TWO NEW PERMANENT MEMORIALS PROPOSED FOR PARK FOUNDERS AND WAR VETERANS

At a meeting of civic and fraternal organizations held February 26, it was decided to improve Bethlehem Memorial Park. Adopting the name of the Bethlehem Memorial Committee, William Johnston, Jr., of 73 Darroch Road, Delmar, was made Chairman.

Such improvement of Memorial Park has been under consideration for some time by Town Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke and the Town Board. Impetus to the action was brought about by the recent death of Otto de Heus who had suggested that the present wooden memorial be replaced by a stone monument which would better withstand the elements. Plans now call for the removal of the existing memorial and replace it with a six-foot high granite monument inscribed to the memory of the men and women who served in the military campaigns in which the Armed Services of the United States were involved. In addition, there will be a separate bronze plaque commemorating the civic contributions to the community made by Mr. de Heus, John M. Oliver, Dr. Thomas M. Holmes and Arthur Main who jointly were responsible for the establishment of the memorial park.

The improvements will also include new landscaping as well as illuminating the monument and the American Flag during the hours of darkness.

To accomplish this, it is estimated that several thousand dollars will be required. To obtain the money for the project, a three-phase fund-raising campaign is underway: (a) Larger Gifts Division which will assist the organized groups to conduct campaigns among their members for funds; and (c) Public Gifts Division to direct its

efforts to all persons not allied with any organization who may wish to make a donation, no matter how small, to this campaign.

Contributions to the Bethlehem Memorial Committee, Federal tax officials have determined, are tax deductible.

Chester L. Hawley, President of Opportunity for Growth, agreed to be treasurer for the committee. Checks for the project should be made out to Bethlehem Memorial Committee and mailed or delivered to Mr. Hawley's office at 318 Delaware Avenue, Delmar, New York, 12054.

With Mr. Johnston and Mr. Hawley serving on the Executive Board of the Committee, also are Town Councilman George Butman, American Legion Representative Harold C. Barkhuff, VFW Representative William Pauley, Park Committee Member Fred Dearstyne and Police Captain Robert Foster.

The dedication ceremony of the new monument and the bronze plaque at the Memorial Park is scheduled for Memorial Day, May 30, 1964. A meeting of the Committee on the progress of the fund-raising work is set for March 10.

In making his appeal to everyone to contribute toward the campaign, Mr. Johnston stated:

"It is timely that we quickly move ahead with the work of improving the appearance of the Town's park area which has been set aside to honor the memories of the citizens of our community who have served and especially those who made the supreme sacrifice in the military, naval and air actions in which America has been involved.

"All of us who see the wooden board now at the Memorial

Park are too well aware of its deteriorating condition, brought about by the weather. Our studies verify that the granite monument proposed for the site will far better sustain the elements and it will improve the appearance of the memorial and the park area.

"If you are not a member of one of the organized community groups in the Committee and would like to donate, please send your donations directly to Mr. Hawley at his Delmar office."

Contributing his service to the design of the monument and the renewed park area is retired Architect Max R. Simon of Delmar.

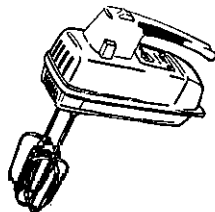

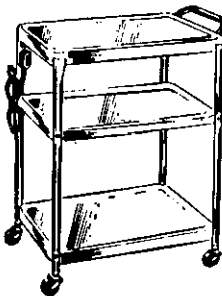

BETHLEHEM TO HOST VISITORS FROM GREECE AND YUGOSLAVIA IN INTERNATIONAL LIVING PROJECT

The town of Bethlehem will assume an international flavor again this summer. Our town will host several visitors from Greece and a visiting Community Ambassador from Yugoslavia. These foreign guests will be living with local families under the auspices of the Experiment in International Living and the local Community Ambassador Project.

At present, the Project is busily engaged in finding homes for these visitors. The Greek group will be here from late July to late August and the lone Yugoslav will arrive late in July for a two-month stay. It is hoped that the Yugoslav

will be hosted by several families in our area to give him a broader picture of American home life. In the past, local families have found the hosting experience most enjoyable and rewarding.

On Thursday, March 5, at 8:00 p.m. in the Senior High School Library, the host families of 1963, will tell of some of their experiences entertaining last year's group from India. Movies, slides and anecdotes will reveal the fun encountered by both host and guest as India met America.

The success and enthusiasm with which these programs were met prompted the Project to undertake another facet of the Experiment program. 1964 will be the first year that Bethlehem has both sent and received an Ambassador. Mrs. Robert Raymond, chairman of this new program, has announced that during the Yugoslavian Community Ambassador's stay here, he will be available for speaking engagements. The visitors from Greece will be available also, according to Mrs. Robert Taylor, Chairman of the local Incoming Group Program.

If you are interested in having any of these foreign guests this summer, tonight's meeting should prove most enlightening.

after the family has been launched, and she's making her own name in this field. Dorothy Knox heads the Women's Auxiliary of the Albany Medical Center Hospital. In this paid job, she is the essence of efficiency. She works with 350 volunteers whose ages range from 14 to 80. They are homemakers who want to serve others, teenagers who give willingly of their spare time, men who are retired and want meaningful community service, and career women who adapt their abilities in this volunteer way! With a background which included being a Red Cross nurse's aid during the war, it was natural for Dorothy Knox to accept an invitation from Dr. Thomas Hale, head of the hospital, to begin a hostess program. Starting with a few in 1955, the hostess idea grew so rapidly that the Auxiliary was officially launched in November of that year. It was to continue the pilot project which had been started on the pediatrics floor. It was doomed to extend to all areas of the hospital. Today women read and play with children on the sixth floor. Mrs. Margaret Law of Van Wies point takes animals into the hospital for this particular floor's patients, and what therapy that is! Hostesses stop in rooms of patients and play chess, run errands, read to them or just LISTEN. Their job is to simply be a friend to the many who are lonely and perhaps do not always have visitors. Other women operate the book cart (the hospital library in the Auxiliary quarters is headed by Mrs. Robert Baker of Laurel Rd. in Elsmere). And so, on and on, goes the list of services performed by the volunteers. Their work is important, for, accord-
