



children's teacher-moms," on a one-to-one basis. Each teacher-mom was in a separate room with her pupil, with a program thought to be suitable to that child. The teacher-moms were under close supervision of the school psychologist and a psychiatrist, with a professional teacher in the building with them at all times. Almost half of the children were able, after a while, to enter a normal class.

All persons interested in the education of the "troubled child," are cordially invited to this meeting. A revision of the Education Law of New York State mandates education for the "emotionally disturbed," effective July 1966. Consequently, educators, as well as parents, are now seeking ways to provide effective services for such children, for whom, in most communities, no organized program has been available.

Autism is a rare mental disorder, first described in 1943 by Dr. Leo Kanner, the first child psychiatrist in the United States. "Infantile autism," as he named it, is characterized by the child's "aloneness," disinterest in people, and a ritualistic preservation of sameness.

Welcome Aboard The Bookmobile

"The first bookmobile to be operated by any school district in the entire state of New York began its rounds with its load of printed knowledge and entertainment in the town of Bethlehem yesterday." This is a direct quote taken from an Albany newspaper on December 10, 1931. That first bookmobile was a converted station wagon, with a few added shelves which were

reached from the outside and through a rolled down window. One person both drove and acted as librarian and so gained in exercise what she lacked in convenience.

So successful, however, was this venture that in 1942 "Moby Dick" replaced the first little traveling library. Moby Dick was a real bookmobile built to specifications set by the Delmar Library. Actually its papa was a Mack truck, but so well designed that the finished product was a great improvement. About 1,000 volumes were carried on its shelves.

In 1959 the demand for even more books was so great the library realized it had again outgrown its mobile facilities. Thus the current professional bookmobile joined the staff. This time it was designed and built to be exactly what it is — a library on wheels carrying about 3,000 books.

It also has the distinction of being the famous vehicle taken to Russia in 1959 as apart of the American exhibition at the Moscow Fair.

Today the bookmobile covers about 200 hundred miles each month and has a driver, Paul Goodfellow, and a librarian, Mrs. Pearl Carman. It circles hither and you through the area. Need-

New System

The U. S. Weather Bureau Stations in New York City, Albany and Buffalo have been connected to the New York State Civil Defense Warning System, according to a Civil Defense Commission announcement today. This arrangement will permit the three Weather Bureau Stations to give instantaneous advisory information of unusual or destructive weather conditions to the 139 civil defense warning points located throughout the State.

When desired, emergency weather information can be re-

stricted to those areas directly affected when the unusual conditions are of a local or regional nature.

In turn, the Weather Bureau Stations will receive immediate warnings of enemy attack, national emergency or widespread natural disasters which might affect their operations.

Arrangements for the inclusion of the Weather Bureau Stations in the State Civil Defense Warning System were made through the cooperation of the Federal Office of Civil Defense, the U.S. Weather Bureau and the New York State Civil Defense Commission.

Even though all aspects of Civil Rights have been in the headlines a great deal recently, most people don't realize just how much needs to be done if minority groups, and Negros especially, are to receive their rights in our democracy. Through-


out Albany County we have only token integration, and in the Town of Bethlehem fewer than one per cent of our residents are Negro. (Seventy per cent of these live in Coeymans.)

If you were a Negro living in the Albany area today, would you hesitate to move your family to Delmar? Of course you would. Being a "pioneer" of any sort is difficult, and our integration ligures prove that this is exactly the role a Negro in our community must assume.

Rut out Good Neighbors are

But out Good Neighbors are working hard to make it easier for Negros and other non-whites to live here. Basically, they have two reasons: 1) They have strong moral feelings that families of every race and creed have a basic right to the home they desire and can afford, and 2) They also want for themselves and their children the benefits and enrichment of cultural diversity in the places where they live.

The Bethlehem Good Neighbor Committee has just been organized in the past couple of months, but already about 45 people have volunteered to act as official Good Neighbors. Every church in the Tri-Village area has endorsed






