



While waiting for the ambulance or fire trucks a few minutes may seem like hours, but sometimes it takes the men more than the necessary few minutes to reach their destination because of inconsiderate citizens.

The cars belonging to the volunteers are equipped with blue lights. When an emergency arises, these blue lights plus the car horns are used to warn the citizens of the existing situation. This means: Get Out of the Way; it does not mean; stop where you are OR vell at the driver because of his excessive speed.

Be aware of the blue lights and honking. Keep reminding yourself and your family what they mean. Be considerate of the men who are helping you at any time of the day or night.

BCHS to be Host


Bethlehem Central Senior High School will play host to the Class of '64 on Friday, December 18, at 12:30 P.M.



Dr. Gould and his family reside at 40 Marion Avenue, Albany.




