

Tales of Tawasentha

It's no longer easy to walk along the banks of the picturesque Normanskill Creek up Slingerlands way. Heavy laden tree branches, scrub brush, weeds and tall grass impede your progress, where once fertile filled fields ran to the water's edge. You have to be careful too, that your feet don't slip on the slimy clay banks, and the inexperienced may easily and excitedly mistake the round "clay dogs" sometimes

found there for early Indian relics, whereas they are really one of the artifacts of nature.

This "Vale of Tawasentha" or Normanskill Creek as we know it is one of the important tributaries of Albany County and of course was named for the first settler along its banks, Albert Andriessen Bradt, "de Noorman," so-called by the early Dutch settlers, because he came not from Holland, but was a native of Norway, and he settled here in 1630. These early settlers realized the abundant fertility of the valley's soil and as the first comers always chose the creek bottom lands for their own there were by 1763 over twenty farms located along the banks of the Normanskill. In later years there were driving mills not only in "lower hollow" or Kenwood, but in "upper hollow" too, — where the Delaware Avenue bridge now crosses from Albany into Elmsere, and known today as Normansville.

On up the creek from the present Normanside Country Club and along the banks of the stream lives one of the Tri-Village Area's real "natives" of which there are so few left. She's Mrs. John T. Delaney, "Ethel" to her many friends and acquaintances, and she has lived all her life in the pleasant antique-filled homestead built by her grandfather, Charles Moat in 1850, on land which belonged to his wife through her descent from the McCormack family. The first McCormack, Archibald by name, settled this very land in 1787 and it is from his family that the present McCormack Road received its name.

Archibald McCormack came to America from Scotland in the year 1787 and soon after reaching Albany he purchased the old "Truax Farm" of 640 acres about 5 miles from Albany and lying one half mile on either side of the Normanskill. The boundaries of this farm began about where the Mater Christi Seminary is now located on New Scotland Road

and ran to approximately the D. C. Herrick line on McCormack Road. The old bridge which crosses the Normanskill here on McCormack Road was approximately the center of the property (the bridge is now closed to traffic). While the area is not far in from the present New Scotland Road it is an oasis of rural countryside in the midst of a booming suburbia, and the people who live there would like to keep that pastoral quality, although it is being threatened with talk of a new, connecting road to New Scotland Road, thus opening up the area to future development.

This land was part of a large tract purchased from four Indian

chiefs in 1672 by Jan Van Baal and known in history as the "Van Baal Patent," and it included land from the Town of Bethlehem to the present Schenectady boundaries. In 1716 Omie La Grange and Johannes Symonse Vedder purchased a part of this patent for 250 lbs. In 1723 La Grange and Vedder sold one square mile of it to Abraham Truax. This deed is in the possession of Mrs. Delaney at present. The land proved to be a wise investment and parts of it are not only still in the possession of Mrs. Delaney, but of another McCormack descendant as well, Mr. Roy A. McCormack, well-known local business man and a resident of Delmar. Mr. Moat, Mrs. Delaney's grandfather, used his portion of the farmland to raise Jersey cattle and breed fine race horses. He made 20 trips to England to bring over blooded stock and his name for his place was "Tawasentha Farm."

Long before New Scotland Road came into being, the earlier road known as Albany-Rensselaerville-Schoharie Plank Road ran over what is now McCormack Road and passed through the Toll Gate at Slingerlands on the way west to New Scotland, New Salem and eventually to Schoharie. The hollow on McCormack Road at the old bridge where the road dipped down to the Normanskill was for a long time called "Mo-


lasses Hollow," because a cart-load of the syrupy stuff tipped over coming down the hill and the barrels tumbled off and were broken. People came running with buckets and pans to scoop up what they could, because molasses was a household staple in those earlier days.

Mrs. Delaney remembers, too, her grandfather telling of a few Indians who lived under the bridge where it crossed the creek on McCormack Road, back in the years when he first built his house. These Indians were remnants of the once powerful tribes which roamed our area and they were then reduced to making and selling baskets for their living. One particularly cold winter night he invited the Indians to come up to the house and they slept in the kitchen around the stove. When the folks arose in the morning the Indians had gone, and so were the baby clothes that had been hanging on a clothesline nearby. Other reminders that Indians were once plentiful in our valley is shown by a basketful of arrowheads which Mrs. Delaney's relatives have uncovered over the years while plowing the surrounding fields.

Within the next few days nearly every resident of Bethlehem will have occasion to cross the Normanskill. Don't just cross a bridge, but in your mind's eye, pause for a moment, and reflect on the impact this historic waterway has

The program, in Mr. Rook's opinion, would not need to be tax supported, but would be supported by a bond issue which would ultimately be liquidated by the proceeds from the sale of the water obtained.

Mr. Rook said that a similar program is now in effect in California and is supported by a \$3 billion bond issue. He noted that California's water problem is not the same as ours, but the principal of supply by a major governmental agency wholesaling water could well apply.

"Our problem in New York is not an actual shortage of water," said Mr. Rook, "but the unused water flowing out to the sea and of pollution of waters which could otherwise be used." He noted and praised the state administration's program on anti-pollution, but said his program

would supply the other half of the needed action.

As Assemblyman, Mr. Rook said he would urge the state administration to conduct a survey of the feasibility of applying the California water supply principal to New York and to submit plans for construction and financing to the legislature. Mr. Rook stated that he would support any reasonable enabling legislation which the administration might propose. "Obviously, the details of such a project are beyond the capacities of a single legislator, but a single legislator may by the impetus for such a project," said Mr. Rook.

Participation in the purchase of water would be entirely voluntary and optional on the part of the municipalities Mr. Rook explained. Thus those municipalities which might fare better

by retaining or creating their independent water supply would be free to do so.





toric and scenic value, transportation, water supply, pollution and waterfront blight.

According to Conrad L. Wirth, Executive Director of the Commission, representatives of responsible community organizations, as well as public officials, are welcome to attend the meeting and present their views. Arrangements to participate can be made by writing or wiring the Commission, at Bear Mountain, N.Y. 10911.

The Hudson River Valley Commission was appointed by Governor Rockefeller earlier this year to formulate recommendations for conservation and future development in the Mohawk-Hudson River basin. The thirteen-member Commission is headed by Laurance S. Rockefeller, brother of the Governor, who is Chairman of the State Council of Parks and is widely known as a leader in the field of conservation.

Mr. Wirth who will preside at the Troy meeting, is the former Director of the National Park Service. He retired last year after 14 years in that post.

In announcing the meeting, Mr. Wirth disclosed that the Commission's staff is currently assembling data on land use, zoning and other factors related to its work. However, he pointed out that "the Commission has no plan of development at this time and does not expect to formulate such a plan until it has conferred with the people concerned in the communities throughout the Hudson and Mohawk Valleys."

The Commission's studies will cover the entire length of the Hudson, from its source in the Adirondacks to its mouth at New York City, as well as the Mohawk Valley and other areas that make up the Hudson watershed. Both Federal and State agencies are cooperating with the Commission by supplying data and technical advice on matters under their jurisdiction.

The Commission is assisted by a permanent Advisory Committee. Its members were appointed by the Governor on the basis of their knowledge of land use, conservation and development problems in various sectors of the river basin. Members of the Advisory Com-



47 Million Protected

Major medical expense insurance protected 47,001,000 Americans by the end of 1964, and benefits from this coverage amounted to \$942,528,000 for the year, the Health Insurance Institute reported today.

Major medical was introduced 15 years ago by insurance companies to provide a high level of benefits for serious illness or injury.

Both in coverage and benefits, major medical registered record highs last year. Some 4,560,000 more persons (10.7 per cent) were protected under this insurance in 1964 than in 1963, and total benefits were \$129,778,000 higher.


The Institute noted that of the 151,123,000 persons with some form of health insurance in 1964, 31 per cent had major medical protection by insurance companies.

it plays in the personal economies of millions of American families, the Institute declared.

In 1951, 108,000 persons in the United States had major medical; by 1955, the total had risen to 5,241,000; and five years later, 1960, the total increased five-fold to 27,448,000.

Insurance companies provide major medical under group programs (usually at places of employment) and through individual and family type contracts.

These policies provide benefits for almost every type of necessary medical expense prescribed by a physician for an illness or injury both in or out of hospital including X-ray, prescribed medicines and drugs, medical appliances, physician's services, charges by registered nurse, and ambulance or other needed transportation, among other services.

Most major medical policies have two cost-sharing features — the deductible and coinsurance. The deductible is the amount the insured pays before benefits begin. Depending on the policy or contract, the deductible can range from \$50 to \$1,000 or more.

After the deductible, the benefits under the policy pay 75 or 80 per cent of the remaining bills. Benefits can range from \$5,000 to \$25,000.

State Police Set Arrest Record

New York State Police made a record number of 198,850 arrests for motor vehicle violations during the first half of this year, Superintendent Arthur Cornelius, Jr. announced today.

The total is a rise of 41,086, or 26 per cent, over the 157,764 arrests by State Police for traffic offenses in the same period last year. Arrests in the first six months of 1963 totaled 129,010.

Mr. Cornelius attributed the higher volume of arrests to more intensive enforcement aimed at reducing accidents.

In announcing the arrest figures, the Superintendent disclosed that Troopers have been directed to give close attention to moving violations by operators of motor scooters and motorcycles. The order takes cognizance of the growing popularity of these



vehicles reflected by an increase in registrations of 28.8 per cent last year over 1963.

Mr. Cornelius stated that "members in dealing with motor cycle operators should discuss the potential hazards of such machines and urge operators to exercise extreme caution in the interest of their own safety.

A breakdown of the six months' arrest figures shows that 95,052 of the total of 198,850 were for speeding. This compares with 77,096 speeding arrests in the first half of 1964.

Radar operations accounted for 52,980 or 55.7 per cent of the 1965 speeding charges, while the balance were made by Troopers on routine patrols.

During the first six months, radar units were operated for 31,950 hours, resulting in an average of 1.6 speeding arrests per hour of use.

State Police investigated 18,390 accidents in the first half of the year, 1,979 or 12 per cent, more than in the same period of 1964. This year's accidents investigated by State Police took 310 lives, 38 more than last year, and caused 6,531 personal injuries, an increase of 692 over 1964.

As a result of accidents, the State Police made 7,909 arrests compared with 5,649 similar arrests in the first half of 1964.

Speed too fast for conditions was listed as the cause of 6,736 of the 18,390 accidents. Failure to keep right was cited as the cause of 2,151 accidents, tailgating as the cause of 1,564, and failure to yield right of way as the cause of 1,396. Animals on the highway were blamed for 1,282 accidents.
