# Local Businessmen Irked By Zoning Amendments

Bethlehem businessmen, 163 strong, turned out to a meeting February 16 at the National Commercial Bank auditorium to air their feelings and express their opinions on the proposed amendments to the Town's Zoning Ordinance.

The meeting, arranged by Raymond Brownell, A. Scott Rowe, and Louis Dempf, Jr., was an outgrowth of a public hearing held without publicity at the Town Hall on February 3rd. A show of hands indicated that only three businessmen: subscribed to the paper in which the Town advertised the "official notice" of hearing and only five knew of the hearing prior to the date it was held.

Particularly irksome to those who did attend the hearing was that amendments were not read and as a result they were not aware that a business sign amendment (which sets a two-year limit for removal of signs that do not meet the requirements) was included.

Representatives of the Town and the Town's planning expert, Russell Bailey and Associates of Utica, were invited to the businessmen's meeting, but did not attend. A committee composed of those mentioned earlier, plus Sam Wolfe and Robert Rice, will present the Town Board with a resolution at its regularly scheduled meeting on Wednesday, February 24th. Such resolution would seek a halt to any action on the proposed amendments until specific resolutions which were discussed at the businessmen's meeting are drafted.

Mr. Brownell stated that the resolutions would be drafted as they were made, verbatim, and a copy mailed to all businessmen. In addition, the businessmen were asked to present any

other suggestions they might have to the committee. Another meeting will then be called to pass on them.

Among the resolutions unanimously and enthusiastically passed at the meeting were ones dealing with off-street parking and rebuilding, non-conforming uses, advertising signs, and certain changes in boundary lines. There was a spontaneous outburst of applause for Mr. Rice as he concluded his speech which charged the Town with "gerrymandering" and "discrimination" and arbitrarily changing a boundary line to prevent a car wash from being built. By doing so, it also automatically placed two gas stations in violation of zoning ordinances.

One merchant drew applause and laughter when he asked, "I wonder how the Town is going to handle its "parking problems" at the garages it just bought on Adams Street? The street is a fire lane and there is no place to park except on the sidewalk and you can be arrested for that. There isn't even any room for the employees to park their cars."


Mr. Dempf, the Chamber of Commerce representative, will submit the final draft of the resolutions to the Chamber's Board of Directors and Opportunities for Growth, Inc., and seek their support. An informed spokesman for the committee said the scope of this effort will in the future include the businessmen in the entire Town of Bethlehem. A letter inviting all Bethlehem businessmen to join in this effort went out over the week-end. One committee member stated that even though all are not presently affected, the proposed amendments will, nevertheless, effect any area zoned in the future.




aminations. This nomination is for the next five years.

# Kiwanians Celebrate Golden Anniversary

Four thousand people, Kiwanians and their wives, recently attended a gigantic Kiwanis International Golden Anniversary party in Detroit's Cobo Those in attendance represented every corner of the North American continent, and Western Europe as well. Greetings to the Kiwanians assembled came from President Lyndon B. Johnson, who said:


"It is a pleasure to extend to Kiwanians everywhere my warmest congratulations and best wishes as you observe the Golden Anniversary of your organization.


Dear Editor,







### Emil Sticht to Lecture Here





Do you care about your community? Are you concerned about the rights of all individuals? Do you believe in representatives of all religions working together for a better, more understanding world?

There are many people here in the Tri-Villages who feel strongly about these, and related, issues and they've been meeting together for a year now, at various informal get-togethers.

The group calls itself the Tri-Village Interfaith Committee on Social Concerns. It grew out of a weekend conference held a year ago by representatives of the Delmar Methodist, Reformed and Presbyterian Churches. Since that initial meeting, many area Roman Catholics and Jewish families have also participated in the group's aims and activities.

A spokesman for the group told methat so far it's "an amorphous organization," and there is no desire on the part of its members to make it anything else. "We appeal simply to those who have a keen interest in making our community as fine a place to live as it can be," he said.

At the meetings, held at irregular times during the past year, those who get together talked about promoting religious brotherhood, about inter-racial questions, about housing, about opportunities for our youth, and generally about working for a truly open and democratic community.

"While we're primarily interested in the Tri-Villages," one member explained, "we're also trying to relate ourselves to the Capital District as a whole, rather than remaining isolated."

The Committee sponsored a meeting last night, at which the Rev. Angelo Mongiore spoke on "The Need for Integrated Community Life." The Rev. George Phelps of the Delmar Presbyterian Church spoke at a similar meeting last month about his exper-

iences in Mississippi last summer.
