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

Human Rights

The fourth of six sessions of the Human Rights Program Series will be concerned with the disparity in job placement, via discrimination, and with the role of government placement agencies. "Employment - 'place' or placement" is the topic to be discussed by two area men having extensive familiarity with problems and progress in this area: Dorman Avery, Field Representative of the State Commission for Human Rights, and Leo J. Allard, Employment Security Manager, New York State Employment Service. The meeting is to take place on Monday. October 25, 1965, at 8:00 P. M., in the auditorium of the Bethlehem Central Junior High School, in Delmar.

Dorman Avery, a Field Representative of the State Commission for Human Rights, was for five years Associate Pastor of the Temple Baptist Church in Albany, one of the first churches in the area with an integrated pastorate. Mr. Avery also served for a brief period with the State Youth Commission, and, prior to coming to Albany, was a social worker for the Youth Conservation Services of Philadelphia.

Mr. Avery has a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry from Shaw University, Raleigh, North Carolina, and a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He is active in civic affairs, being a board member of the Albany YWCA, and of the Capitol District Travelers Aid Society.

Leo J. Allard, Employment Security Manager, New York State Employment Service, is in charge of both the Professional and Commercial Placement Center, and the Industrial, Service, Casual and Household Placement Office, in Albany. Mr. Allard graduated from Cohoes High School and received a degree in Engineering from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. Company for the third quarter of 1965 increased 10.07% over the comparable period last year, Lester W. Herzog, Jr., president, announced recently.

For the first nine months of 1965, net operating earnings were \$2,744,212 or 19.23% higher than recorded last year.

Increased interest expense on Savings Accounts due to the new 4% rate, which became effective July 1, plus the normal additional expenses associated with the large merger consummated with the Citizens Trust Company of Schenectady in the latter part of June, will tend to restrict rapid growth of earnings for the balance of the year. President Herzog stated management does anticipate an increase of modest proportions in Bank earnings for the last uarter of 1965.

The Board of Directors has declared a Cash Dividend of 45 cents per share payable October 1, 1965.


tioned earlier, has just published a book entitled, "Canal, Water and Whiskey," which is an historical account of the Erie Canal.
