

Dolls, Dolls!

What has become a tradition, the Christmastime display of dolls, will be open to the public at National Savings Bank, 90 State Street, Albany from November 30 through December 6. This is the thirteenth year The Salvation Army has made available dolls which are dressed by various groups. Responsible this year for the 1400 different costumes are New York Telephone Company, Altamont Post #7662, Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary and the following departments and sections of the New York State offices: Audit and Control, Civil Service, Commerce, Employment (Addressograph and Field Audits), Labor (Employment and Research). Public Works (Finance and Right of Way), Social Welfare, Taxation and Thruway Authority in Elsmere.

All of the dolls will be given to little girls, many of whom might not receive a gift if it were not for The Salvation Army and its many friends.

Individual patients in the Veterans' Hospital, Albany, will be able to choose dolls to be given as Christmas gifts by them to their own little girls. This distribution will take place the morning of December 8. About 700 of the dolls will be selected as workers help The Salvation Army in spreading this good cheer throughout the hospital.

Christmas morning and during the year, some patients in children's wards of local hospitals will receive dolls.

The Salvation Army Toy Shop will open on December 21. Dolls and toys, gift-wrapped, all ready for Santa Claus, will be selected (without charge) by mothers for the little girls and boys in their families.

WATER THROUGH THE AGES

What has been the single most important factor in the development of mankind? Water! Without it a person would die within a few days. Throughout history it has been one of man's most valuable resources.

The first civilizations developed in the river valleys of the Nile, the Tigris and the Ganges. These rivers provided early man with drinking water and irrigation for the crops he grew. Where man squandered his water, civilization failed. The first catastrophes were

the result of failing to plan ahead. And so primitive man, aware of water's vast importance, began building reservoirs to store it and aqueducts to carry it from one place to another.

Excavations have uncovered one aqueduct built in the Nile Valley as early as 2000 B. C. Traces of ancient wells, reservoirs and aqueducts have also been discovered in such diverse places as China and Central America. But none of these systems could compare in efficiency to the modern delivery systems that carry billions of gallons



of water to today's Americans. According to the American Wato the public at the rate of 150 gallons per person each day.

In addition to its practical uses, water has also figured in the beliefs of many peoples. Before storage and transmission of water, man relied directly on the rains for his water supply. and out of this dependency grew many rituals and superstitions

that still survive, such as the forked branch of hazel, called a divining rod. When controlled by a qualified person, the rod is said, to this day, to be able to indicate by its movements the presence of water-springs.

The ancient Hebrews believed that rain was a blessing from Heaven in return for their obedience to the law. Drought, they thought, was the result of their having sinned in some way.

To the Greeks and Romans, Zeus (or Jupiter) was also considered the god of rain. The Greek rainmakers dipped a branch of the oak (Zeus' sacred tree) into water. The Romans

cast little images into the Tiber River.

The Druids went in processions to sacred wells or springs where they beat upon the surface of the water, poured water over special stones and tossed it into the air. In Christian times these rites were taken over by the Church, and the processions were led by a priest and the image of a saint. But in later times, the practice was denounced and forbidden.



In modern India, Buddhist priests try to induce rain by pouring water into little holes in the temple floor to symbolize rain sinking into the earth. In southern India, women tie a frog to a winnowing fan and sing a song about the frog's need for water while other women pour water on it.

Thanks to modern techniques for processing and storing water, modern Americans don't have to rely on amulets and incantations to assure an adequate supply for their needs. According to the American Water Works Association, the real problem isn't a shortage of water,

but lack of planning and building of facilities on the part of many communities.

Whether you ever realize it or not, the United States is presently using less than 25% of the fresh water that is economically available — so there is more than enough water to meet all our future demands. The Association notes that restrictions on its use occur only in cases where men have failed to arrange far enough in advance for the facilities necessary to store, process, and deliver water to users.

But hundreds of American communities today are reaping the results of their failure to plan for today's water demands. Others will in the future if they fail to act now. For more information on what your community can do to assure an adequate supply of water, even during dry spells, write for the free booklet, "Better Water for Americans," American Water Works Association, 2 Park Avenue, New York, N. Y. 10016.

As the U.S. has grown, so have its water utilities multiplied and improved. America's first piped water supply was built in Boston in 1652. Between 1652 and 1800, only nine water works were known in this country compared to 20,000 in existence today.

Today water is even more vital to the welfare of American com-







The History Of Carpets

One chilly evening, a Stone Age hunter put the fleece of a wild sheep between himself and the cave floor — and the carpet was born. It has held the floor ever since.

It has also been hung on walls, spread over tables, even draped as a mantle over chilly shoulders during its long history. Some of its ingenious uses have been developed by modern interior decorators, to bring new beauty and drama into American homes.

Rug-making is one of the oldest civilized arts. Paintings of carpetweavers at work can be seen on the 4500 year old rock tombs of Beni Hasson, Egypt. Similar drawings at Nineveh show that fine rugs were part of that Biblical city's taste for easy-living luxury. Persian rugs were already prized in 550 B.C.; a Greek writer named Xenophon describes them as thick and yielding underfoot.

In 52 B.C., Julius Caesar became one of the first men in recorded history to roll out the red carpet for an extra-special visitor. His caller: Cleopatra! The story goes that she had herself wrapped in a rug and smuggled into the Roman conqueror's headquarters to ask his help in getting rid of enemies who were plotting against her.

Orientals have always been wrapped up in the subject of rugs. For many centuries, family life literally revolved around the carpet, which served as table, chair and bed in scantily furnished homes. When their imaginations soared, Middle Easterners told tales of flying carpets; one such legend actually appears in the Mohammedan Bible, the Koran! It tells of King Solomon's carpet, big enough to accomodate his whole kingdom - men and women passengers on the right, spirits on the left!



In Europe, by contrast, carpets - magical or not - were almost unheard of until just a few centuries ago. During the Middle Ages; people walked on floors strewn with straw or rushes. Tapestry floor coverings were used only for state receptions, or beside a royal bed.

When Oriental rugs began to be imported in the 16th Century, no one dreamed of actually stepping on these treasures! Instead, they were proudly displayed on tables, chests and cupboards as the newest statis symbol.

These rugs, which reached Europe from Persia, were produced by an art which was very close to being a science. According to American Cyanamid Company researchers, 16th Century, Persian carpet specialists conducted experiments in dve-making, and studied data on how sheep's wool was affected by climate, altitude and diet!

By a series of interesting twists, hooks and crooks, the West soon developed its own carpet industry. The Louvre in Paris, now known as the home of Mona Lisa and the Venus de Milo, was once the headquarters of French carpet weavers by decree of King Henry IV in

When Henry's successors began to persecute the Huguenots or Protestants, many of France's best rugweavers had to flee to England - and that country became noted for its carpets. Axminster and Wilton, known to American carpet buyers as methods of carpet construction, gained their first fame in the 18th century as two of England's chief weaving towns.

Today, American carpets, many of them now made via the tufting technique, are famous throughout the world for their high quality, low cost, and fabulous variety of color, texture, and fiber. American textile scientists have performed such feats as transforming acrylonitrile - used during World War II to make synthetic rubber into a textile fiber that combines the best features of natural and man-made fibers.
