waiting for the result of The Belmont – will Michael Ford's Kauai King win to become the ninth in history to sweep the Triple Crown? – there will be plenty of action in the days preceding The Belmont.

It's a great week of racing to be presented by the New York Racing Association and The Belmont in the piece de resistance. Kauai King has been at Aqueduct since last Tuesday, becom-





ing acclimated to his new surroundings. He won the Kentucky Derby, the the Preakness. He wasn't nominated to The Belmont but he will be supplemented to the race for a fee of \$5,000.

Over the course of the years eight horses have been able to sweep the Triple Crown. Sir Barton, in 1919, was the first to do it. The others have been Gallant Fox in 1930, Omaha in 1935, War Admiral in 1937, Whirlaway in 1941, Count Fleet in 1943, Assault in 1946 and Citation in 1948.

Kauai King, a \$42,000 yearling purchase, now has a chance to be No. 9. Lightly raced as a twoyear-old — only four starts with one victory, one second and one third — he's been a terror in his division this year. He's won eight of ten starts, with one second. His only time out of the mon-



ey was a fifth in the Florida Derby. His second was in the Hutcheson Stakes. His stakes victories this year have been, in addition to the Derby and the Preakness, the Fountain of Youth, Prince George's and Governor's Gold Cup. To date this year he's earned \$369.027.

Graduation

Albany Academy for Girls will complete its 152nd year of classes with the graduation of 31 seniors on Tuesday, June 7.

All members of the class will go on to institutions of higher education in the fall, and are enrolled in 25 colleges and universities in New Yrk State, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Vermont, Virginia, Connecticut, Ohio, Maryland and Illinois. Colleges which have enrolled more than one member of the graduating class are Wellesley, Boston University, Hollins, and Hood.

The academy is an independent day school with an approximate enrollment of 310 girls from Kindergarten through grade 12. Its modern buildings on Academy Road are surrounded by twenty acres of lawn, playing fields and meadow. Many classes and activities are scheduled out-ofdoors in the spring and fall, and the younger students enjoy iceskating and sledding on the grounds during the winter months.

The program of studies emphasizes academic curriculum and college preparation. Small classes, excellent teaching, and attention of individual differences in students create a strong and stimulating educational situation.

The academy accepts a limited number of students each year,

Admission is through personal interview and tests, and appointments may be made through the school office which will be open from 9 to 4 on week days during the summer. School will reopen on Tuesday, September 13.
