




Besides those in the Work Experience Program for credit, eighteen other Bethlehem seniors are working on a general work program, although they receive no credit for their efforts.

Farms Shrink

When viewed from the air, Albany County shows few significant distinctions between urban and rural areas.

The technological revolution in agriculture is making land available for urban and suburban growth, for second homes, and for recreation.

Changes in land use have blurred the distinctions between urban and rural areas, Norman Kidder, County Agricultural Agent, said, and promise substantial economic benefits for Albany County.

Today, each farmer produces food for 35 people. In 1980, he will produce food for 65 people, yields will have been boosted 31 per cent over today's and acres in crops will fall from 295 million to 270 million, it is predicted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

In this state, the agent said, every year approximately 300,000 acres of land once in agricultural use are diverted to other uses.

Albany County has 136,013 acres in farm, according to the latest statistics, a change of minus 15 per cent since 1950.

The number of farms is 1,024 today compared to 1,453 in 1950, a change of minus 30 per cent. However, it is important to note that the average size of farms is 141 acres today compared to 111 in 1950, a change of plus 27 per cent.

Changes in number and size of farms are reflected in changes in the average value of land and buildings per farm, Kidder said.

Today, the average value in the Albany County is \$24,536 compared with \$12,939 in 1950, a change of plus 90 per cent.


The agent said that the use of retired farm land for such purposes as hunting and fishing, commercial developments, and second homes brought in tourists dollars and created job opportunities.

THE ROMANCE OF WOOD

Only one tool of man is older than fire...the wood he used to fuel the first blaze! Even before the first flame flickered in a gloomy cavern, wood-the world's most versatile raw material—was being used for rude weapons.

Soon men learned to fashion woodworking tools - saws. chisels, axes and augers - and



they carved this durable, beautiful material into furniture. decorations and idols for their homes and temples.

Wood has been important in world history. There was the Wooden Horse of Troy; the socalled "Wooden Walls" (ships of war) that long protected the island fortress of Britain from invasions: and, of course, the wooden cross upon which Christ died.

Wooden money has often been used. As recently as the depression years of the 30's, scrip money made of plywood, in 25¢, 50¢ and \$1.00 denominations, was used in the U.S., in the small town of Tenino. Washington.

Plywood - wood in sheets, or "plies"-is not new. In 1500 B.C., the plies came from split logs. Nowadays a log is shaved into a continuous wooden


the doorway would look after a quick repainting job. If you're undecided as to what color paint will flatter your home most, why not try a touch of history this year? A door that wears the new Colonial touch, offered by Pittsburgh Paints, recalls the gaiety of Christmas celebrated two hundred years ago, and more.

Top your freshly painted door off with a "welcome canopy" to put your guests in a festive mood. It can be made quickly and simply, using gaily colored oil cloth.

Start with the supporting posts; cover two wooden poles approximately 7-feet long (depending on height of the doorway) with strips of oil cloth. Candy-stripe them with gift ribbon. The canopy support frame is made of narrow strips of wood, measured to the width of the door by the length of the canopy. Attach frame to the top of doorway and to supporting posts.

Make the canopy cover with alternate strips of oil cloth (here five strips, 10 inches wide by 42 inches long). Cut one end of each strip to a point, and attach strips to one another with tape. Now lay cover over frame and tack down, allowing points to overhang in front. Decorate with evergreen branches sprayed with quick - drying enamels. 
SAFETY DAY





HISTORY OF CHRISTMAS CAROLS



Called noels in France, le pastorali in Italy and Weihnacht-slieder in German, carols are the welcome sound of Christmas everywhere.

But did you know that originally carols were not songs but dances? It's a fact! These

of the earliest of the choruses of praise, gloria in excelsis deo (glory to God in the highest), can be heard in church services to this day.

The custom of outdoor carol singing is many hundreds of years old. According to researchers at the Aeolian Music Foundation, it seems to have started in the Middle Ages when groups of people went from house to house singing by torchlight.

Yet despite these joyous beginnings, the Christmas carol eventually ran into rough going. As Puritan influence grew, carols became gloomy and grim; finally the Puritans made it a crime to print or sing carols publicly!

But the carol — which plays so large a part in giving Christmas a spirit of gaiety — couldn't be suppressed for long, and many great writers such as Martin Luther and Charles Wesley and composers including Felix Mendelssohn and Friedrich Handel began to take an interest in this form of music.

In the England of Charles Dickens' time, the practice of "wassailing" or group singing of carols from house to house at Christmastime was popularized.


At the turn of the century, Americans added their own contribution to Christmas caroling as singers gathered around the family player-piano. With the recent revival of the player-piano, this delightful scene is being recreated all across the country. Most popular of the modern players is the Pianola, both a regular piano and a player-piano that encourages family togetherness during the holiday season or any time of the year.

Family gatherings for carol singing should be better than ever this season with more Christmas music available on music rolls than before. Among a selection of almost 50 popular Christmas tunes and traditional carols, several rare and beautiful Scottish and Welsh carols are being put out on Aeolian playerpiano rolls for the first time.

The happy memories that are revived each Christmas are composed of many ingredients—the smell of the fir tree, the glitter of tinsel, the taste of a Yuletide treat—but of all of them, perhaps the most evocative is the sound of carol playing and singing in the home.
