Kohinke: Water Restriction Lifted

Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke, in an exclusive Spotlight interview, announced today that the water restriction in the Town of Bethlehem has been lifted, effective immediately.

The Supervisor reported that the present level of the Vly Reservoir is 380.0 feet compared to 380.1 on November 16, 1964, and that the recent rain raised the level .07 feet.

Mr. Kohinke and the Town Board take this opportunity to express their appreciation to all the people of the Town for their cooperation and understanding during the period of restriction.

At a special meeting of the Town Board, the recommendation of Harold Barkhuff, Water District Superintendent, that the restriction of the use of water be discontinued, was accepted, effective immediately.

Supervisor Kohinke asks that everyone still conserve water, and those who have private water supplies, should continue to use them.

Good News

Through sound planning and good business administration by the men who have the responsibility for running Town of Bethlehem affairs, the Town tax rate for 1966 will be reduced.

Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke announced that the general Town and Highway combined tax rate for 1966 will be reduced .54¢ per \$1,000.00 — the Sewer tax rate will be reduced .04¢ per \$100.00 and the Water tax rate will be reduced .07¢ per \$100.00.

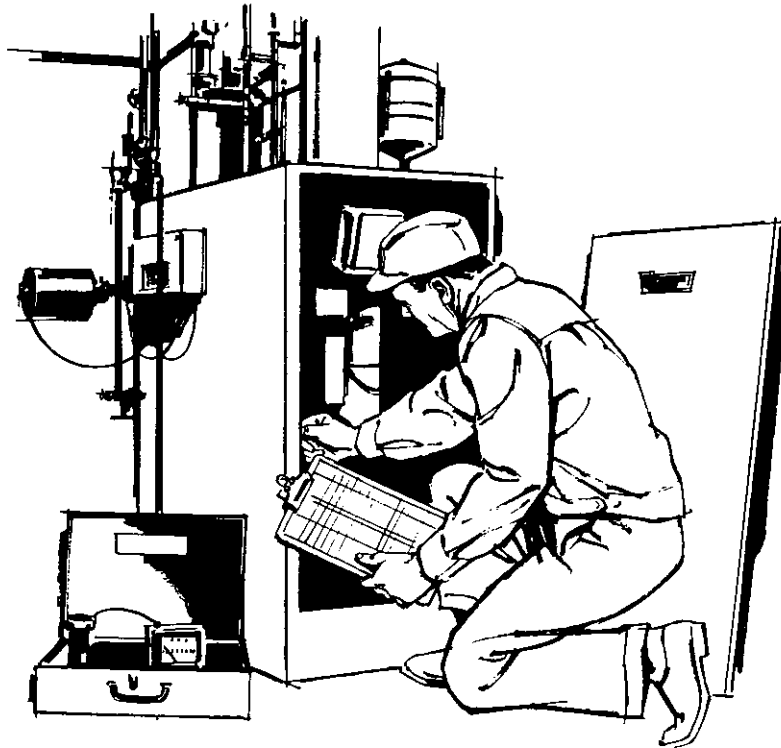

as Chairman of the Workman's Compensation Board under the Dewey Administration from April 1, 1945 until the time of her resignation in December 1954. She was at that time, a resident of Chatham and was active in many area organizations.

At the termination of her duties with the Compensation Board, Judge Donlon sat as an Appeals Judge in more than 2,000 litigated cases. On June 22, 1955, she was appointed Judge of the United State Customs Court by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. pense, Rook said "the confusion doesn't bother me half as much as the clear evidence of intellectual dishonesty involved . . .

"Nice guy" is too easily and glibly translated into 'good record' - this guy doesn't have a good record - he failed to represent his constituents' interest in the legislature - and when he was there he spent his time playing cut-out-and-paste-up with the legitimate bills of others."

During the past week, Mr. Rook commented on the proposed Slingerlands bypass - calling for responsible action on the "sword of Damocles" hanging over the heads of Slingerlands residents.

How many Slingerlands residents do you know," he asked an impromptu crowd "who have seen their property values plummet . . . and how many property sales in Slingerlands have fallen through because nobody knows where the bypass will eventually be constructed?"

He then pointed out that the first leg of the bypass will soon be completed, but since the Department of Public Works has not yet mapped the route, the bypass will end at New Scotland Road, thereby channelling all traffic onto the two-lane highway, making it a traffic hazard for little children and further devaluating property in Slingerlands.

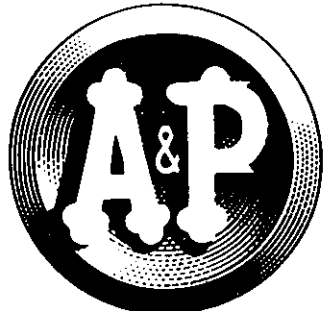

The Carrolls received a letter from Chip last week, in which he described the hardships of his assignment but concluded by saying, "I wouldn't want to be anywhere else."

Chip's wife, Gretchen, whom he met while both were undergraduates at Syracuse University, is living and teaching in Okinawa. Mrs. Terrence Briggs, the former Mary Ellen Freeman and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank T. Freeman of 403 Wellington Road, is also living now in Okinawa while her husband is in Viet Nam.

Terry and Mary Ellen were

married last March, and he is on an 18-month assignment for Air Force Security. Mary Ellen's cousin, Miss Pat Paul of Goshen, New York, visited Mary Ellen in Okinawa for a few weeks last month and they took a side trip to Hong Kong for six days.

Mary Ellen's letters to her parents are full of descriptive superlatives about the beauty and modern conditions in Okinawa today. The people there are very friendly, she writes, and the island is "just like a picture book." Obviously, she has adjusted very quickly to the different environment she finds herself in, and is enduring the uncertainty of her husband's present assignment with youthful matter-of-factness.

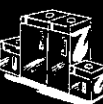

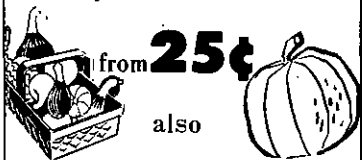
"He writes that he's glad to be there," Carol told me recently, "and he's very enthusiastic about the work being done by our forces."

ing mission through Viet Cong territory and stepped on a land mine. His mother had been visiting her brother and his family here, keeping house for them after the death of Mrs. Pritchard, when she heard the bad news.

She left immediately for California, where Bob is at the U. S. Naval Hospital. His wife and three children are also there with him.

In a recent letter to Mrs. Charles ("Tracy") Walsh of 187 Rowland Avenue, Mrs. Tunnell described conditions at the naval hospital. "The morale is very high," she wrote. "These boys are all in wheelchairs - not Hondas - but their high spirits are truly inspiring."

These close-to-home examples of our fighting forces in Viet Nam serve as an appropriate other-side-of-the-coin picture when compared to the recent news of collegiate demonstrations against our involvement in Viet Nam - highlighted by the much-publicized incidents of draft card burning.

"When I read Mrs. Tunnell's letter, I was in tears," Tracy Walsh confided to me. And those of us who knew Bernie Kolenberg, the Times-Union photographer who was killed in Viet Nam, wept unashamedly for him.

What seems most striking about any close association with our men in Viet Nam is the fact that, to a man, they feel dedicated to their jobs there, they want to be there, and they are making personal sacrifices and risking their lives with a quiet courage that should be an inspiration to all of us, as we sit in our comfortable homes and scan the headlines about that far away of terror and turmoil.

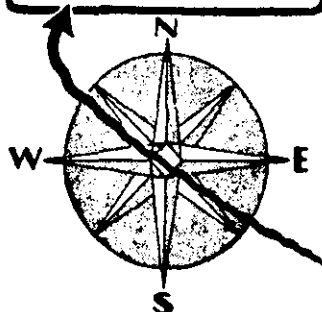
