

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

From the trial scenes, the play goes back to the incidents which led Joan to the final fate at the stake - the vision of the Virgin Mary, her attainment of an army to fight the English, her victory and its aftermath, the accusation and trial.

The setting for The Players' production will be impressionistic and stark, in keeping with the nature and atmosphere of the drama. Rich costuming, however, will be employed, along with vivid lighting and music, to enrich the production.





Only a prolonged and drenching rainfall, not now in immediate prospect, the State Conservation Department says. will correct the hazardous fire situation which led to Acting Governor Malcolm Wilson's closing of the state's woodlands, forests and open lands everywhere except New York City and Long Island.

In the meantime, Conservation Commissioner Harold G. Wilm emphasized, as a major point of the closing proclamation, the stopping of all outdoor burning in rural and urban areas of the state outside the excepted locations.

"This includes burning of leaves and trash and all open fires, " he declared.

All prohibitions of the closing order issued by the Lieutenant and Acting Governor, under Section 54 of the Conservation Law, became effective at 8 p.m., Sunday night, and, he said, will "continue in full force and effect until revoked by executive order."

Commissioner Wilm explained that his recommendation for executive action was based on reports from the Department's 14 fire districts

which indicated a high burning index for most sections of the state and a high frequency of fire occurence, especially in the Adirondacks and western New York.

In addition, he said, weather reports show a statewide rain deficiency ranging from two to ten inches.

Rev. Randles Goes to Clifton Park Church as Rector



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
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




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New Officers Announced


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7 Amendments Up for Vote

The Facts provides factual information on the amendments, giving the purpose of each amendment and the main arguments pro and con; provides registration, enrollment, and voting information, a description of the use of the voting machine, as well as notice of the only statewide office to be filled this year, that of Associate Judge, Court of Appeals.

The League, a non-partisan organization whose purpose is to promote informed citizen participation in government, expects to distribute well over a million Facts between now and election day.

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



When the new \$250,000 clubhouse for the Normanside Country Club goes up on what is now the 4th tee of their golf courses, it will be the realization of plans made 36 years ago when the club was formed. Bearing witness to the passage of time is a beautiful sprawling oak tree which was planted there by William A. Glenn. The time was coincidental . . . for not only were his hopes for a country club in his own town of Elsmere coming to life . . . but he planted the tree in honor of a little girl who was born to his son John E. Glenn and his charming wife.

"Tell me, how did it happen that your father was instrumental in founding the Normanside Country Club," I asked John E. Glenn . . . a well known lawyer of this area who lives on Oldox Road. "Well," he responded, "my father and some of his friends had belonged to Wolferts Roost Country Club. They decided it would be nice to have a club right here in home territory. They formed a corporation . . . and after much searching and discussion . . . they finally purchased the property adjoining the Normanskill Creek and owned by the Salisbury family. There were four of them responsible for obtaining the land; my father, Dr. Thomas M. Holmes, Mr. Fred Earing, and Dr. Edward Bedell. There

is still a Normanside Corpor-

"The present board of directors of the club and the planning committee of the Normanside Country Club have been given a vote of confidence by the membership on plans to build a new clubhouse to replace the buildings gutted recently by fire. The new building will be on the site originally planned by my grandfather and his friends . . . on the 4th tee and facing Salisbury Road."

Having long admired and cherished the view from this site, this writer wondered what kind of a building is planned. Mr. Glenn referred me for this to Aloysius Hofaker, President of Normanside Country Club. "It's hard to put it into words," said Al Hofaker. "You really must see the model made for us by our architect, John N. Brownrigg." The model shows an A-frame type building with a foyer and offices to one side of the A . . . and dining room, cocktail lounge and kitchen on the first level of the A . . . with a lounge and card room on the second level. A wing to the back will house the locker, shower and steam bath rooms.

"This style building seems to blend into the land," Al Hofaker continued. "You see, it will all be of steel framework. The textured roof will slope to within approximately 10 ft. from the ground . . . and huge glass walls will give scope and a magnificent view of the land around us. One side will



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



give a beautiful panorama.... looking out over the 15th and 16th holes... and toward the State Office Building. All told, the club will run to about 10,000 square feet."

It sounds terrific! If all goes according to plan . . . the Normanside Country Club will be able to expand from its present membership of 250 to 300 persons. Next year . . . when that large oak on the 4th tee once againhas leaves which give shelter from sun . . . and branches that reach toward the sky . . . it will be a landmark which has fulfilled a dream for those four men who in 1927 built their golf course along the banks of the Normanskill, took over a farmhouse as a "temporary clubhouse" and hoped for the day when they'd build "up there . . . by Mr. Glenn's oak!"

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


