To clarify matters may I say that the proposed stone is simply a permanent replacement for the present wooden structure that is now falling apart. It will be a memorial to all veterans of all wars.

Perhaps "park" is not the right word to use as it is really just a plot of ground dedicated to the memory of all veterans of the Town of Bethlehem. It should not be thought of in terms of a spacious pleasure park. Such a park could not be purchased for thirty times the amount this stone will cost.

Every town has its war memorial; ours will be exceedingly modest, but permanent.

Our goal is \$3,000, and it can be easily and painlessly reached if each family will give even as little as one dollar.

Contributions should be sent to the Bethlehem Memorial Committee, Delmar, New York, as soon as possible in order that the stone may be in place and ready for the dedication services on Memorial Day.

I think we are near enough to parks and recreational facilities so that children will not suffer from a lack of places to play and swim. Besides I know of very few homes here that do not have plenty of space in their own back yards for their children to play.

Another question I should like to have answered by the School Board is why the cost per pupil in Bethlehem Central is \$725, and in the surrounding districts is only a little over \$500. Could it be because we are paying for all those swimming pools et cetera

ROAD ARGUMENT RAGES ON

Fred Stimmel Calls Meeting To Present 'Factual Summary'

The Bethlehem-New Scotland Roads Association today called a community informational meeting for May 13 in an effort to clarify and resolve the growing dispute over the location of the proposed arterial highway link through the hamlet of Slingerlands.

Frederick C. Stimmel, newly-elected president of the group, said the association would present a "factual summary of the situation in the nature of a community information briefing."

The meeting will be held at 8 p.m. in the Bethlehem Senior High School auditorium. Representatives of the Department of Public Works, the Town Boards of Bethlehem and New Scotland, the New York Good Roads Association, and other interested civic groups will be invited.

The DPW proposal to route a high-speed divided highway through the center of Slingerlands has been vigorously opposed by residents of the community, who feel the connector should skirt the hamlet to the west.

Stimmel said the meeting was being called to accomplish these things:

- Spell out the details of the DPW's proposed route plan and discuss its effects in the community.
- Afford the DPW an opportunity to present its reasons for planning the link to bisect Slingerlands.
- Obtain an expression of opinion from residents of Bethlehem and New Scotland on the presently proposed route.
- Present a sounding board for the official views of the Town Boards of Bethlehem and New Scotland.
- Make a start toward resolving the apparent differences of opinion between the DPW and residents on the proper location of the highway.



Let's Fly A Kite - SAFELY!

Flying kites and model airplanes is good sport, but it can be dangerous, Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation warned today.

The power company pointed out that flying kites or model planes near electric power lines requires extreme caution. If the string or wire used to control the devices became entangled in electric wires, serious injury or death could result the company said.

And there could be widespread inconvenience too, the company pointed out, explaining that control wires entangled in power lines might cause a power interruption affecting scores of people.

In renewing Niagara Mohawk's annual springtime safety plea, the power company urged everyone to observe four basic rules while flying kites:

- 1. Fly kites only in open fields, away from electric lines.
- 2. Never use string having wire or tinsel in it.
- 3. Make certain the string is dry. Wet string, like wire, can conduct electricity.
- 4. Don't climb electric poles, towers or substation fences to rescue an entangled kite. If a kite gets caught in wires or in a tree through which wires run let it go.

Niagara Mohawk said that flying model airplanes near electric wires is hazardous because many models are controlled by wire leashes which are good conductors of electricity.

ture album has been complete without delightful pictures recording their first years.

But do pictures of your baby invite adoring oohs and ahs, or merely polite reactions?

In order to take the best pictures of your baby, you'll need a little bit of know-how, a smattering of patience, and lotsof applied psychology.

As far as equipment is concerned, if your camera can take close-up pictures, so much the better. A tripod also comes in handy to eliminate camera movement and free your hands for other things. If you "shoot" without a tripod, be sure to brace your elbows when you "snap" to keep blurs from your finished photos.

Your picture taking area should be about three feet from a plain background. A solid colored blanket, spread on a low table or bassinet, if baby's very small, will suffice. Since you won't want to unnecessarily involve your child in preliminaries, use a doll as a "standin" for all arrangements.

It's best to place your camera about four feet from your youngster. With blanket and camera set, replace the "standin" with your loved one and let him begin to play.

Of course, with uncontrolled activity, your youngster is apt to crawl toward you and the camera, so you'll have to arrange something to keep his interest. For example, you might want to try hand puppets, or his favorite toy placed "on location." Baby also might react well to playing with some colorful small objects, such as a ribbon or a balloon.

There are a few "discovery" games which bring delightful expressions to baby's eyes. When your child is old enough

to handle a book, you might try placing a few brightly colored pieces of ribbon between different pages. As baby comes to a page where a piece of ribbon was hidden, viola! You will have just the right expression.

In any case, such discovery will reward your patience and result in a fine new contribution for the pages of your family album.
