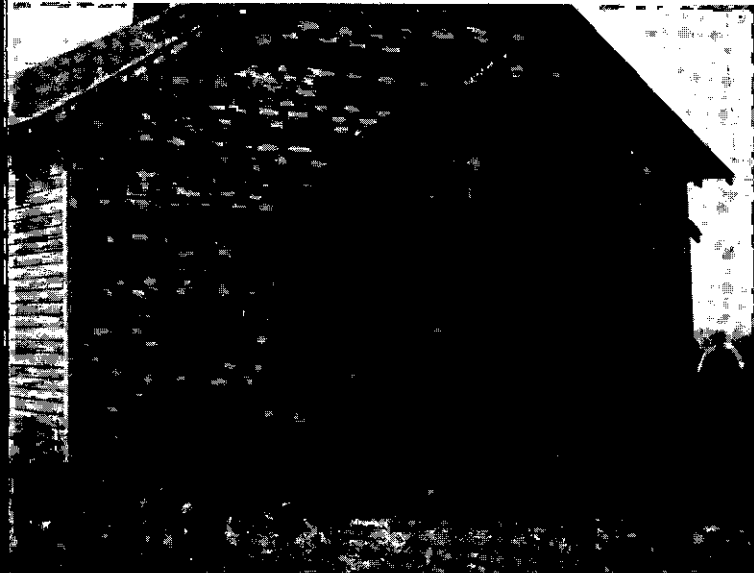

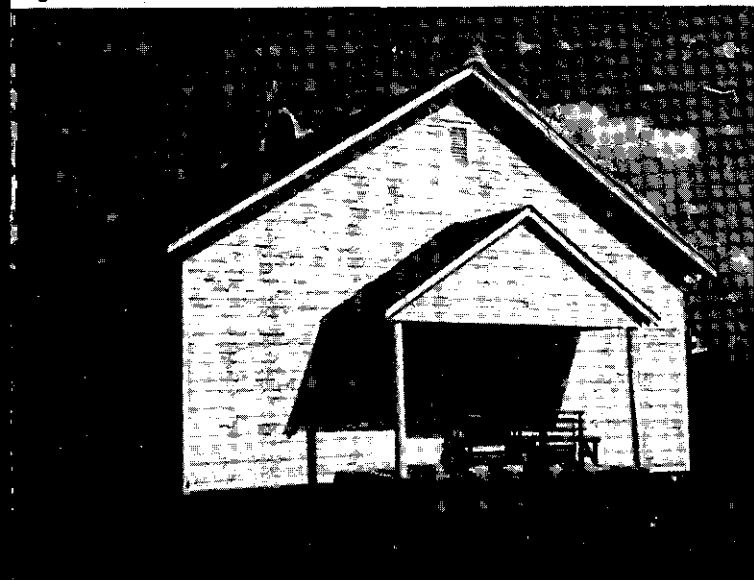

Rev. David Boyce and Students Find Rewarding Work in Kentucky

This summer, as in the past, the Reformed Church in America sponsored workcamps at mission stations throughout the country. For the past two years and this summer, the Rev. David Boyce, pastor of the Glenmont Community Church (Reformed), and his family have spent part of their summer vacation working at Annville Institute in Kentucky. In 1963 Pastor Boyce and his family led and taught Daily Vacation Bible School for the mountain children in that area of Kentucky. In 1964 and '65, Mr. Boyce directed a workcamp at Annville.

This year the workcampers spent a week of their summer roofing and painting a community center, several miles from Annville, called Seven Pines at De-balt, Ky. This building is used for worship, Sunday School, and community meetings in the area. The planned work was completed plus odd carpentry work, glass replacement, and the inside cleaned and scrubbed.

Workers come from all over

the United States. The area workers this year included: Mr. Boyce's daughters, Janet and Martha, a senior and sophomore respectively; and Dan Atchinson, a junior, all students at Bethlehem Senior High School. Another capital district boy also participated, Bruce Aitken from Schenectady. Several Kentucky men and boys also helped with the work.

Mrs. Boyce was in charge of the kitchen duties while the workcampers were there; and their youngest daughter, Kathy, a sixth grader at Glenmont Elementary School, helped out with various chores.

Dan Atchinson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Atchinson of Glenmont. Dan was very much impressed with the "friendliness and industriousness" of the people in this Appalachian area. He is looking forward to another year of participating in this work.

The workcampers must provide their own transportation to and from the various areas of mission work. Only room and board are provided.

Annville Institute in Jackson County, Kentucky, a day and boarding school sponsored and operated by the RCA for over 50 years, provides education for more than 100 mountain children. The campus includes dormitories, cafeteria, industrial arts building, the school, and a farm run by the children. Many children work at the Institute all summer to pay for their tuition.

To the residents of Bethlehem Town next Monday night comes an important opportunity to put their family property and financial affairs on a sounder basis, when the new course "Everyman's Estate Planning" becomes a part of the local Adult Education curriculum through the cooperation of John Falvey, Director.

This will mark the first time that the committee which devised the Instructor's Manual will itself have given the course, — the first of its kind to be offered at state governmental level in any of our 50 states.

Two of the committee are Bethlehem residents, — James Barton, Slingerlands, Estate Planning Officer at National Commercial Bank, and Robert Fallon, Delmar, investment broker associated with R. W. Pressprich & Company, Hunting Sherrill, associated with John Whitcraft, Chief of the Bureau of Business and Distributive Education of the New York State Department of Education, was chairman of the committee. Both have indicated their intention to take the course.

Other members of the committee are James Conway, Albany attorney; Frank Staucet, life underwriter with the Provident

Mutual Life Insurance Company; and Max Zuckerman, Albany CPA.

The course will cover six successive Monday evenings and will be handled as a team effort by the committee. Time will be allocated to questions from the class in the latter part of the six two-hour session. 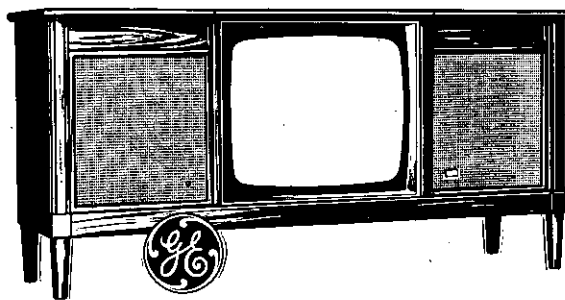

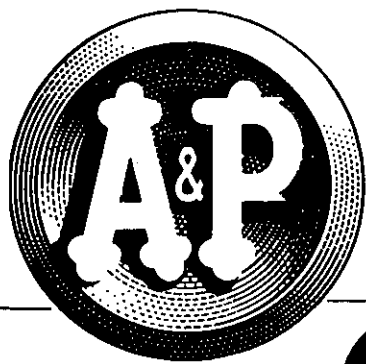



Opening the Slingerlands Players' 1965-66 Season will be the comedy, "The Thurber Carnival," a series of antic vignettes based on the whacky writings of the late James Thurber. This sardonic look at mankind will be presented April 29 and 30 with Harlan Wilbert as director.

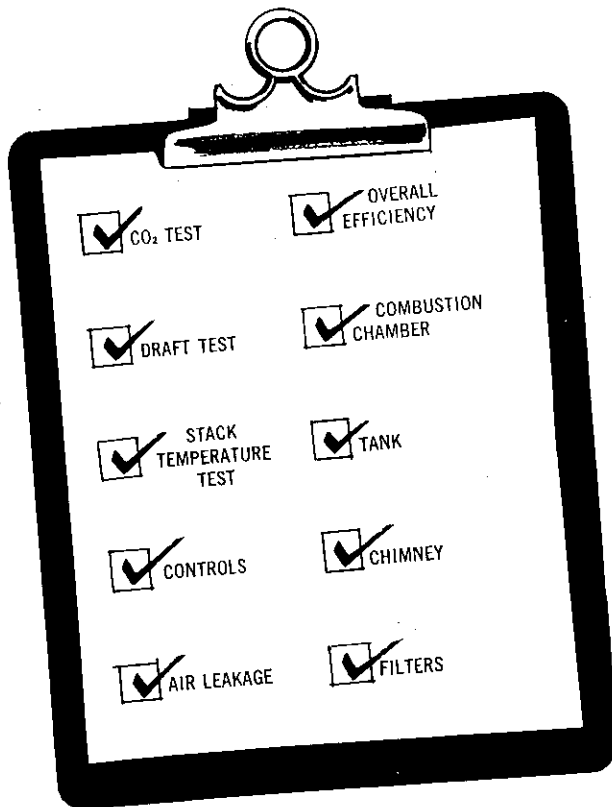
All plays will be presented in the comfortable, modern auditorium of Bethlehem Central High School, where there is plenty of free parking.

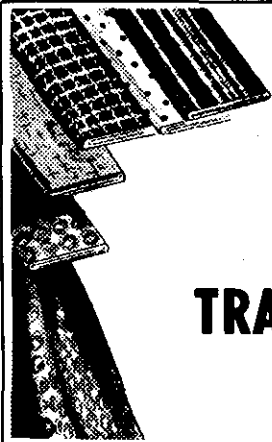

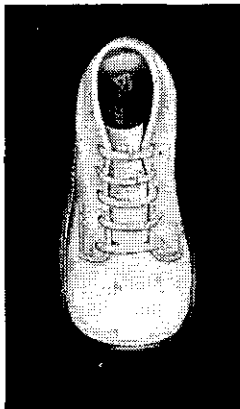

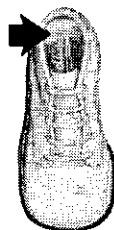

Human Rights

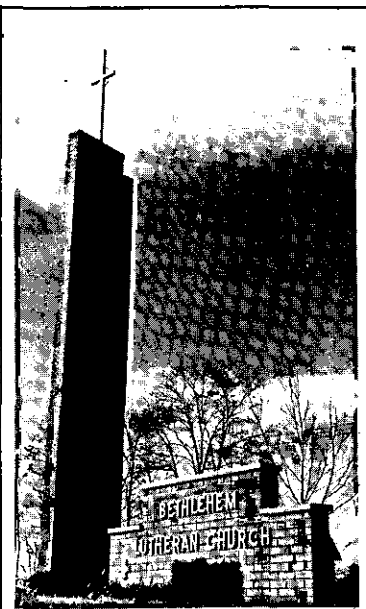
Human rights, prejudice and sources of racial tension are issues that will be in the spotlight during the lectures, panels and group discussions of the HUMAN RIGHTS PROGRAM SERIES are being planned for six Monday evenings during October and early November, at the Bethlehem Central Junior High School, in Delmar, New York.

Four State and local organizations are cooperating in the development and conduct of this series of programs. They are: the New York State Commission for human rights, the Albany Community Council to the Commission, the Bethlehem Board of Education, and the Tri-Village Interfaith Committee. Chairman of the cooperating committee is C. Jordan Vail, of Delmar.

The HUMAN RIGHTS PROGRAM SERIES, announced as "an adventure in understanding," will present hard facts, objective analysis and professional evaluation in an open forum featuring free discussion in small groups.

Preliminary plans call for separate programs on topics such as the Civil Rights Movement, Prejudice, Education, Employment, Housing and Interracial Tensions. The series begins on October 4 at 8:00 P. M. and will continue on successive Monday nights through November 8. Following opening lectures or panel discussions in the Junior High School Auditorium, the participants in the SERIES will break up into small groups for in-depth discussion and dialogue in classroom areas.
