



APRIL TIPS FOR GARDEN & LAWN



Vegetable Garden Clean-up time-One early spring chore is the preparation of the site for this years garden. Don't burn that old plant refuse, it can provide you with valuable compost material.

Compost is a good source of organic matter for the village, city, or suburban garden. A compost pile may be made of leaves, weeds, straw, waste hay, and any waste vegetable matter other than diseased parts of vegetables. Pile these materials together as they accumulate during the season. Keep the lighter materials, such as leaves, from blowing away by throwing a little soil over the pile. The next spring start a new pile and turn the old one over to mix the material and to insure more even decay. Turn the compost over two or three times during the second season. It will be ready to apply to the garden before fall or spring plowing.

Avoid working a heavy wet soil too early-A few balmy days in April may cause some gardeners to prematurely start digging away pre-paring their garden soil. Wait until the soil has dried out sufficiently before turning it over. A garden soil is in the proper condition to work if a handful of soil will crumble slightly after squeezing it in your hand. You can destroy the structure of a heavy clay soil if it is plowed or dug too soon.

Starting Vegetable Transplants— Some of the more hardy vegetables can be started from seed now indoors. Use a light well drained media such as one of the Cornell peat-lite "artifical soil" mixes to start your seeds. Avoid a media which has a high fertilizer content. A young seedling will not require a heavy dose of nutrients and too much fertilizer may cause soluble salt injury. Using sterilized soil or a disease free media is also a smart move if you are starting your own plants.
