With approximately 1,000 less voters going to the polls than in the last local election in 1961, Bertram E. Kohinke was returned for the third time to the Supervisorship of the town of Bethlehem by a vote of: Kohinke, 6,903; Murray, 1,793. This represents about a $4\frac{1}{2}$ to 1 margin.

In an exclusive Spotlight interview, Mr. Kohinke said, "All the Republican candidates wish to extend their thanks to the voters for the confidence extended. By this voter mandate, we feel that we can go forward with all of our well-grounded plans for the Town."

A milestone was reached in this election in the Town of Bethlehem. Here are a couple of conclusions proving this:

1. Two years ago, in 1961, the insurgent Lincoln Party, appealing to the Republicans who were dissatisfied with the regular Republican Party, garnered more than 3,000 votes. This year, the Lincolns didn't even appear on the Primary ticket.

2. In 1961, the usual Democrat vote in the Town dropped by about 50% because of the Lincolns and the fact became apparent that many Republicans must have been voting the Democrat ticket as a protest vote. This year, the Democrat vote rose again to around 1,600 votes as opposed to about 1,200 in 1961.

Another interesting fact: David A. Mead, Republican candidate for Superintendent of Highways, was the biggest vote-getter for the Republicans.

May we all live to see the day when disputes between all nations will be decided fairly in an atmosphere of friendship and goodwill.

While that is still only a hope, let Veterans' Day remind us that the strength, the courage, and the will to sacrifice which brought victory in war are needed today to keep the peace in an uneasy world.


Community Ambassador Will Speak to Government Group Of Delmar Progress Club
