A delightful young lady from Ankara, Turkey, Miss Ufuk Osbudak, is currently brightening the scene in Glenmont. Sponsored by the Bethlehem Community Ambassador Program, Miss Osbudak is now spending 10 days with Dr. and Mrs. Theodore Beecher of 30 East Bayberry Road after a 2-week visit with Mr. and Mrs. John Cunningham of 1682 Western Avenue in Albany.

Miss Osbudak studied Psychology for 2 years at the University of Ankara, (which, incidentally, has the largest campus in the world), and hopes to complete her studies here in the United States. She has no doubt about what she will do with her education — she intends to become a teacher.

While many of her friends shy away from leaving the comforts of modern city life, in Turkey for a teaching career in the less developed rural villages, Miss Osbudak believes that this is the area where she can do the most to help her country equalize itself. As the daughter of a Turkish career officer, she has traveled widely and is quite knowledgeable on the needs of her country. Turkey has made rapid strides in modernization since becoming a republic in 1923, but as in most countries,

the more remote agricultural areas lag behind the rest of the country.

After meeting some of our Peace Corps volunteers in Turkey, Miss Osbudak speaks with enthusiasm of the work they are doing. (One of our local boys, Larry Simmons, of Ridge Road in Elmsere is now in his second year with the Peace Corps, teaching English in one of the villages of southwestern Turkey.)

Miss Osbudak has studied ballet for several years and enjoys classical music. Highlights of her stay with the Beechers have been the Chaikovsky concert at the Saratoga Performing Arts Center, and a visit to the north country around Old Forge. She also had her first try at golf on the Colonial Acres course and found it quite enjoyable.

While Miss Osbudak enjoys American food, she was pleasantly surprised at a dinner given by Dr. and Mrs. Matthew Elbow of 41 Fernbank Avenue when Mrs. Elbow served two of her favorite staple foods, dolma and pilav. (Mrs. Elbow was pronounced a fine Turkish cook). The Elbows lived in Turkey during 1963-64 when Dr. Elbow taught at Robert College in Istanbul.

Supervisor of Fire Training

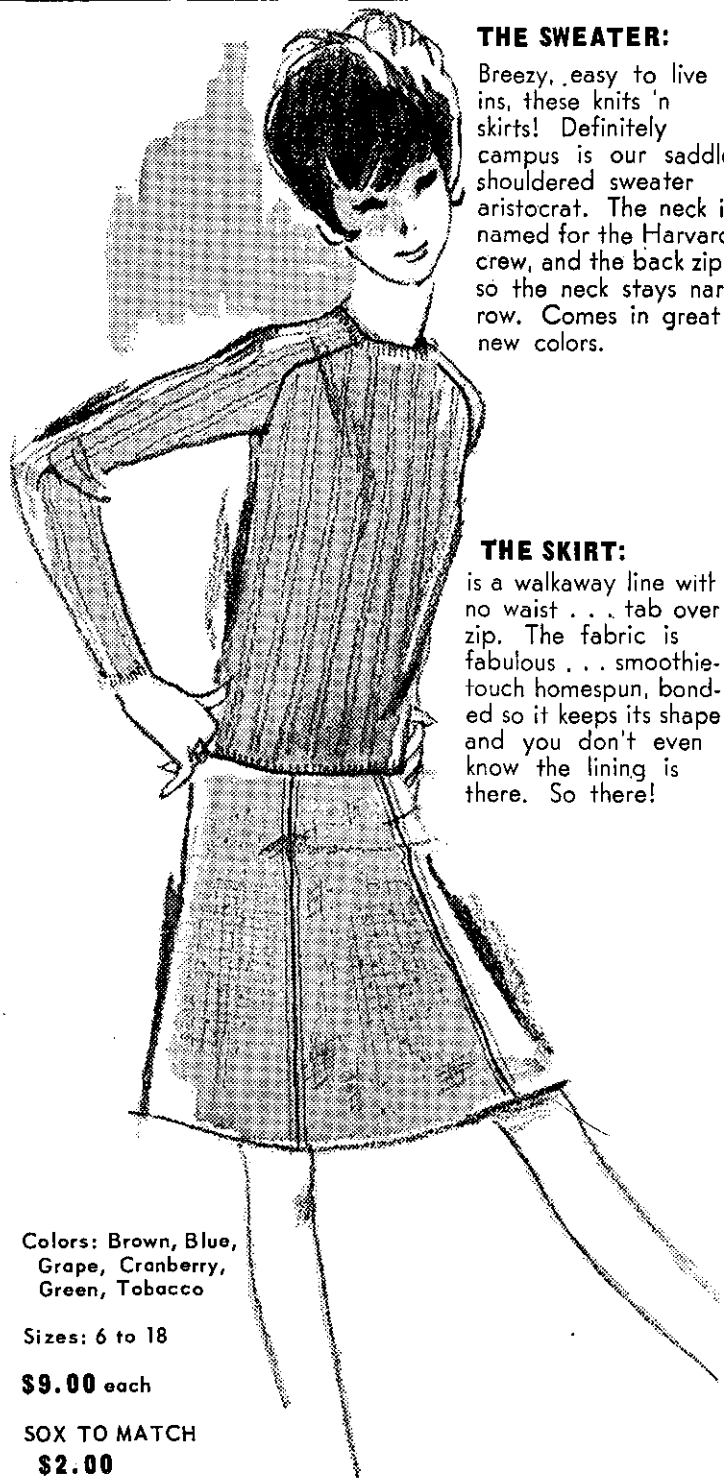

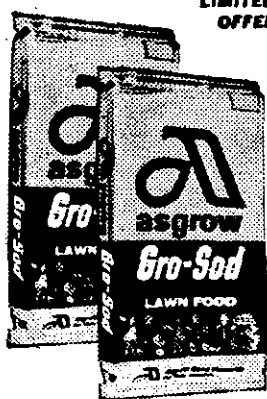

He has served as a New York State Fire Instructor assigned to Albany County, teaching fire training courses to paid and volunteer fire departments as well as industrial fire brigades.

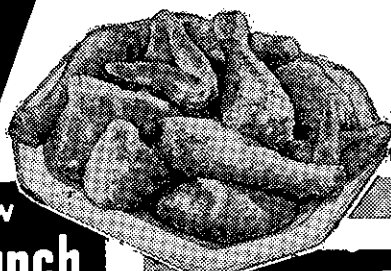

"Upon this principle, the Republican platform pledges that the minimum wage standard shall be extended to municipal employees as well as to employees of private business and industry.

"Further, the Republican party pledges that minimum annual salaries for municipal employees engaged in occupations affecting high public interest, safety and concern shall be established by law with due regard to the standard of skill and expertise required of these occupations."

Mr. Rook pointed out that the minimum wage standard of \$1.50 per hour by law does not apply to municipal employees. "There is no further dispute about the validity of minimum wages or the amount of the minimum wage," he said, "It only remains for us to admit that the value of human labor is the same whether performed for private industry or for a municipality."

As an example of low wages paid by municipalities, he stated that Albany's street sweeper drivers are paid but \$45 a week and their helpers receive only \$41 a week.

In the area of annual salaries for policemen, he cited a bill recommended by Governor Rockefeller which would have fixed minimum annual salaries for starting patrolmen. Under the bill, if it had been passed, starting patrolmen in Albany would have received \$5100 per year and those in Bethlehem would receive \$4500 per year.

In his statement to the Republican Platform Committee, he said, "The problem of crime and law enforcement is today a matter of deep public concern and certainly is one of state concern. The existence of standard salaries for municipal policemen is unquestionably a deterrent to the proper enforcement of our criminal laws."

Mr. Rook stated that inadequate salaries have an effect upon the recruitment of new policemen and upon the morale of the existing force. "However much and as well as a policeman may want to do his job," Mr. Rook said, "these conditions must have a corrosive effect

upon his zeal and efficiency."

Mr. Rook mentioned firemen and welfare case workers as other occupations which should be considered for mandated minimum salaries. He noted that teachers already were the subject of a provision of the Education Law fixing minimum salaries.

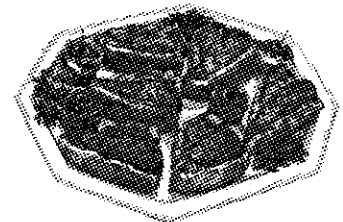

Lawn Grasses

Whether you are seeding a new lawn or filling bare spots in an old lawn, the kind of grass you select is important. Only three basic kinds of grasses are recommended for permanent lawns in this area. These are the Kentucky bluegrasses, including the variety Merion, the red fescues and rough bluegrass (poa trivialis) for special situations.

Kentucky bluegrass is the best grass for sunny areas in good soil. It is the backbone of good seed mixtures for sunny lawns. The variety Merion Kentucky bluegrass is more vigorous than other bluegrasses and is resistant to the leaf spot disease. Because of the greater vigor, Merion requires more fertilizer and mowing than does common Kentucky bluegrass.

Red fescue strains are the best kinds of grass for dry soils, either in sun or shade. Red fescues are quite tolerant of shade and are the backbone of shady lawn mixtures. Very often the so-called "shady lawn" seed mixtures would be the best choice for dry, sandy, or gravelly soils in sunny areas. There are many named varieties of red fescues including, Penn lawn, Chewings, Creeping, Rainier, Illahee and Trinity.

Rough bluegrass is a special purpose grass for moist, shady areas. It is not a satisfactory grass for dry, sunny areas.

A fourth kind of grass is also recommended for special situations. These are the bentgrasses. Bentgrass is used for putting greens and for people who want a fine lawn and are willing to make it their summer's work. Bentgrass should be mowed every 3 or 4 days, watered and fertilized regularly all season. If used in a seed mixture, bentgrass tends to form areas of fluffy matted turf. It is best to omit bentgrass from most home lawns.

Seed Mixtures

For most situations a good seed mixture will contain primarily Kentucky bluegrasses and red fescues. In fact, these grasses should make up 80% of the mixture. For sunny lawns and good

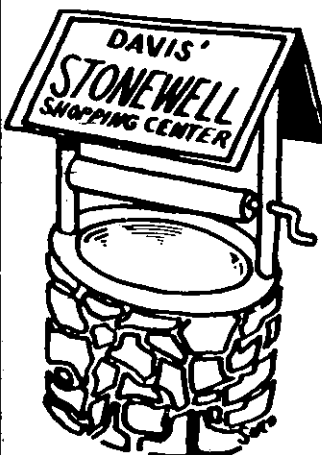

Enthusiasm - Study -
Production - Success . . .

. . . These words emphasize the many activities that have gone on in the Bethlehem Central School District this summer. Activities ranged from a highly structured workshop in perception and language development to the extension of an individually prepared social studies program for those seniors who will move directly from high school into vocational fields.

Project direction included depth study, the use of nationally known consultants, and broad interchange of ideas by approximately 100 staff members. Child development and child need were stressed along with improvement of teaching methods and the preparation and organization of materials for instruction. Direction opportunities for young people were offered so that each child could know the satisfactions of school success.

A program backed by funds available under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act

—Title I will benefit incoming first graders whether they attended St. Thomas School, private schools in the area, or Bethlehem Central. \$48,564.25 is being spent to carry out a proposal entitled, "Diagnosis, Remediation, Prevention—A Team Approach." Two aspects of the program, the Glenmont Workshop and a summer school in Slingerlands, will be discussed later in the article.

The Board of Education of the Bethlehem Central School System has recognized the need for teacher concentrated effort in the development of curriculum, and a need for more efficient use of buildings and school personnel. Money has been allocated for programs which extend those already set up in the year 1965 and those new to 1966.

Ideas for study projects came from staff members. Teachers and administrators realize their responsibilities in educating citizens for a rapidly changing world. They feel a spirit of unrest, an inward upheaval which has forced them to ask themselves,

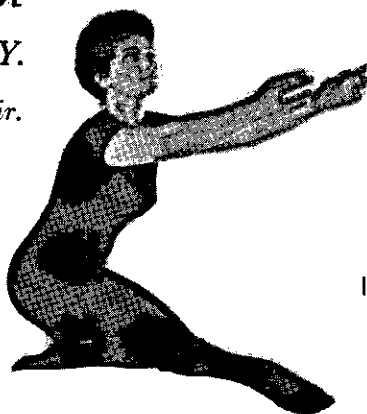

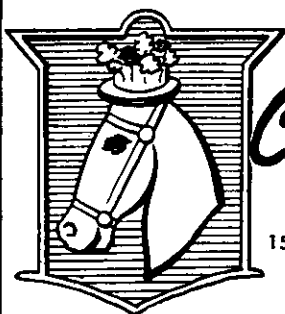

"Am I doing the best teaching for these times?" "Is my work efficient and effective?"

Under Federal Grant, Title II, E.S.E.A., \$8,344 was allocated for the purchase of books for library services for the community. In their planning for these expenditures the library teachers extended their thinking to a library skills handbook for teachers. The Board of Education, seeing the visionary planning involved, employed Mrs. Flossie Smith, librarian at the Hamagrael and Glenmont Schools, to compile this study aid in concentrated summer work.

Recognizing the value of a sequential development program in reading and arithmetic, George Bonacker, Delmar School Principal, with four of his first and second grade teachers, set out to study practical ways of structuring such a plan. There was a similar study of reading at the junior high level involving Elizabeth Tibbetts, Carmita Shaver, and Robert Lambert, head of the English Department. In both instances the school program indicated a need for study and the impetus came from faculty members.

Much went on in the explosive atmosphere of child-teacher enthusiasm. The self-discipline, the creative approach, the interaction which permeated each activity indicated strong teacher desire for improvement, for opportunities to plan with vision, for freedom and time to prepare. "You can't collect the bits and pieces formulated after the school day and come up with a solid program. You need to be 'fired up,' enthusiastic to the point of living your ideas. There must be time to assimilate a broad background of information."

A workshop was designed to discover and review preventive methods which would seek to eliminate learning difficulties in first graders. Members of the Bethlehem and St. Thomas staffs worked together to update, revitalize, and directly improve teaching techniques in visual, auditory, and motor skills, as well as language development.

In preparation for the Glenmont Workshop, Director Grace Erkson shared the responsibility of analyzing observation and test data with Dr. Kathryn Bookbinder, school psychologist, and Mrs. Ann Reardon, reading specialist. Data on over 400 incoming first graders was compiled and studied in preparation for the actual structuring of individual "maps of learning."

No two patterns were alike. To build participant understanding leaders in fields of perception and testing for patterns of learning were brought to Bethlehem: Dr. Marianne Frostig, Director of the Center of Educational Therapy in Los Angeles; Miss Nancy Rushmore, there assistant; Mrs. Jeanne Prentice, Director of Education Services for Psychological Associates in St. Louis, Missouri. In addition to Dr. Bookbinder, Mrs. Erkson and Mrs. Reardon, additional Bethlehem talent was tapped: Mrs. Ruthann Cons, school psychologist; George Behrens, speech teacher.

It became evident to all participants that each child must live with language before he can accept it in a meaningful way through the printed symbol. There must be a sensitivity to language, a fullness of experience. A word or idea must have depth. It must be "perceived" fully. For example, hammer—word for a tool of wood and steel that can be touched and seen, only becomes meaningful when it is used. Unless experiences are provided for this full perception of the word, it fails to become part of the child's vocabulary.

In the inspirational atmosphere for study and production set up by Mrs. Erkson, teachers met to discuss ways to build a program based on patterns of learning which allow for small group instruction or indicate need for individual work. They devised methods and materials. Always they thought in terms of the prevention of learning difficulties and the development of child success. As Dr. Kathryn Bookbinder expressed it, "A child must know enough success so that, as he moves into more difficult areas of learn-

ing, he is able to accept failure."

Actual child success was evident in the Slingerlands School where, under Miss Mary Bida, Principal, the second phase of the federally sponsored program took place. Here, in an atmosphere highly conducive to learning, young people worked in areas of arithmetic and reading. In addition, nearly 60 children participated in school sponsored programs in the arts. "This is all based upon the child's developmental needs," said Miss Bida. Some of these young people were ready to compose beautiful music. Some chose to explore art media and techniques beyond the areas of school exploration, many sought beauty or excitement through the performing arts. All of these young people desired aesthetic experiences and were prepared to meet them.

Whether it was a group of boys playing "A.B.C.," an individual child using the film-strip projector, or two girls listening and responding to taped stories, there was a spirit of happy interest in every one of the reading and arithmetic groupings. Here multi-technique approaches were in evidence. This tended to be different from the usual classroom procedures. Here was a highly structured freedom conducive to child production.

Mrs. Reardon, reading specialist, served in many capacities. Her knowledge added breadth and depth to the program. Unobtrusively she worked with individual children spotting areas of weakness. She then suggested materials and demonstrated methods which could prevent continuing patterns of learning difficulty.

How was this learning atmos-

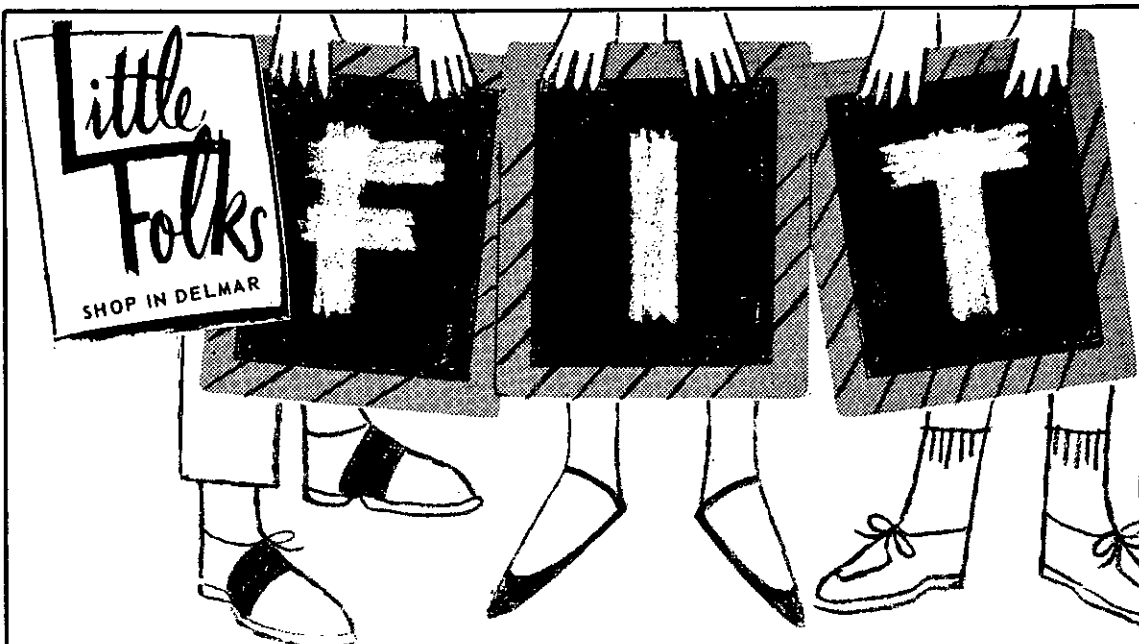

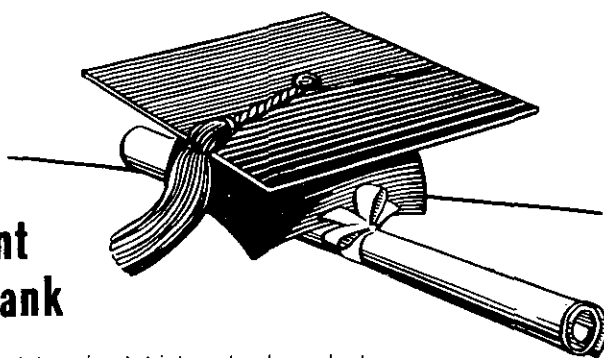

where accomplished? Miss Bida spoke of her staff. "Our teachers were happy to have an opportunity to work with children whose developmental needs indicate the value of small group and individual instruction. They have appreciated the freedom given them to plan materials suitable for each child and the time for reflection upon this planning in light of the total program. There has been interaction, a pooling of resources giving the program breadth and fuller meaning."

Students at the secondary level were given opportunities to extend their knowledge, skills and talents through lengthened math 10 and 11, instruction in driver education, personal typing and the instrumental band program.

Nearly 20 members of the staff participated in revision and broadening of curriculum. Department heads and teachers are fully aware of the curriculum explosion currently in existence. terest. This is state approved with evaluation set up on a teacher-student conference basis. This program fills a recognized need for the liberal arts students.

Science, mathematics, and language arts teachers are refining programs to avoid repetition, cast out the unnecessary, and recognize the importance of sequential development based on individual and group needs.

school's curriculum will include such areas of study as Business Principles and Management, Salesmanship, Psychology of Credits and Collections, Personnel Management, in addition to the general field of typewriting, accounting, English grammar, Mathematics, and Business Law. It will be from this course of study that business executive assistants will be chosen, as the program will train students in office management with emphasis upon a mastery of accounting.

September 19 will also open the usual courses at Spencer's with the following objectives:

Executive-Secretarial—This course is designed for those interested in training for private secretarial positions with legal, medical, or industrial firms in the area, as well as top-grade positions with State and Federal agencies. This course consists of 44 weeks with emphasis upon proficiency in the skills of shorthand and typewriting, English essentials and secretarial procedures.

Stenographic—The Stenographic Course trains in the basic skills of shorthand and typewriting for those students desiring to be placed with State and Federal offices or with small, private concerns in the area. The length of this type training is 36 weeks and includes such electives as IBM Key Punch, Dictaphone operation, and Secretarial Accounting.

Court, Convention, and Conference Reporting—Upon completion of 44 weeks of training under the first year of Court Reporting Course, students who have indicated an ability to acquire even higher rates to speed can then, by taking the second year of Court Procedures, qualify for positions as hearing stenographers, free lance verbatim reporters, and official court reporters. Among SBS graduates in Machine Shorthand are Official Court Reporters who have all acquired high speed and skilled transcription abilities. In all examinations for Court Reporters in recent years, Spencer's machine shorthand graduates have almost invariably topped the list. Graduates from the Reporting Course earn from

\$5,200 and up to \$9,000 and \$10,000 a year. The reporting field is definitely an uncrowded field; competition is virtually non-existent, which is extremely important to young people today.

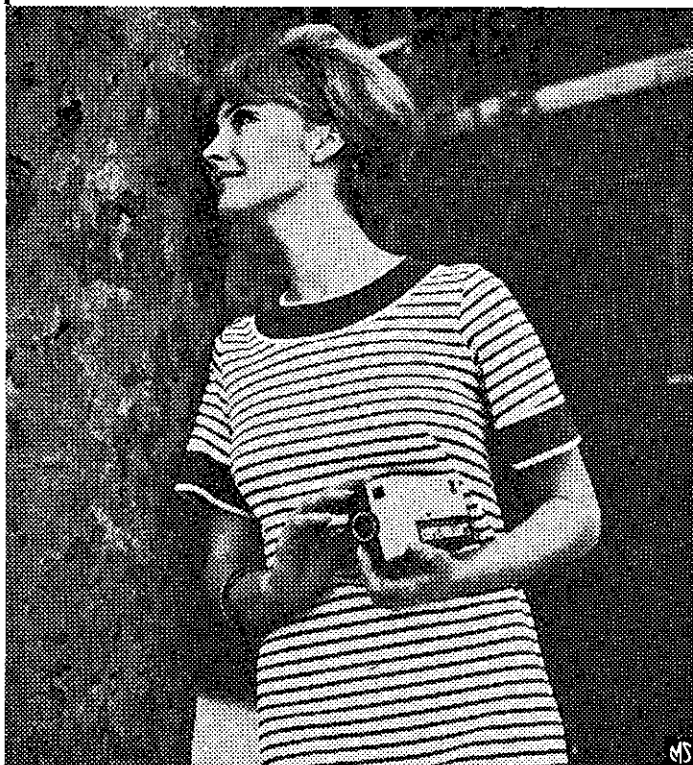
Clerical-typist with IBM Key Punch—The training received under this 36-week course proves invaluable to those wishing to receive training in the fairly new area of data processing. All basic office skills are taught under this course with added attention given to IBM Key Punch training. These graduates are in great demand by the Civil Service Department and by individual enterprises in the area which are converting to data processing.

Established in 1893, Spencer Business School ranks as one of the oldest business schools in the Capital District. It is registered as an accredited business school by the University of the State of New York and is approved by the State Department of Vocational rehabilitation for Disabled students, and by the U.S. Department of Justice for foreign students. The school is also recognized for student training by the Veterans Administration under the Post Korean G I Training Bill and the War Orphan Bill.

Also, this year arrangements are being made with volunteer community agencies in the city to offer actual practice in office work for students enrolled in the various courses at Spencer's. This work is done on a volunteer basis and the training received is very beneficial to the students as well as an invaluable aid to the community. Spencer's is closely affiliated with a private Court Reporting Agency in Albany where students are able to obtain additional training in note reading, recording and transcribing court room cases, and other actual phases of court reporting work.

Registration for any of the fall courses is being held now. Personal interviewing and counseling may be arranged by calling the school's Registrar's office between 8:30 and 3:00. Telephone 374-7619.

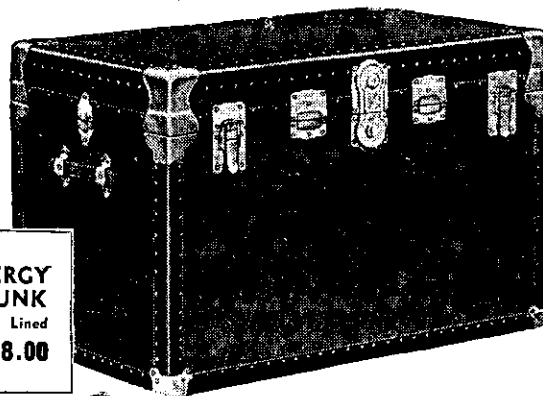

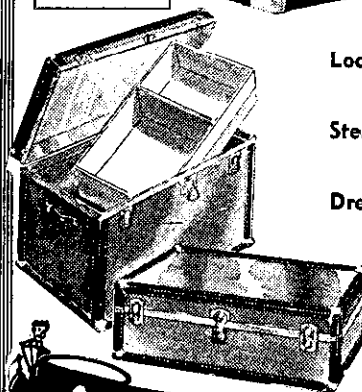

Late Summer Vegetables

At this time of the year, most of the work in the vegetable garden is harvesting the fruits of earlier labors. However, there are a few remaining chores that should not be overlooked.

The battle against insects and diseases is not over. Continue to spray or dust with an all-purpose mixture every week or ten days. A good all-purpose mixture for vegetables includes Sevin, Kelthane, Malathion, and Maneb. This mixture will control most insects and diseases affecting vegetables. Stop spraying one week before harvesting the vegetables.

Asparagus and rhubarb should be fertilized now to promote growth next year. About 3 pounds of 5-10-5 fertilizer or 1 1/2 pounds

of 10-10-10 or similar fertilizer is plenty for 100 feet of row.

If you now have some empty space in your garden, there are a few crops that can still be planted. At this late date the surest crops are radishes and turnips. If you wish to gamble a bit on the weather, chinese cabbage, leaf lettuce, peas and spinach can be seeded now. If you planned ahead and have head lettuce, cabbage and cauliflower plants, these can be planted. These crops will have a good chance of maturing before winter.

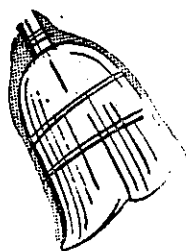
