We're concerned about the inconvenience and irritation such calls may cause you, and we're trying hard to eliminate them. But if you should receive such a call

Here's what you can do:

The best way to handle a nuisance sales call is politely, but firmly, to refuse the offer and hang up.

In a persistent case, ask for the salesman's name and company and report him to his firm. Reputable companies know it's bad business to annoy or mislead potential customers.

If you feel a call is unethical or offensive, call your telephone business office. Or report the incident to your local Better Business Bureau or Chamber of Commerce.

Here's what we are doing:

When we're told about firms that have unethical or offensive sales practices, we call or visit them and review the complaint.

We meet with industry associations and discuss the proper use of the telephone. This includes keeping telephone selling free from deception and pressure, calling at the prospect's convenience, using only specially trained people, emphasizing good telephone manners and calling only bona fide prospects.

We are conducting a public-information campaign to eliminate undesirable practices.

We are required by law to provide telephone service for any legal purpose. Selling by telephone is legal, and, when properly conducted, is a mutually beneficial way to conduct business with customers. But, like many other things, it is subject to misuse. You should be protected against such misuse, and we are doing our best to see that you are.

Committee That Cares

"It is with no cheer we look forward to an extension of our program," reports the Town of Bethlehem Committee That Cares Chairman Alexander J. Woehrle. "Last fall when the Committee was formed it anticipated an operation of short duration. Now it has been functioning for more than six months. The prospects of its usefulness is now projected for at least another year. Hopefully, the cause for which it was initiated man have an earlier finish."

The Committee obtained wallets to hold the pictures and gave them to the families to send to their men with the Army, Armed Forces, Navy, and Marines in the Asian battle area.

ing a solution to the Viet Nam crisis.

The Committee had its origin in Nathaniel Adams Blanchard Post #1040 of the American Legion in Delmar. An invitation was extended to other organizations in the Town of Bethlehem. These groups now make up the Committee with Blanchard Post: Bethlehem Memorial Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars: Bethlehem Business and Professional Women's Club; Blanchard Post American Legion Auxiliary; Bethlehem Lions: Town of Bethlehem Government: Kiwanis Club of Delmar, Inc.; Tri-Village Ministers' Association; Keyettes of Bethlehem Central Senior High School: and Elsmere Fire Auxiliary.

The Committee schedules its meetings for 7:30 P. M. on the first Thursday of each month. The meeting place is at the Blanchard Post Hall.

Another action by the Committee had a two-fold purpose. It was dubbed "Operation Bolster." Through it the Committee made available bumper strips on which was printed "We support Our Men In Viet Nam." The Committee purchased the strips and distributed them through its co-operating organizations for whatever contribution was received. William J. O'Neil representing the Bethlehem Lodge of Elks is chairman for the program. He reports, "While the bumper-strips paid for themselves we see surprisingly few of them on autos. We still have an ample supply. We would feel their purpose was being fulfilled if more of them were displayed. The intent of these bumper strips is first to allow anyone so inclined to publicly express sentiments of support for our men in Viet Nam. Secondly, it gives those persons not directly associated with organizations in the Committee to have an opportunity to participate in its work."

Death recently took a member of the Committee. Earl S. Jones, its initial chairman, died while visiting in Florida last month.

These other individuals have taken an active part in the work of the Coommittee since it com-


