

Letter to the Editor:

Polio and birth defects -Both can be killers - Both are cripplers. At one time, no one talked or wrote much about polio. Too horrible, too depressing. Wouldn't do any good anyhow.

Along came the March of Dimes organization and called upon the American people to join in partnership with science to eliminate this dread disease. Result: Polio has ceased to be a national public localth problem, thanks to vaccines devel oped through March of Dimes financed research. There are still 12,000 polio patients on chapter roles in the Nation, who require March of Dimes assistance.

Birth defects are even more frightening than polio. At least 250,000 children are born with one or more of the 1000 known defects each year. They not only cripple the body, but they can blight the mind.

Isn't it time we took the "Top Secret" label off the birth defect problem and recognize it as the national health menace it really is?

Through a network of 53 medical care centers in the nation, experts are developing and perfecting advance methods of treatment. The Albany March of Dimes Center is at The Albany Medical Center Hospital, launched in 1962.

The same kind of research program that conquered polio is now at work on birth defects. Contributions to the March of Dimes during January, can help speed the day when birth defects join polio on the roster of medical problems marked "Solved."

#### JOSE MOLINA AND COMPANY TO BE HERE FEBRUARY 1

Bethlehem Central Senior High School will be besieged by gypsies on Monday, Febnuary 1, when Jose Molina and his company of Flamenco dancers, singers, and musicians arrive to perform for the students and interested adults.

These gypsies will not arrive in gaily painted, horsedrawn wagons, but in a scenicruiser bus, equipped with all the comforts of home. Dancers in American shows have long borne the nickname of "gypsies" because of the lives they lead on tour, and Jose Molina and his company fit the description perfectly. This handsome young company of ten Flamenco dancers, singers, and instrumentalists have scored a spectacular success since their premiere in 1962, and have played from Montreal to Honolulu and from the Mexican border into all five provinces of Canada with side excursions to Central America, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, and Trinidad.

Their program consists of songs and dances from all of the Spanish provinces and from the Spanish gypsy camps. The wardrobe for this spectacular attraction was created in Madrid by Spain's foremost designers. It is valued at \$80,000 and is a collection of exact copies in hand-woven materials, of apparel worn in parts of Spain today.

Jose Molina assembled this company in 1962 after his withdrawal from the Jose Greco Company with whom he had been the leading male dancer for five years. He had dreamed (Continued on Page 3)

### FARM BUREAU WILL MOVE TO BETHLEHEM

The New York Farm Bureau announced plans Monday to move its headquarters from Ithaca to the Town of Bethlehem.

Announcement of the plans for the new headquarters were made at a joint luncheon meeting of the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors and officials of Opportunity for Growth, an industrial development unit of the chamber. The luncheon was held at the Center Inn, Glenmont.

The company presently rents space in the office complex at 157 Delaware Avenue in Bethlehem where it employs 130 persons. The shift to a new building, expected early in 1966, and centralization with the Farm Bureau will mean an addition of about 30 more employees.

The company has three sites in Bethlehem under consideration. The potential locations were picked from some 200 in the Capital District area.

One of the sites is known to be adjacent to the Glenmont elementary school along Route 9W and south of a Niagara-Mohawk right-of-way. The land is presently zoned for residential use, but the company has applied for a zone change to permit commercial use. The application will be aired by the Town Board February 3.

The town Planning Board has recommended the change.

Town Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke joined Chester L. Hawley, president of Opportunity For Growth, in welcoming the Farm Bureau to the town. "We welcome this 'big league' organization and pledge that through mutual cooperation we can go forward together," Mr. Kohinke said.



The visit was arranged by Robert Pierson, Bethlehem teacher-coordinator, to supplement classroom study by members of his class in distributive education.

The tour was preceded by a slide-illustrated discussion of arsenal organization and current activities presented by Thomas A. Kucskar, chief of the installation's production planning section.

The visitors' itinerary included manufacturing and assembly areas for components of the 105mm table gun, 8-Inch and 155mm howitzers, and the 175mm self-propelled gun-the Army's largest conventional weapon.

Of particular interest to the visitors was the assenal's "Telecontrol," the automated production control system employed in the installation's minor components manufacturing area.

William Callahan, Thomas Connally and Alexander Hillis of the arsenal's production planning and control branch served as tour guides.



#### "In White America" Coming







Dr. Richard W. Moomaw, who became superintendent of the Bethlehem Central School District last fall, took time from his busy schedule one day recently to tell me he's very happy in his new job.

He told me some other things, too, such as that he believes this is an unusually fine school system with a strong curriculum and good teachers.

"The aspiration level for education is very high in this community," he pointed out, "and the great interest shown by our citizens creates the climate necessary for developing and maintaining such a good school system."

Dr. Moomaw is a man with a pleasant manner who speaks matter-of-factly about his responsibilities and about his past experience in education. He is a native of Indiana and a graduate of Manchester College in Manchester, Ind., where he met his wife, Vivian.

He spent six years teaching in Indiana schools, and then was named chairman of the mathematics department of Hobart High School in Hobart, Ind. After that, he served as principal of a high school in Edinburg, Ind. He has done graduate work at Butler University, Northwestern University, where he earned a master's degree, and Columbia University, where he received an Ed.D degree.

Before coming to Delmar, Dr. Moomaw was the assistant superintendent of schools in Clarence, N.Y., a suburb of Buffalo.

He and his wife and their children, David, 14, James, 12, and Kathryn, 9, moved to 51 Douglas Rd. in Delmar last August. David is in the eighth grade at the Junior High School, and James and Kathryn both attend Hamagrael Elementary School. Mrs. Moomaw, a former elementary school teacher, has adapted readily to her new surroundings, and is a member of the League of Women Voters and the Delmar Progress Club.

Dr. Moomaw enjoys both fishing and golfing - which he hopes to have time for in the future - and spends the little free time he has these days with "home and family responsibilities" and keeping up-todate on his reading. He's also been active in Lions Club for a number of years, and has joined the Bethlehem Lions Club.

"I have only the best impressions of both the community and the school district," he told me, adding that he feels

fortunate to be here. He's obviously a dedicated educator, interested in promoting a wellrounded educational program for all our youngsters.

He was educated in government schools in India, and in addition to his teaching is the editor of the children's section




