Veterans' Day

Veterans' Day in the Town of Bethlehem will be celebrated with a special ceremony at Veterans' Memorial Park on Delaware Avenue at 11 A. M. on November 11.

Chairman for the program is a World War I veteran, George Reeber of Delmar. A contingent of the Bethlehem Memorial Post of Foreign Wars will be led by Commander Robert K. Oliver, from Nathaniel Adams Blanchard American Legion Post, Commander Edward J. Costigan, the Post color guard and the firing squad under the direction of Richard Lenseth.

Giving special significance to the occasion will be the dedication of a sculptured American eagle in bronze set atop the park's granite memorial to the community's war veterans.

Town Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke on behalf of the Town of Bethlehem, will accept the bronzework.

The emblem is the work of nearby artist Frank Litto of New Baltimore.



TV Program

A long range plan for the interior design of a room should be made before a rug or carpet is chosen.

Consider the background of the room, the center of interest, balance (between light and dark areas), the function of the rugs and carpets and the kind of use they will get.

Rug construction is no longer a major consideration in the selection of rugs and carpets, since good carpets can be produced by any method providing the work done is a good quality.

Rug fibers are not the most important consideration either.

Quality can be judged best by considering the pile height, pile density, yarn ply and weight, backing and price. A good rule of thumb to follow is the deeper, the denser, the better.

In general, price is an indication of quality, but compare retail prices - not sale prices.
