the municipal hospitals of New York City are foreign-trained.

Medical educators and health authorities are deeply concerned over this situation, for many of these doctors do not qualify for the jobs under the strict requirements made of our own medical students.

They are afraid that future medical care in the United States will suffer unless something is done quickly to stimulate the interest of our youth in medicine as a career.

It is estimated that we must graduate 50% more physicians each year by 1970 if we wish to maintain the present ratio of physicians to population.

What are the reasons for the falling off of applicants to our medical schools? There are Popular interest by

male students in the other sciences undoubtedly plays a part. The cost of a medical education and the long years of study involved also contribute heavily to this falling off. Still another reason is the lack of sound information about the number of vacancies in the medical schools, the availability of scholarships, as well as the erroneous belief that only A students need apply.



in Albany to learn how to classify books, held dances, parties, rummage sales . . . and even brought movies to the hall (now a garage) on Kenwood Avenue just opposite Gardner Terrace. The result, of course, was that they scraped up enough money to renovate a room in the Delmar grade school (now the Masonic Temple). Their husbands helped them install shelves, renovate

furniture, and gather books. In May, 1913, Delmar had a library!

It seems logical to this writer that the Progress Club initiated the library... for progress has been the keynote of the library ever since! For proof... the very fact that in September of this year over 3,000 more books were loaned than in September of last year. (The circulation for the



entire month ran well over 16,000 volumes.] I thought of this when I heard Quentin Reynolds blast the American public and downgrade the public's interest in reading. HE should visit the Delmar Public Library any night . . . but he'd be shocked out of his sad and disillusioned outlook if he visited on a Monday night! The Tri-Village area residents DO read. According to Mrs. Rau, about 90% of the reading is for pleasure. Approximately 60% of the books that are loaned are non-fiction . . . although there is a great demand for fiction . . . and particularly that which is new (Right now two favorites seem to be Cos-

tain's <u>Last Love</u> and Betty Smith's Joy in the Morning.

"How do you ever select the newly written books" I asked Mrs. Rau. "Well, it's a tremendous task... and frankly I am never without a book catalogue in my pocket or review cards on my desk... both at home and at the library," she answered. Then she went on to say that her policy in choosing the books is to choose those with merit rather than to constantly follow the so-called "best seller" lists.

Three years after the Delmar Library was opened, it was moved from the grade school

to its present location. Until 1954 it was a small building. The present lounge is the original library on the apex formed by Adams Place and Hawthorne. Additional room was added in 1954 . . . and two more additions have been made since. Today there is every indication that more space will soon be needed!

Yes . . . the library just as the rest of the Tri-Village area, has grown like Topsy! The women of the Progress Club who staffed the library on a volunteer basis until 1931 finally had to face the fact that it really was more than they could handle. So, in that year they gave it to the town. The community voted to support the library as part of Bethlehem School District #6. It has since been entirely supported by the tax payers . . . and it is typical of the spirit of this community that the library has the interest and concern of the citizens who live here. There is a board of five trustees, their terms run for 5 years and each year a member is elected by

popular vote. At present it is ably headed by Dr. Theodore C. Wenzl. Today there are over 25 persons on the library's payroll. This includes 16 teen-agers who are either employed as Pages or under the Work Study Program. Not only is their service invaluable to the regular staff, but it is an excellent opportunity for these high school students to form fine work habits. (If they do not fulfill the library's requirements, they are relieved of duty. There is always a waiting list with both boys and girls registered on it!) An extra plus (and when she tells of this, Mrs. Rau's face glows) . . is the volunteer work of Mrs. Clover Mikol and Mrs. Evelyn Sanvidge, Mrs. Mikol arranges the art displays in the community room. Mrs. Sanvidge keeps those fascinating exhibits in the glass enclosed cases going!

There is excellent rapport and mutual respect between the librarians in the town's schools and those in the public library. After school . . . all of the 85 chairs in the children's room
