PUBLIC IS INVITED TO 'SEE HOW A PLAY IS PUT TOGETHER' ON SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 18

An opportunity to see firsthand how a play is put together will be offered the public by the Slingerlands Community Players at an open house on Saturday, September 18, from 6 to 9 P. M.

All interested residents of the Capital District are invited to see working demonstrations of the various phases of theatre craft during the open house at the Players' headquarters, over Ravida's Market on New Scotland Road (Route 85) near the underpass in Stingerlands.

John L. Moore, Players President, announced that the event will be part of the Players' annual season ticket campaign, but emphasized that no solicitation for tickets will be made at the open house. For those interested, tickets will be available.

Comedy is emphasized in the Slingerlands Players' 1965-1966 Season, beginning with "The Thurber Carnival" to be presented October 22 and 23. This play features vignettes based upon James Thurber's whacky and rollicking stories. The season also will end with a comedy, George Bernard Shaw's wry and witty "Ardrocles and the Lion", on April 29 and 30, a modern classic of sophisticated humor. Offsetting these antic offerings will be a mid-season drama, "Inherit the Wind", on January 21 and 22. This play dramatizes the courtroom confrontation of William Jennings Bryan and Clarence Darrow during the famous Scopes "monkey" trial of the 1920's, when the teaching of Darwin's Theory of Evolution in the public schools became a national controversy.

How these plays will be assembled and staged will be shown in "living color" at the Players' open house September 18. Guests will witness play tryouts, when actors read for roles in a show and the director casts his play. Visitors will be welcome to take part in these tryouts if they wish, or simply watch them.

An exhibit of set preparation will show how the stage evolves from a design to the wood and canvas structures the actors inhabit during the play. SCP technicians will give a display of stage lighting techniques, showing how the various types of lights create and enhance the mood of a show.

Makeup, which helps transform an actor into the character he is portraying, will be demonstrated with members of the Players being made up for various roles Here, too, the visitor can participate if he wishes, being made up as an actor would be before a play. Costumes also will be displayed, with demonstrations of how garments are specially adapted for theatre roles.

Refreshments will be served to guests at the open house and members of the Players will be hosts, explaining various phases of community theatre activities to visitors.

"We hope the public will respond to our invitation to take open house," Mr. Moore said. "We feel that it will help strengthen the fine bond that already exists between the Players and the community, and is our way of saying 'Thank you' to the public for its continuing and heartening support of our offerings. We hope it will give added insight into and enjoyment of our plays, and we extend to you a most warm invitation to attend."

The SCP President also announced that the first Players' meeting of the season will be held Sunday September 10, at 8 P. M. at the rooms. A special program will be presented by Martin Margulies following the business meeting.



"Metooism" Charged by Candidates for Councilmen

Two Republican organization candidates for re-election as councilmen in the Town of Bethlehem today charged their primary opponents with being victims of "attacks of virulent metooism", and challenged them to state where the present administration has "materially failed to serve our people and serve them well".



ters of every kind?"

"The answer appears to be in the type of campaign they and other insurgent town office-seekers have been carrying on campaigns of vituperation and vilification, broad innuendo and selfpraise."

It is the Republican policy in Bethlehem, the two councilmen stated, to have each section of the town represented on the town board. They accused their opposition of attempting to seek added representation for the Delmar and Slingerlands sections, to the exclusion of the Elsmere and Selkirk areas.

Mr. McWilliams lives in Delmar and Mr. Clayton in Slingerlands. Mr. Burton resides in Elsmere and Mr. Williams in Selkirk.

The Slingerlands section now is represented by Edward C. Tall-madge and the Delmar area by George Butman, neither of whose board memberships is involved in the present elections.

"Does our opposition suggest", the Burton-Williams statement said, "that Delmar and Slingerlands should each have two seats on the Town Board, and that Elsmere and Selkirk should be without representation at all?"

"We do not believe the people of the Town of Bethlehem are going to be influenced by men whose sole claim to political fame seems to be their contention that a primary is sort of fun, and that those who have helped to provide good government for all our people should be turned out of office because of a personal grudge or to further their self-seeking cause."

"It is certainly true that politics can make strange bedfellows. The present coalition, as an example, of once-bitter political enemies in a common attack on good, honest government will not, we believe, fool anyone, especially the type of person that makes up the citizenry of our Town of Bethlehem."

"As for us", they concluded, "we are willing — in fact proud — to run to our record with the other loyal Republicans on the organization ticket."
