BUSINESSMEN ASK TOWN The Spotlight BOARD TO DELAY VOTE ON ZONING AMENDMENT

A committee representing Bethlehem businessmen were less than completely convinced that the Town Board made a firm commitment to hold in abeyance their approval of proposed amendments to the zoning ordinance at a Town Board meeting held on February 24th.

The confrontation was the aftermath of a spirited meeting of over 150 businessmen on February 16, at which time it was unanimously voted to seek a halt to action on the proposed amendments until specific resolutions could be drafted and presented to the Town Board. These resolutions would deal with certain requirements proposed by the Town Board which would cause possible hardships and financial and economic difficulties.

It was the impression of several of the businessmen present at the Town Board meeting that Harold Williams, one of the four Town councilmen, was the only member of the Town Board who gave his unqualified word that action would be deferred. He said, "This is too important for us to come to any quick decision. " Councilman George Butman said he was in accord with Mr. Williams "but of course someone has to get hurt."

Verbal bombardment was directed at Councilman Edward Tallmadge when he stated that he opposed any delaying of approval of the proposed amendments by the Town Board and continued, "It seems to me that it would not serve any good purpose in prolonging the time to put these zoning changes in effect." At the conclusion of his statement, Mr. Louis Dempf, Jr., a member of the 5 man committee appointed to represent the businessmen, leaped to his feet and said he was shocked and distressed that a councilman would make such a statement . . . "that there's no sense in holding this." Councilman Donald H. Burton.

who presided in the absence of Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke, who is vacationing in Florida, tried to get Mr. Tallmadge off the "hook" by saying he thought Mr. Tallmadge meant an "unusually long delay. " "We don't want to pigeonhole this for a year," he explained. He was immediately assured by the committee that this would not be the case.

The meeting was spiced by a verbal exchange between members of the businessmen's committee and Mr. Martin Barr of the Delaware Avenue Improvement Association and a resident of Euclid Ave., Elsmere, who urged immediate adoption of the proposed amendments. He explained that the proposed amendments for the first time provided for "buffer zones" for residents living on side streets of Delaware Ave. He was immediately reminded that the only buffer zone provided was at the end of the street where he lives. Mr. Barr is one of the leaders of a vocal and militant group who in the past few years have been successful in their court proceedings to stall off the erection of a car wash at Euclid and Delaware Avenues, a lot now zoned business.

A statement by A. Scott Rowe, another member of the businessmen's committee, that of the two committees working with the Planning Board (The Delaware Avenue Improvement Association and a Kohinke-appointed citizens committee) "not a man on either could be construed as a businessman in the area" drew a hot-tempered reply by Mr. Barr that Chester L. Hawley, president of Main Bros. Oil Co., is chairman of the citizens advisory committee. It must be remembered that Mr. Hawley spoke in favor of the proposed amendments at the Official Hearing held at the Town Hall on February 3rd, (Continued on Page 2)







He said the press and other American news media have helped bring this about by creating better understanding of the causes of poverty in today's industrial society.

"The personal involvement of so many citizens in the problems of the poor is one more indication that the American people can be counted on to act, once they know and understand what has to be done," he said.

Speaking at the American Legion Post in Elsmere, Mr. Chesbro said this stepped-up participation by private citizens and various groups in the community could be the vital key to success in America's war on poverty.

"To survive today, the poor need more than a subsistence

check," he said. stamp out poverty at its roots only if we pitch in with every community tool and resource to make the needy self-supporting: better education through the schools; better health and medical care through health facilities; better job opportunities; a wide variety of public and private welfare services; and voluntary help from private citizens, church groups and other community organizations. "

He said "community action" programs under the War on Poverty legislation are providing the machinery for this team-work approach. education programs for welfare recipients represent another step in the right direction. He also cited recent State legislation to promote the use of volunteers by local public welfare departments. Such citizen volunteers can not only provide a number of useful services for welfare clients, but the volunteers themselves can gain a better understanding of the job that faces public welfare and the nation.
