#### "HEY, MOM, WAS HEA BAD OR A GOOD GUY?!"

"Hey, Mom. Was Socrates a good guy or a bad guy?"

The boy, well up on television westerns but having for the first time seen a GB show on the Greek philosophers, was accurately stating a question that has been debated for the 2,000 years since Socrates was charged with corrupting the youth by prodding them with questions.

"Was Socrates guilty or not guilty?" is still being discussed today. It and other questions concerning the nature of man as raised by such authors as Aristotle, Shakespeare, Freud are being discussed in Delmar.

The discussion groups are sponsored by the Delmar Public Library in cooperation with the Great Books Foundation. Participants come from all walks of life: doctors, lawyers, students, teachers, housewives, plumbers, businessmen.

Registration is open now at the Public Library for first-year Great Books groups, according to Barbara Rau, librarian. Two discussion groups are now in session.

Many thousands of adults throughout the country have found that learning to think for themselves by reading and discussing Great Books can be fun, as well as stimulating.

Since 1947, when the Great Books Foundation was incorporated in Chicago as a non-profit organization, groups of 15 to 25 persons in communities from coast to coast have been meeting to discuss books written by Plato, Shakespeare, Thoreau, books as old as the Bible, as new as Freud.

They have found that the books deal with basic problems as current and important as when they were written: the problems of justice, happiness, morality, government, the nature of man.

All persons interested in joining a Great Books group may register at the Delmar Public Library until November 9.

#### A COLORFUL AND BREEZY "H. M. S. PINAFORE" WILL PLAY AT THE PALACE THEATER ON NOVEMBER 23

It is no small coincidence that the three major architects of Tyron Guthrie's production of "H.M.S. Pinafore" - William Gilbert, Arthur Sullivan, and Tyrone Guthrie - were granted knighthood by their respective queens.

Queen Victoria, who knighted Gilbert and Sullivan, and Victoria's great, great grand-daughter, Queen Elizabeth, who knighted Dr. Guthrie, were recognizing the enormous contributions made to the theater by these men.

Gilbert and Sullivan opposed the traditions of the Victorian theater. They declared war on the incoherent plots, offensive dialogue, and banality of the musical theater of their day. Their attacks on the traditions and pomposity of life and institutions of Victorian Britain were made with such wit and imagination that the great success and popularity of their works has continued to the present day.

It is interesting to note that in the years since their deaths, the anti-traditionalist plays of Gilbert and Sullivan have been staged in a rather stiffly traditional manner - much as they were when they were first performed.

Tyrone Guthrie's staging of "H.M.S. Pinafore" has ignored the traditional style and replaced it with a bright, breezy new approach which is very much modern musical comedy, yet which has accented the wit and style of Cilbert and Sullivan.

The Tyrone Guthrie production of "H.M.S. Pinafore" will be presented at the Palace Theater





#### An Editorial on Little League

Reprinted from New England Journal of Medicine

There is perhaps no greater joy than that of the baseball fan whenhe hears the first crack of the bat . . . or the plunk of the ball in the glove. In recent vears this baseball-philia has become evident in a unique American phenomenon - the Little League.

Eagerparents are cheering their heirs around the bases, and little boys in uniform are collecting money on house-to-house and car-to-car campaigns to pay for the outfits. Certainly in no other country, with the possible exception of Russia; is there such an effort to organize sport for children.


The devotion of some adults. to the provision of adequate and safe facilities for games for boys is remarkable and to be commended. It is also true, however, that the organization may become a means of parental competition, with their sons being pawns in the game. Bleacher comments that may be acceptable and even appropriate at Fenway Park are not without harm to the little boys on the local hall field.

One sometimes wonders whether parents should bow out after they have provided adequate play area and facilities for the The talent required children. in managing a team of boys of

varying ability, with all the physiologic and psychologic problems this entails, is beyond that of many parents, even with the best of intentions. On the other hand, it is remarkable how well children take care of their own interpersonal affairs when left alone.

For many centuries, boys have been known to have their own games without adult assistance, and it may be more satisfying and even healthier for them to play in their own way without teams, without uniforms, without adults and without a formal competitive schedule, Although any sportsman will admit it's fun to win, the more important discovery . . . is that games are for enjoyment and it's fun to play.

One can only hope that as the season goes on the little leaguers will not feel a little beleaguered.
