"ADVENTURE IN ECUMENISM" FEATURE OF 3-DAY Discussion this weekend in Delmar

With the subject of ecumenism prominent in the minds of thinking people, the Commission on Missions of the Delmar Methodist Church has scheduled a three day symposium on "Adventure in Ecumenism" for the weekend of January 24, 25 and 26, with members of the Presbyterian and Reformed Churches of Delmar as participants. Outstanding church leaders will address the sessions.

The program has been conceived to explore the possibilities of practical grassroots ecumenical dialogue. Referring to the coming event, the Rev. William G. Vigne, associate minister of the Delmar Methodist Church, declared, "We shall explore with our Presbyterian and Reformed neighbors the question 'Why Ecumenism?' We anticipate a lively dialogue as we gain new insight into our Christian heritage and our common calling."

The program starts with a combined dinner Friday evening at 6:30 in the Delmar Reformed Church for the Methdist Couples Club and the Reformed Church Doubles Club, followed by an open meeting at 8:00 o'clock in the sanctuary of the Reformed Church at which all are welcome, when the speaker will be the Rev. James P. Ebbers of the Board of World Missions of the Reformed Church in America.

Rescue Squad Reports

The Rescue Squad of the Delmar Fire Department finished 1963 with the busiest and most gratifying year in its long history. They not only served the community 337 times but put in service a new ambulance without the normal fund raising drive as in the past. This was accomplished by depleting the funds left over from their last ambulance drive in 1959 and with the donations received during the years from those people they served.

The squad is not only proud of their record but glad to donate over 80 eight hour days last year to give to this area the service of the ambulance that is made possible through free donations only.

Delmar Fire Department, who insists that there is at least one trained First Aid man on every call. They also believe that the siren should be used only in an emergency. The ambulance is radio equipped so that they are in constant contact with the Bethlehem Police and will be included in the Town-wide fire radio system to be installed shortly.


Shareholders Meet



Shareholders also approved the 3% stock divided previously declared by the Board of Directors.


New Furniture Store


There is also a box office in the Gift Shop of the Institute, if you prefer to pick up tickets.

The skiing craze has really caught on among Tri-Villagers. More and more of our neighbors, both young and not so

Students at Bethlehem Central have recently proven just how enthusiastic they are about this great outdoor sport. The school has had a ski club in the past, but when a group applied for a school charter this fall, they were turned down by the student council.

"Too dangerous," was the council's reason for rejecting the organizational request. The pupil representatives felt the school shouldn't officially sponsor a club that might incur physical injuries among its membership.

The skiers, though, wouldn't be stopped. They organized -116 strong - as an independent group, and obtained a building permit to hold meetings at the school. The club officers, all BC seniors, are Jim Myron, president; Jim Bradt, vicepresident; Rosemary Marotta, secretary; and Dick Drake, treasurer.

The club has gone on two skiing outings already, and another is planned for this Saturday. Two busloads, or about 80 youngsters, participated in the first two trips. The first was a day-long outing on December 23 at Hunter Mountain near Tannersville, and the second was a night visit to the Bousquets Ski Area in Pittsfield, Mass., last Thursday.

Buses are chartered from L.C. Smith, and each skier must have a permission slip from a parent.

"So far we've had no accidents or trouble of any kind," Jim Myron told me. Maybe I'm going out on a limb to say so, (not being a skier, all of mine are still intact) but it looks to me as though the kids have demonstrated mature determination in this venture. And let's hope everybody's limbs remain intact throughout the skiing season.




