Farm School

Eight New York State College of Agriculture professors will be in Albany to help local Cooperative Extension Agents present the Regional Vegetable and Small Fruit Growers School. This school will be held on February 1 and 2, starting at 9:00 A. M. Joseph Hugh, Cooperative Extension Agent for Agriculture in Albany County, said the school will be held at the Community Hall, 218 Osborne Road, Loudonville.

These professors and local agents will present information ranging from fertilizer use to business and tax management, from insect, weed and disease control to handling soil with care.

The faculty for the February 1 program, devoted entirely to vegetable growing, includes: Dr. Phillip A. Minges, Professor of Vegetable Crops; Dr. J. A. Adams, Professor of Entomology; Dr. Arden Sherf, Professor of Plant Pathology and Joseph E. Huth.

The morning program on February 2 is planned to be of interest to both small fruit and vegetable growers and includes both soil management and business management information. Professor Hugh Wilson, Department of Agronomy will speak on "Handling Soil With Care" and Professor Brian How, Department of Agricultural Economics, will discuss "Tax Angles for Growers" and "Business Management Considerations."

Strawberry and Raspberry growing will be discussed on Wednesday afternoon, February 2. Professors John Tompkins, Kenneth Hickey and James Brann will cover all aspects of growing these crops, including insect, disease and weed control, pruning, spacing, etc.

The films cover a variety of subjects; art collecting, Indians, the circus, a tour in Ireland, a jazz program, the sea and too many others to mention.



Carl Gardner points out that nearly two out of three persons who drown were not engaged in swimming at the time of the incident - that they "fell" in the water - a boat capsized, etc." Water safety instructors equip people with the water skills necessary to care for themselves. He further stated that more than 100 volunteer Water Safety Instructors are needed for the Albany Area Summer Program that involve nearly 10,000 boys and girls at pools in this area.

All college students are urged to avail themselves of this opportunity to become certified as water safety instructors through this program.

This training qualifies its graduates for summer water-front positions in camps throughout New York State, and, in many instances, is a prerequisite for such a position by camp directors. The program is offered also to all persons interested in securing certification for water-front

positions and this is open to anyone who has lifesaving certification at this time.
