
ALLANSON MUSIC EXHIBIT AT CITY AND COUNTY BANK



The story of music in America is a fascinating one unparalleled in any other part of the world — and area residents now have an unusual opportunity to enjoy and appreciate that story through the exhibit "American Musical Heritage" of Mr. Clifford A. Allanson of Delmar who is pictured at the display.

Announced by Mr. Frederick W. Stolz, bank president, the presentation is currently featured in the Community Exhibit Room at City and County Savings Bank and is part of a collection of more than 700 units — some simple and crude — some more elaborate and refined — but all important in the development of American culture.

The instruments shown were not selected from the collection on the basis of beauty, value or playability, but in order to present a few vignettes from the past. The parlor organ — the music boxes — zithers — the homemade primitives — and the battered bass horn from a carnival band — each were important to American life.

In value, the items vary from trivia to the choice music box. In age, from the french horn and the dulcimer - which came to this country during the 18th century - to the phonographs which were used during the earlier days of the current century.

Mr. Allanson, Executive Director of the New York State Council of Retails Merchants, Inc., has devoted time and effort for more

than 30 years to assembling the story of music in America in terms of musical instruments and related items. His exhibit is presented with the hope that to some viewers, it will convey a bit of nostalgia — to some, more knowledge of music and musical instruments — and to all, an appreciation of our heritage and good fortune in living in the America of today.

"American Musical Heritage" can be seen at the bank's Downtown Office at 100 State Street, Albany, weekdays from 9:00 A. M. to 3:00 P. M. and, in addition, Thursdays until 8:00 P. M., through August 31 — and everyone is invited.

Bethlehem Residents Reap Benefits of Sound Investment Policies, Census

Counting heads in an off-year census and prudent investment of tax funds not immediately needed for expenditure for Town purposes are policies that are paying handsome dividends to residents of the Town of Bethlehem.

The investment program will net Town taxpayers an estimated \$18,000 this year. Those earnings will be increased by from \$9,050 in 1966 to \$12,050 for each of the years 1967-1970 as the result of an interim-period population census ordered by the Town Board earlier this year.

Details of the two programs, Bethlehem Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke said, will be given to the Board at its next meeting two weeks hence.

Bethlehem's investment program, undertaken by authorization of the State Comptroller, has returned nearly \$47,000 since 1961, Mr. Kohinke said. In 1965 alone, the Town expects to receive interest of approximately \$18,000 on the more than \$1 million it has invested so far this year.

These are the amounts the Town has earned on its investment of tax monies during the aforementioned years:

The special census was undertaken last March by the U. S. Department of Commerce with a contract entered into by Supervisor Kohinke at the behest of the Town Board. The census, which ordinarily would not have been repeated until 1970, showed that the population of Bethlehem had grown from \$18,936 in 1960 – according to the last

Federal census - to slightly more than 21,000.

As a result of this growth, the Town will receive, for the final three quarters of 1966 – starting with next April 1 – additional state per capita assistance payments totalling \$9,067. Full-year payments thereafter up to and including 1970 will amount to \$12,050 annually, for a total additional revenue of \$57,000 in a four and three-quarter year period. Cost of the census was only \$4,061.

Mr. Kohinke pointed out that in making investments with Town tax funds, "there is no risk to the Town."

"The law stipulates," he said, "the type of investment to be made, such as certificates of deposit, treasury notes and the like. Under the protection of this and other iron-clad guarantees, we have invested more than \$1,000,000 so far in 1965. By continuing to study our needs and cash flow, additional investments will be made during this year. And investments maturing will be re-invested as circumstances permit."

A PASTOR IS CURIOUS . . .

Curiosity is a strong emotion. The Rev. Paul H. Gassmann, Pastor of Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Delmar has found that out.

Mr. Gassmann has just come into our area from New Jersey and has been filling himself in on our local history. Little did he expect to find a grave in his back yard. Yet when the new Lutheran parsonage was being laid out in the heavily wooded section of the Church property, a lone tombstone was discovered.

The mystery: Whose grave is it? Time and weather have all

but obliterated the inscription. Yet there is just enough left to stir up curiosity. You can read the words "Barbara, the wife of ----. The letters Van Re---can be made out. Was this a relative of the Patroon who once owned all of this area? The numeral "17" can also be deciphered. Does this grave date all the way back to the 1700 or perhaps 1817? No other gravestones keep this one company.

"It is not only curiosity that is bothering me," says Pastor Gassmann, "but in my travels around the countryside I have seen many graves stuck off in little patches of weeds and overgrown with brush. I have a feeling that our pioneer men and women and those who gave us this beautiful section of the country deserve better than this."







Bethlehem to Appeal Decision

The Town of Bethlehem will appeal a court decision which ruled that a state law permitting annexation is constitutional.

The Town Board supported Attorney Arthur McCormick, who recommended an appeal. The court battle will now go to the seven-judge Court of Appeals.

If the law is found unconstitutional, by reversing the Appellate Division ruling, Bethlehem will keep two areas which seek annexation to Albany: Karlsfeld-Hurstville and Whitehall Road.

If the Court of Appeals upholds the law, Bethlehem will return to a three-man panel of judges appointed by the Appellate Division, and a court trial.

file the town's notice of appeal in the near future. The Appelate Division, when it ruled the law constitutional, gave a 30day period in which to appeal. That period began about three weeks ago.

In other action at last night's meeting, the Town Board unanimously approved an extension of the town water district to serve the Beaver Dam Road area and the Cedar Hill area along Route 144. Citizen reaction at the public hearing was unanimously in favor of the extension.

J. Kenneth Fraser, consulting engineer, explained that current assessed valuation in the region "in itself is not enough to see this project materialize," but said that if several proposed businesses -- including a national motel and a service station - locate in the area after water is given, the cost per \$1,000 in assessed valuation will be somewhere between \$36.50 and \$26.

It was standing room only in the upstairs Town Hall meeting room as about 70 persons crowded in to express their delight. After 52 persons spoke in favor (another person wrote a letter), Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke termed it "one of the finest public hearings" he'd ever presided at. He earlier assured the residents that the Town Board would approve the extension when they moved downstairs to readjourn their regular meeting. And the Town Board did.

Residents speaking in favor said that the lack of water had created a health hazard. One man said they already had some running water - "You get a pailful and run with it." Anothers pointed out that water could lure commercial and residential development to the area.

At its regular session, the board approved another water extension -- the one which would service the Route 9W area in the southern part of town. Both extensions must now be approved by the State Department of Audit and Control and the State Water Resources Commission.

The board referred to the planning board a request by Louis Alteri Jr., operator of Alteri's Restaurant in Selkirk, for rezoning of land on the east side







Speedy Scot . . . Yes, Speedy Scot, perhaps the greatest trotter in the history of the sport, has accepted the invitation of Saratoga Raceway management to compete in the \$15,000 Chris Spencer tomorrow night.

The fabulous Speedster stallion

joins Big John, Duke Rodney, Express Rodney and the illustrious Su Mac Lad for this Big Event and there's no telling just how fast this race may go. There's one thing for sure, Darn Safe's world's record of 1:59 4/5 stands in great jeopardy. That terrific mark was established back in

1957, the only time a trotter has gone better than two minutes in a race. If it is ever eclipsed, it figures to be right here where it was established over the fastest nighttime half-mile oval in the world.

Standing over 16 hands high and weighing about 1,100 pounds, Speedy Scot is one of the biggest and most powerful standardbreds ever to set hoof on a racetrack. Trainer-driver Ralph Baldwin has guided the pride of Lexington's Castleton Farm to win every major event in harness racing. Speedy picked up 14 wins and \$90.796 as a juvenile and then swept Trotting's Big Four, the Hambletonian, the Kentucky Futurity, the Dexter Cup and the Yonkers Futurity as a three-yearold. He entered his four-year-old campaign with a bankroll of \$335,199 and promptly became the first winner of the \$50,000 Founder's Plate. Right now Speedy is the second greatest money winning trotter of all the time with some \$650,909 stashed awav.

The Scot took his terrific mark of 1:56 4/5 over a mile course as a three-year-old.

This season figures to be the last for the champion as he will probably enter the sire's ranks next season. It's a sure thing that Baldwin won't be pulling any punches tomorrow night as he takes dead aim on Darn Safe's world record.

Certainly Chris Spender shapes up as perhaps the best contest ever at the "dollhouse of the trotting tracks."
