


Take These **Travel Tips**

If the "open road" seems to be a bit crowded, here is why more than 105 million Americans are expected to take pleasure trips 100 miles or more from their homes before the year's end. Of those who stay within U.S. borders, 90 per cent will travel by car.

Collectively, they'll spend an amazing \$22 billion on vacation fun. But whether they come home feeling well-rewarded or badly "soaked" will depend mainly on their own travel sense. Will you get the most per vacation day and dollar?

Before you start out, pay a visit to your service station for a car checkout. Have them check the oil and oil filter, tires, battery and the electrical system.



Also ask them to check the radiator, brakes, wheel alignment and steering linkage. A good service station can make these checks plus others such as exhaust pipes, lights and shock absorbers in about five minutes. Now, for the vacation itself.

- 1. Start out well-informed. The more you know in advance about weather patterns, prices, local attractions, food and lodgings along your route, the more realistic your itinerary - and your budget - can be. Pump well traveled friends (or a travel agent); clip out pertinent magazine and newspaper articles. Major oil companies are gold mines of information; a Trip Request card filled out at a local service station can bring you free literature, maps, even an expense book.
- 2. Plan ahead of disappointment. Even if you don't want to be hedged in by schedules, at least make an advance hotel or motel reservation for your first stop. That way you'll be surer of starting your vacation on the right note, avoiding fatigue and frayed nerves just when gaiety should be the mood. For subsequent stops, phone ahead at noon to be sure of a place to stay - or stop driving by 4 P. M. to assure yourself a choice of rooms. If your first motel belongs to an association that maintains a free reservations service among its members, that

is one worry off your mind.

3. Dress and pack for troublefree travel. Whenever you can, make one outfit do the work of two. Concentrate on wrinkleresistant fabrics in soil-concealing patterns or deep colors; this goes double for children's wardrobes! Women will travel more comfortably in beltless, easyfitting styles. To be avoided: the narrow skirt that rides up and wrinkles as you sit in the car. Take only shoes of proven comfort; those you are "breaking in" may break you first! On most trips, say experts, women do best with three bags. men with two: a large one that can sometimes be left in the car. a smaller one for overnight stops.

4. Get the most out of maps. Last year's map won't show this year's road construction. The American Oil Company reports that the 18 million highway maps it plans to distribute this year incorporate thousands of changes reflecting progress in the new interstate highway system. As a special bonus for travelers, the state maps have points-of-interest panels describing local landmarks.






rotating it so your marked route is aligned with your car's direction of travel. When your marked route turns left, you turn left without worry about compass directions — then reorient your map.

5. "As You Travel, Ask Us." That nice fellow you see walking his dog as you drive into a strange town may or may not be, able to help you with motel locations - and his idea of a "nice restaurant" may leave you shaking your head. Why take chances? Check with those who really know; service stations entitled to display an "As You Travel, Ask Us" sign are equipped to town-by-town, city-bycity information on food and lodgings, recreation areas, locations of churches, hospitals or doctors. In addition, they receive monthly road condition bulletins and information about the nation's "Top 20" travel events.

6. Sightsee — but sensibly. Don't feel you must see all the sights; if you attempt it, you will wind up with sore muscles and blurred memories. Alternate periods of sightseeing with blissfully "do-nothing" sessions. Plan sightseeing to please all age groups in the family. Young children love zoos and animal farms; older ones will appreciate land-

marks which tie in with school history and geography lessons. Industrial tours are treats for youngsters from ten through teen-age — and for their parents as well. Don't suffer through sights just because you think you should; if art museums don't thrill you at home, why would they excite you in a strange city?

7. Don't "relax" too hard. The same rule of reason applies if yours will be mainly a "back to nature" vacation. Take every precaution to avoid sunburn and remember that children can stand just about half as much sun as you can. When you go in for an ocean dip, remember that high waves and breakers take more out of you, more quickly than swimming in a quiet pool. If you've been sedentary all year, take your tennis, golf or horseback riding in small doses at first.




